Charles H. Hillman—New System Will Be

1921 SHOW GETS EARLY START

About 350 prospective musical comedians attended the Tech Show smoker held in Walker Memorial last Wednesday for the purpose of inaugurating competition for the cast, chorus, ballet, and stage department of Tech Show 1921. The speakers of the evening were Mr. Macomber, the alumni advisor of the show, and Mr. Charles H. Hillman, the coach of this year's show. The heads of the different departments also spoke on the work in their departments. Entertainment from last year's show "Patsy" was interspersed in the program. Cleofan, Patsy and Herbert Tareyton were the characters representing Tech Show 1920.

History of Show Sketched

Mr. Macomber traced the history of Tech Show from its early beginnings and drew many a lesson from past shows. Mr. Hillman, the coach, devoted his talk to a description of the characters of this year's show. Reginald Larston is the leading man while Lucille Hendry, a former show girl, is the leading lady. Lavis, a Bohemienne is the sub-lead. Her husband, Jaynes, the tom, is a minor principal part. Another minor principal part is that of Sylvia Vernon, a professional wild woman. She uses Ger-

DR. SUZZALLO SPEAKS BEFORE STUDENT BODY

Talks on "The Working Code of
The College Man"—First
Since War — Administrative
Committee Attends

DR. ELIHU THOMSON PRESIDES

"We must learn to glorify co-operation as we now glorify liberty," said Dr. A. Henry Suzzallo, president of the University of Washington at the convocation in Walker Memorial Tuesday afternoon. "A leader should not attempt to dominate; he interprets the aspirations of men and must recognize their limitations as to the sacrifices they can make."

"Remember," he went on to say, "It is the hard life which develops leadership. Napoleons were never made at pink teas—they were made at riots in the streets."

Dr. Suzzallo's subject was "The Working Code of the College Man." He emphasized the importance of alternate leadership, saying that one day the college president is the more important factor in life, while the next day the lawyer might be in the ascendancy, while on still another day the plumber would mold the destinies of people. This last brought a hearty response from the audience.

Dr. Elihu Thomson, acting president, presided at the convocation.

Gov. Hugh P. Dorsey of Georgia and Pres. K. G. Matheson of Georgia Tech Are Among 125 Georgians in Party

LABORATORIES WILL BE OPERATED FOR VISITORS

Representative Georgians from every part of the State, including the Governor and his staff, heads of the biggest mills and corporations in the state, leading editors and bankers and newspapermen, who left Georgia last Wednesday on a special train to make a tour of the industrial centers of the north and east from November 17 to 23, arrived in Boston this morning and proceeded directly from the South Station by autos to Technology, where they were welcomed by Professor H. P. Talbot, chairman of the administrative committee.

THE TECH BANQUETS ALL ACTIVITY HEADS

He also gave his experiences while he worked disguised as a laborer, both in this country and abroad. Professor Robinson spoke at some length on the human relations of the engineer.
