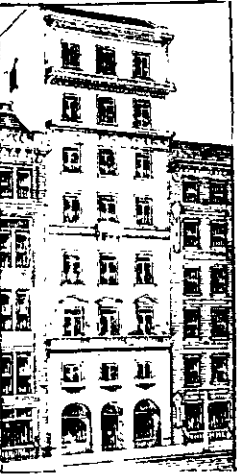

Colgate Favors Harding.
At Colgate University Harding again proved the favorite by a large majority. As at the other colleges the Prohibition leader Watkins gained the least number of supporters. The results at the Colgate election under the auspices of the Colgate Maroon were as follows: Harding 126, Cox 93, Debs 5, Christensen 1 and Watkins 1. Votes cast 332.

CYCLONE BURNS TO COACH GRAPPLERS

INSTITUTE SECURES FAMOUS WRESTLER

The M. I. T. Wrestling Team is particularly fortunate in securing the services of "Cyclone" Burns. This coupled with the fact that all except two members of last year's team have returned, should insure a successful season. Burns has generally been regarded as light heavyweight champion of the world. His record as coach is equally as good inasmuch as under his direction, Andover has turned out winning teams for the last five years. In the past this has meant that the colleges have looked to his pupils for material for their wrestling teams.

Under arrangements now made, "Cyclone" Burns will be able to devote time to any and all men in the Institute interested in wrestling. A freshman team will also start practice on Nov. 8. Freshman wishing to substitute wrestling for physical training may do so by signing up in Mr. Kanaly's office. Practice for both Varsity and freshmen will start Nov. 8 and continue three times a week thereafter.

SOP TEAMS IMPROVE

26 Men Respond to Call for Track Men

During the past week a large number have reported to the managers of the various Sophomore teams furnishing material that was called for at the last meeting of the class. Regular teams have been picked and committees appointed to take care of every detail in hopes of making a victory certain. Football has suffered a loss with C. A. Brantingham '23 out of the game temporarily because of water on the knee. Dewain is the only other man on the squad who has suffered injuries. More than forty men have reported up to date including McCue, guard on last year's West Virginia eleven; the line has increased in weight now averaging 185 pounds from tackle to tackle. Next Saturday against Lowell Textile the team's strength will be tested after which any necessary changes will be made for final Field Day practice.

Crews Are Strong

The Sophomores now have two experienced crews at practice every day including Sunday and also a number of alternates who are showing good form. The decision to run only two races on Field Day has enlivened the competition among the members of the second crew who are working hard to hold their seats. Preliminary trials were held in the track event Thursday afternoon and unearthed some material that is much needed in this event. There are at present 26 men out, nine of which ran on last year's team. The large number answering the call for '23 Tag-O-War has made it possible for Coach Crosby to pull one team against another. However, there are not enough out yet to make up two full teams and a call is issued for more to report any night, except Saturday or Sunday, at the Track House at 5 o'clock.

The Sophomore Band, a new feature in the Field Day program, is proving to be a success. There are only seventeen men out for this organization and those in charge have asked Sophomores able to play instruments to report at the next practice next Tuesday afternoon in room 30-102 at either 4:30 or 5 o'clock. Any men who have not instruments at the Institute but who can play will be given them or practice and for use on Field Day. Also any men who have Technology song books and will lend them to members of the band until after Field Day are asked to leave them with any member of the band.

GOLF CLUB HOLDS TOURNAMENT

The preliminary round of a 36-hole medal golf tournament is being held at the Winchester Country Club this week. Next week, a match play competition will take place to determine the best player in the school. This will probably be an annual event. Matches have been arranged with Albemarle Country Club and others.
