

## DR. SUZZALLO ADDRESSES CONVOCATION IN WALKER

### SAYS EDUCATIONAL METHODS SIMILAR IN EAST AND WEST

Dr. Suzzallo, Speaker at Today's Convocation, Is Authority on Educational Problems and Conditions

#### NORTHWEST NEEDS ENGINEERS

"There is no real difference in the teaching methods employed in the western colleges from those employed here in the East," said Dr. A. Henry Suzzallo, president of the University of Washington, yesterday in his room at the Touraine Hotel. "This may be accounted for by the fact that our faculties are made up to a great extent of men from your eastern schools. Technology is notably represented in many of our schools." Dr. D. L. Webster now at Leland Stanford, is a former Technology Professor.

Dr. Suzzallo, who is to deliver the address at the first Convocation in Walker Memorial this afternoon from 4 to 5 o'clock, arrived in Boston yesterday morning and went immediately to the Touraine. He is here on a business trip, primarily, and although suffering from a hoarse throat—he talked barely above a whisper—he thought that he could recover sufficiently to make the engagement at Walker Memorial today.

### FROSH ELECT TODAY

#### Large Number of Nominees Entered—Polls Close at Five

### FRESHMAN FALLS DEAD IN LOUNGE OF BUILDING 2

#### Lewis Shedlesky '24 Victim of Heart Failure—Use Pulmotor

Lewis Shedlesky '24, died suddenly yesterday morning while studying in the Lounge of Building No. 2. An autopsy will be performed this morning by Dr. David C. Dow, Medical Examiner of Cambridge. He is survived by a father, mother and sister.

While studying he threw his hands over his head and fell from his chair to the floor. He was picked up by some students and carried to the Superintendent's office, where first aid was administered by Miss Broderick. Dr. G. E. Morse was called and artificial respiration was resorted to, but there was no responding pulsation of the heart. After working for two and one-half hours with the pulmotor the doctor pronounced him dead.

Shedlesky was born in Russia in 1899 and came to this country a few years ago with his parents. His home was at 41 1/2 Street, Brockton, Mass. He entered the Institute this fall and was under consideration for a scholarship.

### Raymond Buker of Bates Takes First Honors From Captain MacMahon—Superior Team Work Wins for Institute

#### BATES TAKES SECOND TEAM HONORS

The undefeated Technology cross-country team continued its good work on Saturday winning the championship of New England in the eighth annual run held over the Franklin Park course. The Institute harriers totaled 59 points while Bates, their nearest competitor, scored 81, University of Maine was third with 96, Wesleyan fourth with 108 and Williams fifth with 136. Raymond Buker of Bates defeated Captain William K. MacMahon of the Institute for first place by 15 yards, finishing in 29 minutes 24 3/5 seconds. John W. Crofts of Williams was third, John Doherty of Tufts fourth, R. G. Stimpson of Wesleyan fifth, H. W. Raymond of the University of Maine sixth and Richard Buker of Bates seventh. Arthur Flanders placed eighth, Carol Stone tenth, Bob Hendrie fourteenth and Jack Hennessy twenty-fifth, all of Technology. Bates also finished four men within the first twenty, but the superior team work of the Institute's men, although handicapped by Sanborn being unable to run, brought home the victory.

### CONVOCATION IN WALKER TODAY IS FIRST SINCE WAR

### Professor Pearson Urges All Men to Attend—Administrative Committee Plans Series of Meetings

#### DR. THOMSON WILL PRESIDE

Dr. Suzzallo's talk on the "Working Code of the College Man" this afternoon at 4 o'clock in Walker Memorial will mark the revival of the old and prominent custom of convocations which was discarded during the years when we were at war. However, now that normal conditions have been resumed the Administrative Committee which has entire charge of the arrangements of such meetings, hopes to be able to hold a number of meetings of this character during the coming year. This will be the first meeting of this sort ever held in the Walker Memorial, as the last one, at which our late president Dr. Richard MacLaurin was the speaker, was held in room 10-250.

Dr. Elihu Thomson, acting president of the Institute, has accepted the invitation of the administrative committee to act as chairman and preside at the coming meeting. This is one of the few chances which the student body has of getting into closer touch in a more informal way with the members of the Faculty present and also of seeing the members of the Corporation who can be at the meeting. It is a large mass meeting where all discrimination between the various classes of the Institute is done away with and where everyone gathers to hear, as a rule, some prominent speaker secured by the efforts of the Administrative Committee.

#### No Classes From 4 to 5 O'clock

Speaking of the convocation in his lectures in the Sophomore English and History course, Professor Pearson urged all men to make it a point to be there and to get the spirit of the meeting. He told of the times in the past when convocations were held in the buildings on Boylston Street and of the welcome given the professors upon their entrance into the hall.

The faculty ruling, allowing all men who have 4 to 5 o'clock classes this afternoon to be excused from them on the condition that they attend the meeting, is a step only emphasizing the desire from the Faculty standpoint that as many as possible can from the student body at large be present to make the revival of the custom a memorable one and to encourage future meetings.
