

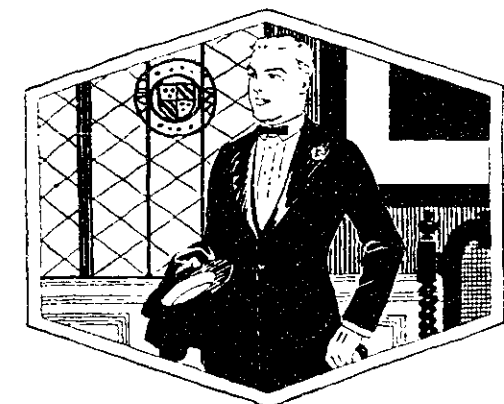
CROSS-COUNTRY TEAM CLOSES SUCCESSFUL SEASON

Johnny Simmons of Syracuse who was a strong contender for first honors sprained his ankle at the five mile mark and was forced to retire from the race. When the accident occurred Simmons was fighting out the second position with Rogers of Princeton. Swede of Princeton was just recovering from a bad leg and ran in fine form finishing seventh.

Freshmen Are Outclassed
The Freshman team representing the Institute was outclassed from the start and although they ran in good form the pace was too fast, and the first man to finish for the Cardinal and Gray, Capt. Bob Spurdle, finishing twenty-fourth. Holt was twenty-eighth and Keck forty-third. R. E. Robertson who had been showing the best form during the season was suffering from the effects of a bad cold



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and finished just in back of Keck. Malcolm Douglas of Yale who finished first was a member of last year's Exeter track team.

AMHERST THE VICTOR

Injury Of Forwards Accounts For One-Sided Score

Amherst defeated the soccer team at Amherst, Friday afternoon by a score of 4-1 in a game which was played by Technology under the most adverse circumstances. Ruiz and Macorra, whose team work had held up the forward line, were both unable to play, due to injuries sustained in practice. It was impossible to take more than eleven men, and as Mason missed the train, the game had to be started with only ten players; the back field was much weakened by his absence.

Amherst Scores Twice

The Amherst team was well trained, had good team work, and its rough aggressive spirit worried the Institute men from the start. Luykx was hurt in the first period, and while he continued to play, the team did not seem to work together so well after that time. Due to these weaknesses, the opposing backs were able to play on the offensive during the entire first half. In spite of this, however, the Engineers took the ball several times to the Amherst goal. At one time there was a very close play when the opposing goal tender had the ball in his hands on the goal line. The men on both teams were pushing him, trying either to get the ball over the line, or to one side. Unfortunately the Amherst men pushed the ball to one side, and it was put in play again. During the first period Amherst scored twice, both times on two-man forward line attacks.

Technology Makes Lone Tally

The second half showed a more even game. Mason had arrived at the end of the first half, and was put in at once at right back. The opponents still gained on their two man rush, by passing the ball first to one of the outside forwards who were both very fast men. They scored once on this play in the second half, and again when one of the Institute backs accidentally kicked in front of the goal, and an Amherst man put the ball through with a short kick. Toward the end of the half Technology made a forward line attack, and on a short drive from the left of the goal, Tsui scored.

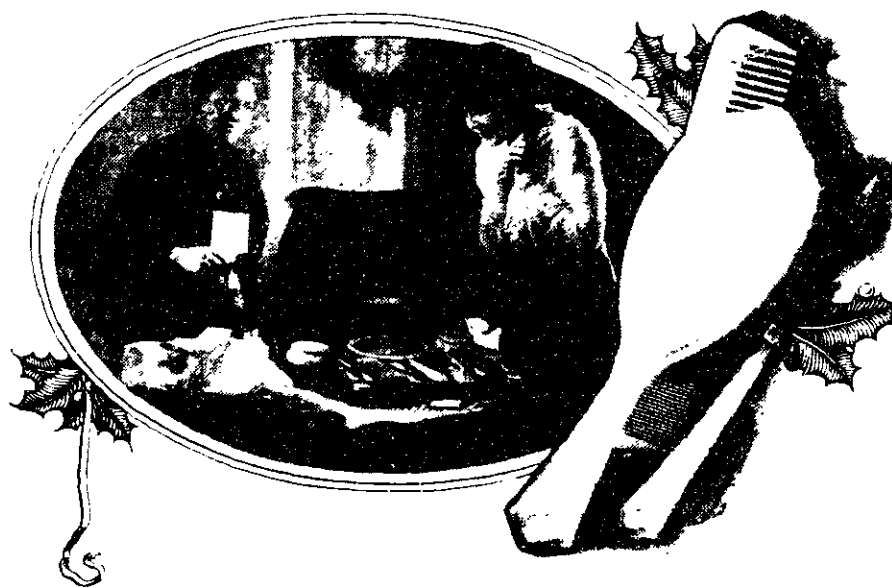
As Thursday, November 25th, is a legal holiday, the exercises of the Institute will be omitted.
