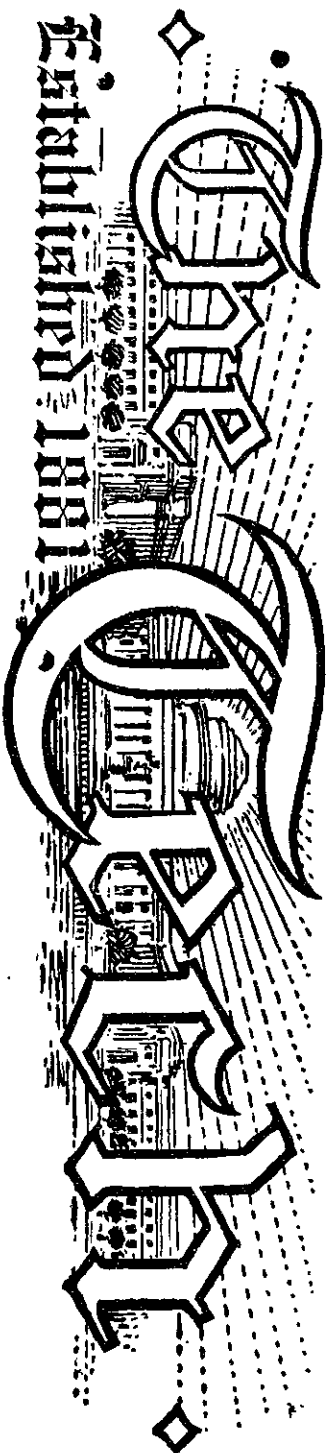




CROSS-COUNTRY MEN MEET CRIMSON ON BELMONT COURSE

QUOTA OF 2700 IN SIGHT

With a sandwich man parading the corridors, hand-bills being passed out at all entrances, and barbers yielding in the lobby, the T. A. C. drive, which started on Monday has continued through the week. All day students passing through the lobby have been waylaid, followed by their surplus cash, and adorned with gray and red buttons. Nearly 1200 tickets have been sold at the booths alone, and when those sold by the freshman section leaders, canvassers in the fraternities and in the dormitories are counted, the total to date comes pretty close to 1700, or about fifty percent of the enrollment this year. Officers of the club predict that when the sale of tickets closes at 1 o'clock, Saturday the membership will be estimated conservatively at 2500 or more.

Third of Tax Goes to Sports

The real purpose of the sale of these tickets is to eliminate the element of chance from which has elapsed so large a part in financing activities at the Institute, in the past. Contrary to the prevailing opinion, the money taken in by the Student Tax. This amount is usually just a little short of that necessary to show a balance on the books of the management. Consequently, it has been customary to reserve only a small amount of standing room free for holders of student tax cards, and to charge entrance for seats to make the sport a paying proposition.
