ception of a brief afternoon visit to the plant of the Niagara Falls Power Company. On Sunday night the party will leave for Boston and a program as outlined above will be carried out.

At New York a reception by the Mayor, at City Hall in the morning, a tour of the city and a luncheon given by the United Engineering Societies, with the afternoon left open for visiting points of interest and in the evening the annual banquet of the Georgia Society of New York will fill the day's program, the train leaving at midnight for Washington, at which place, on Wednesday, the party will visit the Bureau of Standards, be received at the White House by President Wilson and leave Washington for Atlanta where they will arrive on Thursday, November 25.

Prominent Men Here

The tour, although arranged by the Georgia School of Technology, will be financed personally by the individual members of the party, which includes Hugh P. Dorsey, Governor of the State of Georgia and J. A. Mandeville, President of the Georgia Cotton Manufacturers' Association. Particular care has been taken in picking the men who are to go, as there have been very nearly five hundred applications and the party was limited to one hundred fifty.
