GEORGIANS VISIT INSTITUTE IN JOURNEY OVER COUNTRY

Inspect Testing Laboratories, Wind Tunnel and
Radio Station, All in Full Operation—Prof.
Talbot Conducts Tour of Institute
GOV. COOLIDGE GREETES VISITORS AT LUNCHEON

More than 150 business men from Georgia visited the Institute yesterday. Among them were Gov. Hugh P. Dorsey and Dr. K. G. Matheson, President of the Georgia Institute of Technology, in the interests of which the trip was planned. They spent the morning inspecting the various departments of the Institute, and were the guests of the Institute at a luncheon in Walker Memorial. At the luncheon Governor Coolidge, Vice-President-Elect, gave an address of welcome to Massachusetts as well as to the Institute. Dr. Elihu Thomson, acting President of the Institute, presided at the luncheon.

The party arrived at Technology shortly after nine o'clock and were welcomed by Prof. Talbot. The morning was spent in an extensive inspection of the various departments of the Institute, every department being in operation when the party went through. Among other features were the testing of redwood and concrete in the testing laboratory, the demonstration of a 40 miles an hour wind storm in the wind tunnel, and the sending and receiving of wireless telephone messages at the Radio Society's station. Governor Dorsey spoke into the transmitter.

Reception in Trophy Room
After the trip through Technology, the Georgians were conducted to the Trophy Room in Walker Memorial, where a reception was held. Following this, luncheon was served in the North Hall.

At the luncheon, Dr. Elihu Thomson, Acting President of the Institute, presided. He described the growth of Technology from the size of the old Boylston street location to the present expanded buildings, and of the part played by Mr. George Eastman as the mysterious "Mr. Smith."

Dr. Thomson then introduced Governor Coolidge, Vice President elect. In his speech of welcome, he said, that whatever benefited Georgia would ultimately benefit not only Massachusetts, but the whole Union. He also mentioned that he wanted to see fair prices established, and that by fair prices he meant a reasonable

TECHNOLOGY RUNNERS PLACE THIRD IN 12TH ANNUAL I.C.A.A.A.

Cornell Defeats Princeton for First Honors by
Single Point—Romig of Penn State Is
Individual Winner—Breaks Record

YALE FRESHMEN WIN FAST YEARLING RACE

Technology's crippled cross-country team pulled a pleasant surprise Saturday afternoon when they finished third in the 12th annual I. C. A. A. A. championship run with 90 points. Cornell nosed out Princeton for first place by the narrow margin of one point, 55-56. John Romig, captain of the Penn State team, took first individual honors in the fast time of 33 minutes, 1 second, a new course record. Walter Higgins of Columbia was second and Rogers of Princeton third. The scoring Technology team was as follows: 5-MacMahon, 17-Flanders, 19-Stone, 20-Hendrie and 29-Hennessy. Yale won the freshman race, with Princeton second and Technology seventh. Malcolm Douglas of Yale was the individual winner, his time being 16 minutes, 30 seconds. The run was held over the Yale course.

Ceremony On Armistice Night
Commemorates Death of Henry
Lamy '13, First Technology
Man to Die in War

MR. COPITHORNE READS POEMS

To commemorate the death of Henry Lamy, and other men from Technology who gave their lives in the war, Dean Burton dedicated the Lamey Memorial Fireplace in the Walker Library Thursday night, Nov. 11 at 7.15 o'clock. Members of the class of 1911, who were holding a reunion at the time were present at the dedication, and also some of the undergraduates who had been listening to the reading by Mr. Copithorne.

Those present were prepared for the dedication by the war poems of Mr. Copithorne, and the Dean made a short address, giving the war history of each man killed in action. Although Armistice Day has not been extensively observed this year, Dean Burton said he thought it was the most fitting time to dedicate a monument to the bravery of these men. Henry Lamy was of French descent, a member of the class of 1913 and of the Walker Club. Therefore the place and form of the memorial are very appropriate. The inscription at the top of the fireplace is "In Memory of Henry Lamy" and below, "First Student of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology to Sacrifice his Life in the World War 1914-1918." The andirons were made in the Institute shops, and are ornamented with a fleurs-de-lis at the top, representing the tradition and nobility of Lamy's ancestors. On the two rings at the front of the andirons are the letters R. F. and M. I. T. respectively.

BENCHMARK BOARD MEETS TO CLOSE UP BUSINESS AFFAIRS
