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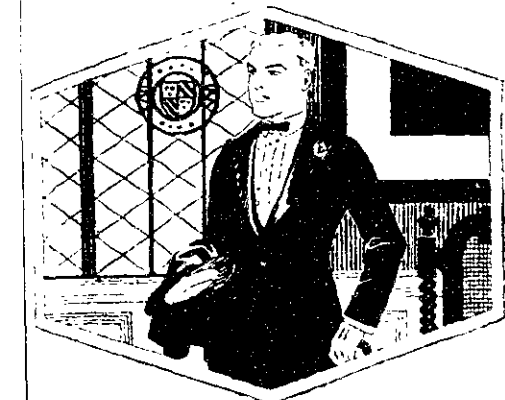

available Saturdays during the fall season. There is, however, one big disadvantage which is noticeable in the Monday idea, namely, the football games attract large crowds which witness the cross-country run and if the run should be changed to a Monday these spectators would not be present. Along this line it might be well to note the fact that a cross-country run is not very spectacular anyway since the men are in sight only a small portion of the race, usually merely the start and finish.

Several of the leading college cross-country teams, including Cornell which won the event this year, have already declared unofficially their approval of the change.

OXFORD WOMAN ENTERS RADCLIFFE TO STUDY BOTANY

Miss E. Philip Smith, one of the few women in the world who has an Oxford degree and one of the first women to receive it, has come to this country for a year's graduate work in botany on a scholarship granted her by Radcliffe and the International Relations Committee of the Association of Collegiate Alumnae. Miss Smith studied for a year at Edinburgh University where she took class medals in chemistry and botany. Last June she passed her examinations for an Honors Degree at Oxford, completing a three years' scientific course. Not until October, however, did Oxford decide to grant degrees to women. Miss E. Philip Smith was among the first fifty to receive the A. B. She wanted her A. B. to take to America with her so, as she says: "By representing the urgency of my case very strongly to the authorities I succeeded in being included among the first fifty women to get the Oxford degree."

Miss Smith is particularly interested in the study of plants causing skin diseases and in the botanical aspects of hay fever. She has published "Pollinosis" in the Journal of Botany for February, 1920 and "Plant Dermatitis" in the Journal of Botany, May and July, 1920. She is very much interested in writing, has had short stories published in a number of English magazines and is planning to write some letters on Harvard and Radcliffe for the Oxford Magazine. She has come to the United States not merely to study botany but because she wants to see at first hand what sort of a place America is.

PLANS INTERCOLLEGIATE RADIO NEWS ASSOCIATION

The bi-weekly exchange of news of intercollegiate interest by radio is the aim of the M. I. T. Radio Society, which was appointed organizer of the Intercollegiate Radio News Association at a meeting of the American Radio Relay League. INSTITUTE ARMY OFFICERS WILL ATTEND BOSTON HO

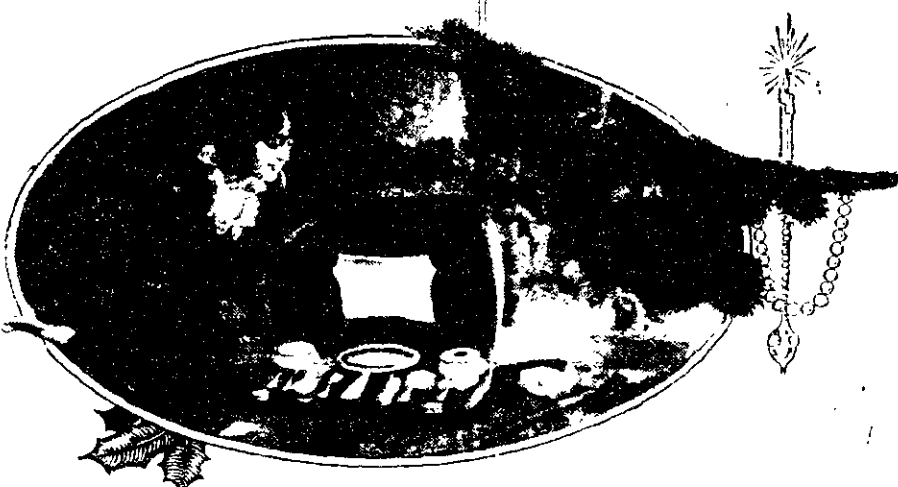
