In order to stimulate the sale of subscription books, THE TECH will give a carton of Fatimas free each week. In the issue of November 9, there will be printed a number which will be drawn at large from the subscription book list of THE TECH, and the holder of the lucky number will be entitled to a free carton of Fatimas. A lucky number will be drawn each week from the subscription list and it will be announced in each Tuesday's issue.

Every week for eight weeks some subscriber of THE TECH will get a free carton of cigarettes. In this manner the lucky winner saves the price of a subscription. The fraternities who have subscribed in bulk and are having the papers delivered to them will have numbers assigned to them. Likewise, all other men who hold subscription books and have no number should see the circulation manager at once in order that he may assign them a number.

The subscription books originally sold for \$2.50 for 72 issues. Since the first month has passed the books will be put on sale for \$2.00 for 62 issues. This means that \$1.10 is saved if the coupon books are purchased.

HARDING WINS STRAW VOTE AT INSTITUTE

Republican Nominee Defeats
Cox by Large Majority—
Debs Also Has Many Supporters

FACULTY VOTES REPUBLICAN

Senator Warren G. Harding of the Republican party received an overwhelming majority in the presidential straw vote cast at the Institute. The Republican nominee had a plurality of 889 over his nearest opponent, James M. Cox, who received but one fourth as many votes as the successful candidate. Eugene Debs, Socialist, easily defeated Watkins, the Prohibition candidate and Christensen of the newly formed Farm Labor party. The Faculty was strongly Republican and anti-Prohibition.

The results gave Harding, 1201; Cox, 320; Debs, 103; Christensen, 30; and Watkins, 13. The Faculty voted, Harding, 22; Cox, 3; Debs, 10; Christensen, 0; and Watkins, 0.

As a consequence of the strong Republican sentiment evinced by both the student body and Faculty, R. F. Officer '21, president of the Technology Republican Club, received the following telegram from John Hays Hammond. "Heartily congratulations on the result of the straw vote cast at Technology. The discrimination in favor of Harding shows a spirit born of scientific reasoning."

TECHNIQUE COMPETITIONS RUNNING IN FULL SWING

The competitions for Technique are now in full swing, for positions on both the business and editorial departments. At the present time the Junior competition is led by H. M. Shurey '22, while there is a tie between P. C. Putnam '23, and H. H. Plather '23 for first position on the Sophomore list. The manager of the business department, H. E. Rockefeller '21, wishes all men in the competition whether freshmen, Sophomores or Juniors to report to him at the office sometime before next Friday to check up on the renewal adds.

INTERCLASS TRACK MEET TAKES PLACE SATURDAY

Last year the class of 1921 was victorious largely due to their cleaning up, in that often neglected event, the Discus Throw.

The management is endeavoring to run the full schedule of 13 events off in time to allow those who desire to attend the Harvard-Princeton game in the Stadium.

Because of the large squads in training at the present time for the 220 yards dash and distance events these races will attract the greatest interest and will be very hotly contested.

Men may sign up for any event they choose in the entry book posted in the track house. Any undergraduate is eligible to compete.

It was only because the Institute team was able to win the larger number of these duals that they won the meet.

BIG PARADE TO FEATURE FIELD DAY

Starts In Eastman Court Directly After Crew Race And Ends at Grandstand on Tech Field

SEATS HELD FOR MARCHERS

"Everybody out for that big Field Day Parade." This is the message from the Field Day management in the hope of making the event one of the features of the afternoon's sport, a sort of appetizer for the events on Tech Field, "an eye-opener," Matt Taylor '22, Field Day manager says, to get some spirit into the Day.

Eighty-five per cent of the seating capacity of Tech Field has been reserved by the T. A. C. The club had been promised two-thirds of the seats but succeeded in getting a larger apportionment.

No one will be allowed in the grand stand until after the parade. This is to insure a large turnout for the line of march and to provide seats for everybody who marches.

The parade will start immediately following the crew race. This race begins at 1:30 o'clock from Cottage Farm Bridge and the finish may be viewed from Harvard Bridge or the bank of the river in front of Walker. The finish line is in front of the Memorial building on this side of the river.

For the parade, the seniors will form in the northwest corner of Eastman Court, the Juniors in the northeast corner of the same court, the Sophomores in duPont Court, and the freshmen in Lowell Court.

The parade will finish at the grand stand on the field and those in the parade will be seated before the stands are thrown open to the public.

T. A. C. season tickets admit to the cheering section. The 140 reserved seats outside of the section will go on sale Wednesday and Thursday in the main lobby from 12 until 2 o'clock at 75 cents each.

Cheer leaders have been appointed from each class and the Cambridge police force has been duly notified. One final warning from Matt Taylor, "Bring your T. A. C. season ticket. The student tax will not get you into the stands."
