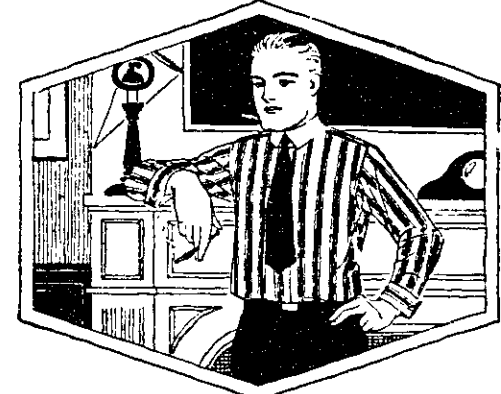
TECHNOLOGY SOCCER

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Initial Call Draws Sixty Men to Boston 'Y' Tank—Time Trials Held for Freshmen This Afternoon

VARSITY VETERANS REPORT

60 Freshmen answered the first call for candidates for the squad and reported for their initial practice at the Boston Y. M. C. A. pool on Huntington Ave. last Monday afternoon at 5 o'clock. This number exceeds that of any other sport. All of the members of last year's varsity team, with the exception of Skinner are back and the new material which has shown up gives every promise of an exceptional team for the coming season. Boyce, the former Yale plunger, has reported and will be eligible this year to compete with the team. Last year he was not eligible for the meets on account of the one year ruling.

So far no coach has been definitely decided upon, but negotiations are underway so this position can be soon filled. S. M. Biddell '22, captain of this year's team has started work by instructing the men reporting for the freshmen squad in starts. The practice today will be devoted to time trials. Regular practice will take place three times a week from 4 to 6 o'clock on Monday, Wednesday and Friday.

Manager R. C. Geckler '22, has arranged a hard schedule for both of the teams for the coming season and one which includes several trips. The following is the tentative schedule as arranged:

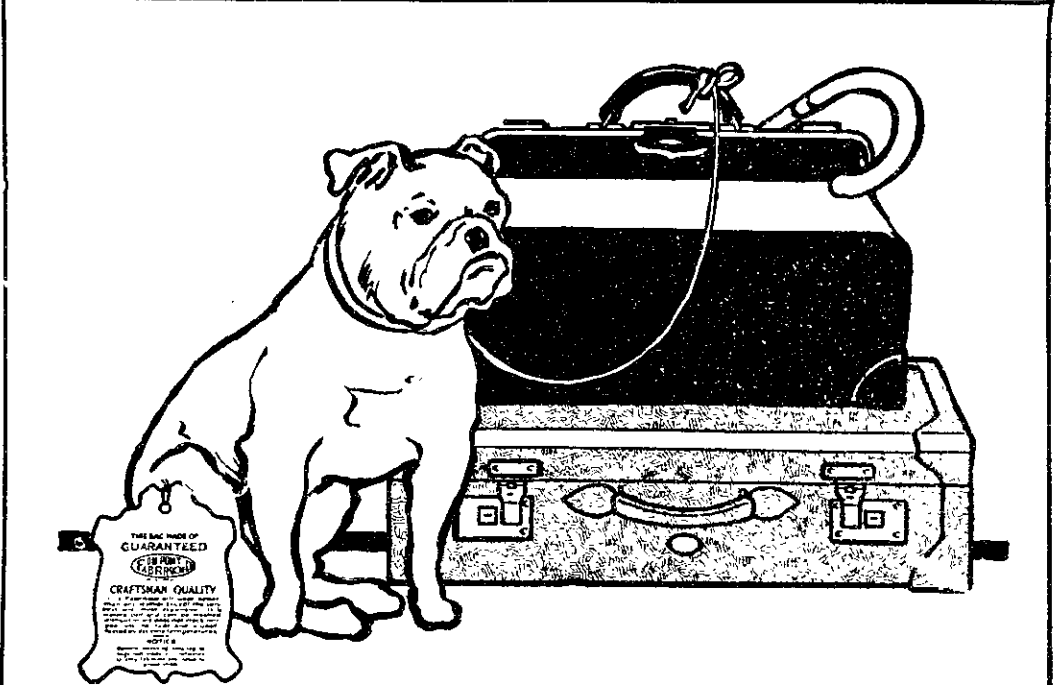

Williamstown, November 11.—Williams will be represented by five veterans and three new men in the annual New England Intercollegiate cross-country run. Although the team will be without the services of H. H. Brown who finished fourth last year when the purple aggregation tied for second place.
