FIND OLD CONSTITUTION OF INSTITUTE COMMITTEE

Temporary Officers for Guiding
Freshmen Chosen

The resurrection of an old constitution of the Institute Committee from a bunch of dust-covered files, was announced on Thursday at one of the regular meetings of this body. This constitution which had been misplaced and neglected for the past three years will have a far reaching effect upon the policy of the Institute Committee. The old business enacted at this meeting was the acceptance of reports from various sub committees.

The constitution, which was found by R. H. Smithwick '21, after a long search among the papers of the Institute Committee will govern the actions of that body from now on. In accordance with one of its provisions, which calls for the appointment in May of Juniors to act as temporary advisory officers of the entering freshman class, H. J. Horn '22, president of the Junior class, was chosen to act as chairman, C. G. Rudderham, treasurer of the Class of '22, to take care of the finances, W. W. Russell '22, to act as manager of the football team, R. C. Geckler '22, of the tug o-war team, L. B. Davis '21 of the crew and M. N. Waterman '23, of the relay team for the Class of '24. Most of the men named have already shown their interest in the entering class by voluntarily acting in capacities similar to those to which they have been appointed. It will be the duty of these men to guide the freshmen in undergraduate activities until they have their own organization. Election of freshmen officers takes place after Field Day.

T. C. A. To Publish Bible Next Year

The report of the committee that investigated the publication of the "freshman bible" stated that this year 1500 copies were distributed by the Technology Christian Association at a cost of \$677. The advertising brought in \$693, thus leaving a balance of \$16 towards next year's edition. Inasmuch as the T. C. A. is well organized to do this work, and will have 2000 copies, counting all the suitable information, ready next year, it was decided to leave the publication in its hands.

The work of the other committees is well under way, and reports will be presented at subsequent meetings of the Institute Committee. Acting upon a petition from the Civil Engineering Society to have its representative reinstated upon the Institute Committee, a committee will be appointed to investigate the matter.

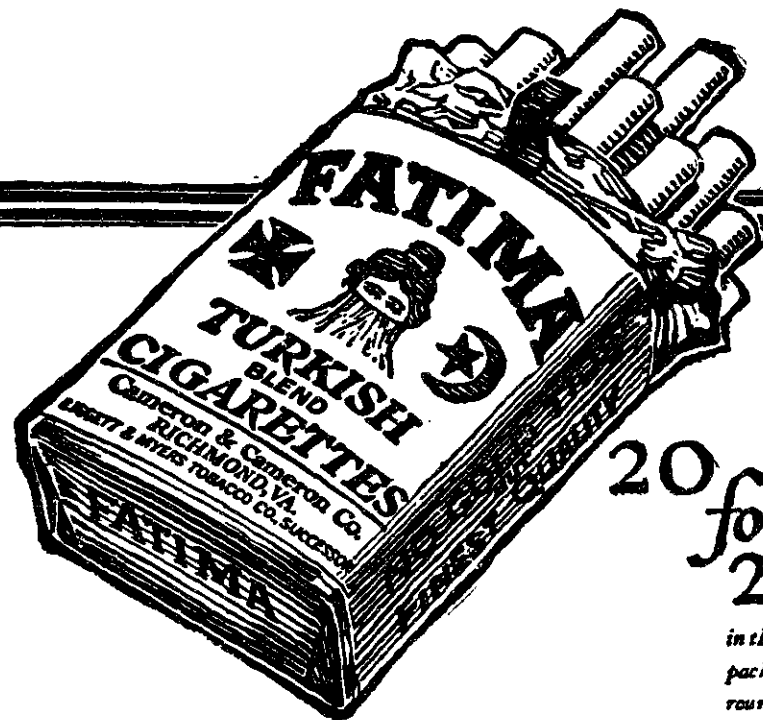
