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HIGH PRICE OF MEALS IN WALKER IS CAUSED BY WASTEFUL SYSTEM

sometimes there are poor ones. It depends upon the weather to a great extent. Possibly the average for the evening meal is 60 men. During the good weather they will wander up to Central Square, over to Boylston street or even down to the Lenox. Once again the pay roll mounts while the income shrivels. And do not forget that these losses are being made up from the noon meal in the main hall.

The final straw that breaks the camel's back is the Sunday, the Saturday and the holiday meals. Very few men eat at Walker on these days, too few to even consider as other than a pure loss in every possible interpretation. Add to this holiday weeks such as Christmas and the end of the second term and you have a vast list of losses.

Fewer Eat There

One of the immediate corrections for part of the evil is to close north hall, the grill room, and the Faculty room for all meals other than lunches and special dinners when the exact number may be counted on to be present. If this could be done then the burdens of the entire system would not fall on the lunchers each noon.

Another drawback to the management is that they cannot count on a definite number for each meal. This year they are averaging 600 men for lunches as against about 1200 last year at this time. In the loss of this number of men the restaurant cannot hope to overcome the great handicap of other difficulties. The remedy is to have a system of meal tickets good for a week at a certain meal or at certain meals and in this manner the heads could calculate from day to day on the number of men to prepare for. Of course this would entail endless difficulties as some men would want two meals; others would want three meals. And still others would

want a rebate if they did not use up the book each week.

Food is Good Quality

The food is really very good. In spite of all that is said and done, you will have to admit that fact. It is really too good for a hungry bunch of men. What they want is something palatable but above all they want to get filled up, so that when they finish they may lean back with a feeling of contentment instead of a feeling of perfect vacuum. To do this there are 20-cent stews, hashes, and pick-up croquettes that may be made from the second cuts of meat as well as from the choicest slices. A hash tastes just as good from a top round as it does from a prime rib of beef.

But there is no use of going into details for that is an endless task and page after page of figures could be quoted for the statistics of the bureau are very complete and may be examined at any time. The management is trying to do its best to please the men and is perfectly willing to act upon any reasonable request. As far as publicity goes, the management would welcome an investigation by a student committee so that the men may see that Walker service is for their own benefit and that what they will, may be carried out.

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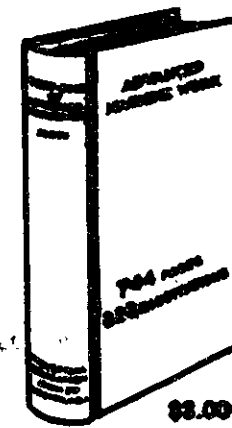
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
