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MOVE FOR SEPARATE TREASURER FOR A. A. RECEIVES APPROVAL

separate treasury came as the culmination of more than three years of agitation on the part of the association. Twenty-four "ayes" and two "noes" were heard on the roll call following R. F. Officer's motion that the M. I. T. A. A. should have a separate treasurer, elected by the A. A. from the Junior or Senior class who shall handle the combined accounts of the various athletic teams, and who shall be responsible to the A. A. and to the finance committee of the Institute Committee, and who shall be ex-officio a member of the budget committee.

Affects Many Present Officers

This is a radical step in Institute organization, relieving as it does the treasurer of the Institute committee from his ex-officio position of treasurer of the M. I. T. A. A. and abolishing the office of undergraduate treasurer. L. W. Conant '21, the treasurer of the Institute Committee, under the old scheme was ex-officio chairman of the budget committee and treasurer of the A. A. By the ruling of yesterday he is shorn of the last position but retains the chairmanship of the budget committee. Winter Dean '21, undergraduate treasurer, loses that position. His office was the financing of athletics, the classes, and the professional societies. The chairman of the finance committee, F. B. Kirtledge '21, is not affected by the changes.

Dr. Rowe at Meeting

The plan in a nutshell is to make the M. I. T. A. A. more independent, it is claimed. The A. A. had expressed a desire for a separate treasurer and at a recent meeting of the advisory council on athletics, brought the matter up for discussion. This body had no jurisdiction and referred it to the Institute Committee. It was taken to the executive committee of the Institute Committee and thence sent back to the undergraduate governing body yesterday.

Dr. A. W. Rowe, secretary of the advisory council on athletics appeared at yesterday's meeting to give the opinion of the body he represented on the matter. He voiced a fear that Officer's plan approached too nearly a graduate manager of athletics. "An undergraduate will have the privileges and prerogatives of a graduate manager without the necessary experience and for this reason we believe it highly inexpedient," he said.

Investigate Ticket Distribution

W. R. Barker '21, chairman of the committee for an intercollegiate conference at Technology outlined plans for a mammoth conference of 45 colleges throughout the East and South. He suggested as a possible date April 23 and 24. The aim of the conference will be to discuss the problems of undergraduate government in student activities. The following have been appointed to assist Barker in arranging for what is not alone a novelty in Institute relations with other colleges, but is also one of the largest undertakings ever contemplated here: Richard McKay '21, H. P. Junod '21, A. W. Skilling '21, D. R. Linsley '22, O. G. Williams '22, and B. Haskell '22.

A motion by I. D. Jakobson '21, chairman of this year's Tech Night Committee, for an investigation of the subject of ticket distribution for future Tech Nights was passed and a committee will be appointed to carry on the investigation.

The executive committee ordered the circulation of athletic schedules held up pending an election of crew manager. The schedules have already been printed and carry R. K. Thulman '22, as manager of crew. The crew manager competition is still going on with L. B. Davis '21 and Thulman the principals.

Dr. Suzzallo's familiarity with local educational problems and conditions was well established when he wrote his thesis on "The History of Education in Massachusetts" for his doctorate of philosophy from Columbia University. Dr. Suzzallo received both the A. M. and the Ph. D. from Columbia. He previously was graduated at the California State Normal School in 1895 and had received a degree from Leland Stanford University in 1899.

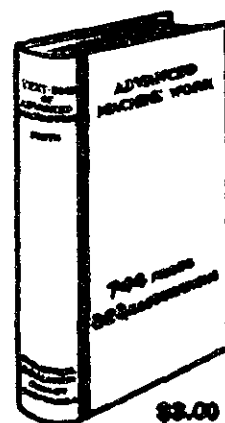

He was professor of education at Leland Stanford University and was a member of the Faculty at the Teachers' College at Columbia. He has been president of the University of Washington for the last five years.

He is a member of several national societies for the study of science and sociology, and education and for the last 10 years has been editor of the "Riverside Educational Monographs."

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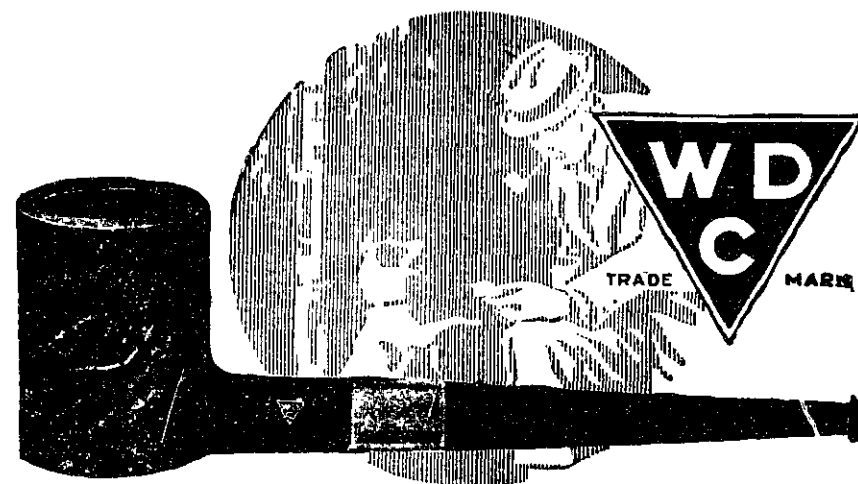
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
