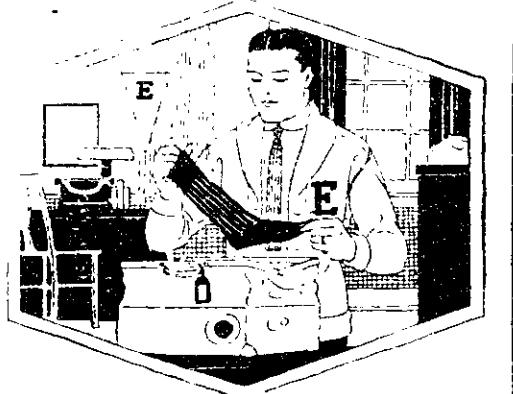
CRIMSON HELD TO TIE IN HARD SOCCER GAME

Harvard is Held to a 1-1 Tie—Hard Wind Makes Play Difficult — Freshmen Lose to Harvard Freshmen 1-0

EXTRA PERIODS PLAYED

Tying the Harvard varsity 1-1, the soccer team more than held its own in actual play Saturday afternoon on Tech Field. The freshmen lost to the Harvard freshmen by a score of 1-0.

In the first period of the varsity game, the course of the ball was unsteady, but it was near the Harvard goal most of the time. Tsui made a long run down the right side of the field, but lost the ball to a Harvard man. Atahualpa, however, stopped the Crimson rush, and kicked the ball from the center of the field to directly in front of the enemy goal. Throughout the half, the Institute had the offensive, with the exception of about five minutes when Harvard took the ball, and held it near Technology's goal. As a result of this attack, Heizer scored on a short kick in front of the goal. After this Souza took a corner kick, but the forwards were not quick enough to take advantage of an opening, and gained nothing. On another play a few minutes later, kicked by Macorra, the ball was lost and taken half way up the field. A third corner kick by



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Tsui resulted in no scoring, but the offensive was held, and again and again the ball was kicked over the goal, striking the posts several times, and once being saved only by quick work on the part of the goal guard.

Atahualpa True To Form

The Engineers lost the ball, however, and Atahualpa had an opportunity to show his defensive work, taking it away from his Crimson opponent, and bringing it up thirty yards. During the last part of the period, he took the ball up several times as far as his position permitted. In the last five minutes of play, Macorra was hurt, and Tange was put in at outside left, Ruiz being moved to inside left.

Institute Scores in Second Half

Throughout the second half the wind was with Harvard and the game seemed more even. The period opened with a long by Ruiz up the left side of the field. He centered near the ten yard line, but no one was near enough the goal to take the play through. Tsui then took the ball up to Kurzman whose kick was over the goal. After the first few minutes the play was in Technology's territory most of the time. A corner kick was taken by Harvard without any gain. A penalty was kicked by Atahualpa. Ruiz made a run of the right side, and toward the goal, but the ball went over the top barely a foot. Stearns stopped a hard drive over his head by a spectacular jump. A penalty called on the Institute accomplished little for Harvard, but near the end of the half, the ball was taken in near the Harvard goal from the left of the field on a long drive, stopped and sent out at the goal. In the close work that followed the ball was passed to Martino which kicked a goal at an easy angle, tying the score.

Freshmen Lose

Two extra periods of five minutes each were played in an attempt to break the tie. At the start, the ball was rushed first to one end and then to the other, going to within a few feet of each goal. A corner kick was called on Technology, but Harvard lost the ball, and at no time was the Technology goal threatened. There was no score throughout the two extra periods.

In the freshman game, the playing was very even. Levi showed good defensive work, and Santos good offensive. Team work on both sides was lacking. It was evident, however, that Harvard had a great advantage in weight and size. During the first half, the Institute had the wind at its back, and the ball was on the Harvard end of the field most of the time. In the second half the Crimson took the offensive, and Byington, the centre forward scored when he took the ball up forty yards and made a long kick from near the center of the field. During the game the T. A. C. cheering section gave the team encouragement.

Practice will begin at once for the game next Friday with Amherst at Amherst and the return game with Worcester Academy on Saturday.

was very fast although it was 2 minutes 22 2-5 seconds slower than the record made by Henigan in the North Dorchester run in 1916. The course varies from year to year and was this time longer than the average. The time for the first lap, approximately two miles, was slow, being more than 13 minutes.

The Run In Detail

After a false start which necessitated another attempt the men were off with Rollins of Mass. Aggies and Stimpson of Wesleyan in the lead. The Technology squad held back and at the large rock which marks the first half mile were running about 3/4 of the group back of the leaders. At this point Captain MacMahon, closely followed by Art Flanders, started to pull up and by the tennis courts was in the lead. Leath of New Hampshire State was among the leaders here but dropped back as the hill was reached near the end of the first lap. As the men climbed the wooded hill and passed the fountain, which is two miles from the start and marks the end of the first lap, John Doherty of Tufts was in the lead with MacMahon second, Crofts of Williams third, Flanders fourth, MacReady of M. A. C. fifth, Hendrie, Technology, was sixth while Stimpson had fallen back to seventh.

Lead Changes

Three-quarters of a mile further Raymond of Maine came up and took the lead, while Baker, the Bates man who finished first, began to pull up bringing with him Stone of Technology. From this point to the end of the second lap, three and a quarter miles from the start, the lead constantly changed with Raymond, Crofts and MacMahon in the fore. Doherty had begun to drop back a bit.

The end of the second lap revealed Raymond leading, MacMahon second, Crofts third, Doherty fourth, Stimpson fifth, Raymond Baker sixth, with Flanders, Stone, Richard Baker and Hendrie close behind. The men in the lead had begun to quicken the pace.

Baker Reveals Sprint

Just before the final straight away was reached MacMahon had taken the lead and as he faced toward the columns he started a sprint in effort to hold it. This awakened Raymond Baker of Bates, who had been holding back, and he put forth such a burst of speed that Billy was soon left behind and after a gallant try, forced to assume second position.

Superior Team Work Wins

The showing of the Technology team was only made possible through excellent team work. Carol Stone ran better than he has ever run before, while the work of Clarence McIntire, who substituted for Sanborn, was especially noticeable. McIntire finished within two men of Leath who was second last year, and ahead of Batten, the fifth man to score on the Bates team.
