The Sophomore have four veterans from last year's crew. R. C. Evans, who rowed at bow; J. L. Brill who rowed at No. 2; J. C. Nowell who rowed at No. 7; and H. Y. Satterlee who pulled stroke, compose the veterans of this year's crew.

Although defeated last year by one-third of a length, they have developed into a winning crew this year, defeating the Harvard Sophomore crew over a mile course by 3 lengths and downing the Harvard freshmen crew over the same course by 5 lengths. With this record they are confident of adding three points to the Sophomore score this afternoon.

Good Time in Practice

The Sophomore relay team has been running faster in practice than they ran in the race last year and from present indications will make exceptionally fast time this afternoon. Harry Bruner the lead off man, is a veteran of last year's team and is one of the fastest starters in the 'Stute. Captain Smith who runs last has consistently done under 24 seconds, last year and this.

He calls it a form of social service. Wallie Ross shoed 43 Institute men over to the Boston Y. W. C. A. the other night to serve as partners for

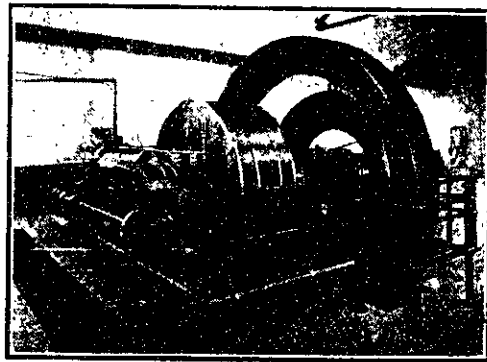
the girls at a little dancing party in the Berkley street house of the association, at the request of the Y. W. secretary who called upon our "Wallie" for help.

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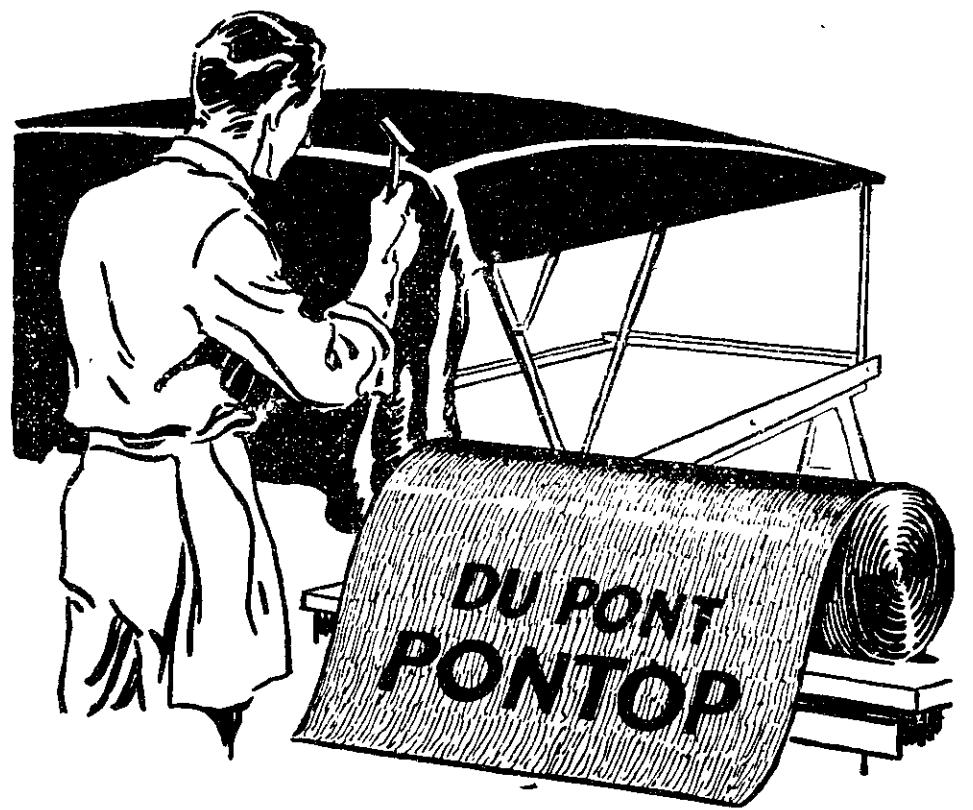


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
