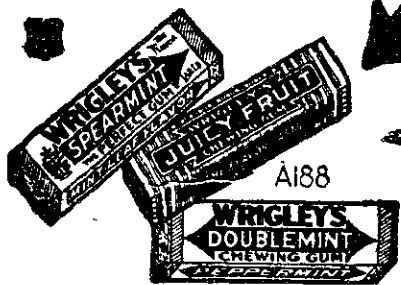

HOCKEY SEASON STARTS

**Candidates Will Be Called Out
Next Week For Practice**

The first call for candidates for the varsity and freshman hockey teams will be made the first of December. After the meeting, where plans for the season will be gone over, the candidates will practice goal-guarding and shooting. Practice will be continued three periods a week until the Christmas vacation, and the squad will go on the ice as soon as the second term begins. Although the hangar at the Institute will be utilized, most of the practice will take place at the Boston Arena, where the home games will be contested.

The schedule for the season is complete, but will not be announced at present. There are hints, however, that a strong Canadian college team will be met in one of the home games. As for the freshman schedule, several fast prep school teams have been added to the games with the regular freshman college teams. Practically all of last year's varsity team has returned to the Institute, and facilities have greatly increased so that one can prophesy bright prospects for the hockey season.

Freshmen candidates for second assistant hockey team manager will be called out November 29th. They will report at the M. I. T. A. A. office in Walker Memorial, at 5 o'clock. Competition will run throughout the winter hockey season, at the end of which time, two first assistant managers will be picked for next season's team.

RADIOS GIVE CONCERT

**Musical Program Rendered to
Georgia Delegation**

One of the many entertaining features tendered the Georgia Delegation was the concert rendered by wireless from the station of the M. I. T. Radio Society. As the last event of the morning program the visitors "listened in" to an extensive musical program rendered over the air by the American Radio Research Corporation of Medford, in addition to the usual chatter of the ships in Boston harbor. Governor H. P. Dorsey of Georgia spoke over the radiophone to the many wireless stations around Boston and expressed his appreciation of the reception tendered to the delegation. He also welcomed the radio world to his home state and to Georgia Tech.

In order to carry out this piece of work the members of the society have installed a Signal Corps telephone set which has a radius of 50 miles, in addition to the regular transmitting equipment of the telegraphic type, with which communication has been established directly with Baltimore, Md. An interesting talk was given the members of the delegation describing the various pieces of equipment, and opportunity was given to all the delegates to use the apparatus. An announcement that messages would be accepted for any state in the Union brought forth 43 messages, several to California which will be relayed through the American Radio Relay League, of which the M. I. T. Radio Society is a member.

The society is conducting a campaign today and tomorrow for more members in order to carry out its activity to a greater degree.

profit for everyone. At the close of Gov. Coolidge's speech, Dr. Thomson remarked that one thing he would have to admit was that on one occasion Georgia was able to turn out a far better eclipse of the Sun, in 1900.

Gov. Dorsey was then introduced, and spoke of the fact that Georgia had been first in the South to have a university, a women's college, and a technology. He was followed by Mayor Quinn of Cambridge.

Pres. Matheson Speaks

Dr. W. H. Walker spoke at length upon the applications of the Tech-

nology Plan. He told of how Georgia Tech and others had followed the plan with more or less success.

Pres. Matheson, of Georgia Tech., said that while doubtless Massachusetts men did not realize what the South was like, still, he doubted whether there was 100 millions of dollars invested in school property all over the South, which is the value of property in schools in Cambridge. Pres. Matheson was associated with the late Pres. MacLaurin during the war, and rendered his tribute of appreciation and admiration for Dr. MacLaurin.

Will Visit New York

After the luncheon, the party went to Harvard for a brief visit, and then went to the Boston City Club, where a dinner was given them under the auspices of the Chamber of Commerce.

After the dinner, the special train in which they have been to Cincinnati, Pittsburg, Buffalo and Niagara Falls, left for New York, where they will be welcomed today by Mayor Hylan. At noon they will be the guests of the United Engineering Societies, and in the evening they will dine at the annual banquet of the Georgia Society of New York.

The train will leave New York at midnight tonight for Washington, D. C.
