DO WELFARE WORK

Institute Men Engage in Industrial Social Service

Following the visit to the Institute of F. H. Rindge, Jr., on October 20 and 21, when he addressed a total of 1534 students in 18 talks on "Human Engineering", 18 undergraduates engaged upon welfare work, for the most part among foreigners.

This form of industrial service consists in the teaching of English and other subjects to foreigners, the formation of boys' clubs and the provision of entertainment at social gatherings of the Y. M. C. A. branches and kindred organizations.

The work is carried out through the T. C. A. and the industrial service committee consisting of George Schumaker '22, chairman; Professor R. E. Wilson, C. Chatham '21, J. Plimpton '22, M. J. First '22, F. Stapleton '24, and Pierce '23.

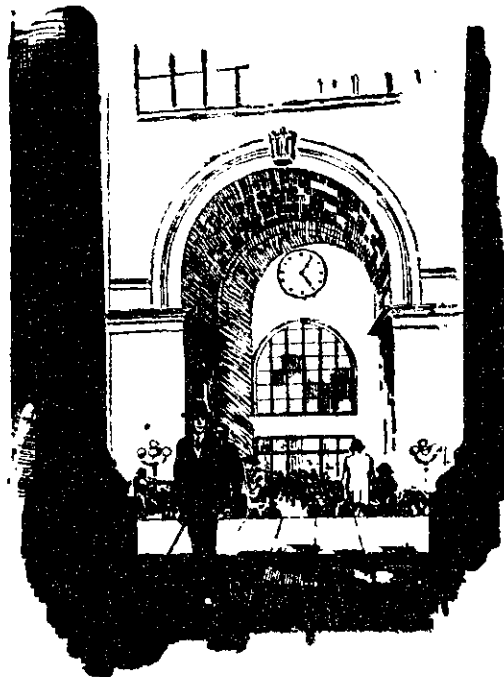

HARD-HEADED ENGINEERS SEEK WISDOM OF PLATO

Part of the training which is offered to the students of the Co-operative Electrical Engineering course while they are at Lynn, is an opportunity for becoming acquainted with non-technical literature. Although the list of recommended books contains the best of the Greek and Latin classics, Victor Hugo, Turgenev and selected writers of our 20th century, there was a request that Plato's works be included. Thus, while the experience which the students are obtaining is intensely practical, their reading is just as intensely humanistic. Approximately one-third of the class comes from other institutions such as Yale, Colgate and Annapolis, and several already hold degrees. Students of this calibre need little warning as to the danger of dis regarding the cultural.

In continuance of the policy of making the course as practical as possible even on the literary side, arrangements are being made for a lecture before these men on "Writing For The Press", by the editor of a Boston paper. Reports of this lecture are to be made by the students and turned over to the editor to be judged in terms of their acceptability for his newspaper. If the engineer is to make his influence felt in his community he should be able to place his ideas before the public in an effective manner. There is no better medium for this expression of himself than the local press.

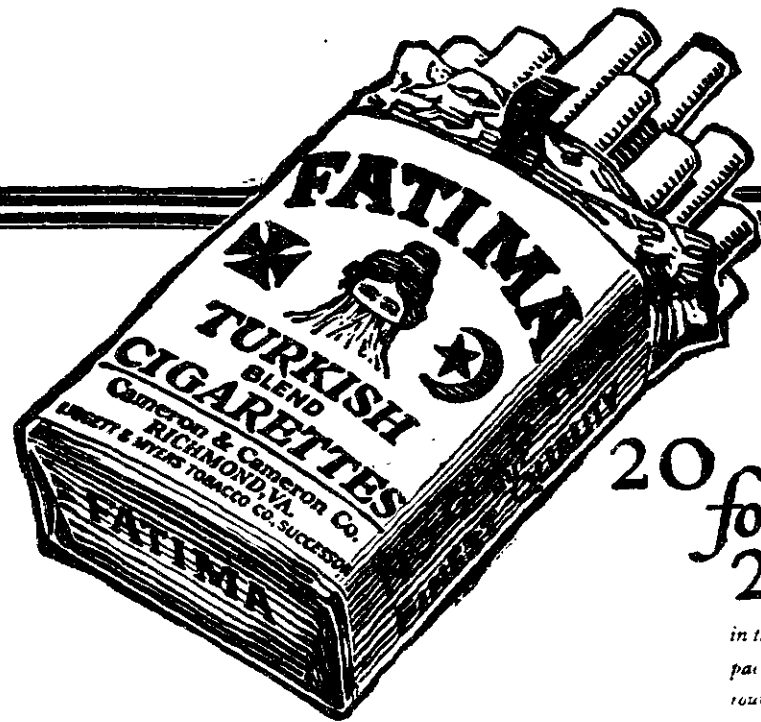
