Vadner '22, editor-in-chief; Bernard Gasser '22, business manager and A. J. Browning '22, managing editor. J. H. Flather '22, was appointed Director of Room Registry and G. S. Schumaker '22, was placed in charge of the Industrial Service Committee.

Vadner who comes from Salt Lake City, was editor of last year's handbook and Gasser whose home is in Richmond, Va., was assistant editor last year, having won the managerial competition. Browning who claims Blackfoot, Idaho, as his residence is night editor on THE TECH.

The T. C. A. handbook, or Tech bible is issued annually and distributed in the fall to the entering class and the student body. This year it is estimated that 2,000 copies will be printed and be ready for distribution next fall. It gives the list of student activities; class officers; the four principal Tech songs; a list of churches in greater Boston; the fraternities; the T. C. A. constitution and explains the point system.

J. H. Flather '22, who is in charge of the Room Registry estimates that at least 1,500 rooms will have to be investigated for next year and work will be started after the Christmas recess.

Competitions for position on the editorial and business staffs will be started immediately after the opening of the second term.

CHIPPIE GAW WILL COACH HOCKEY TEAM

Well Known Athlete Signed to
Instruct Puck-chasers—Second

LARGE SQUAD TURNS OUT

The services of George "Chippie" Gaw have been secured as coach of the M. I. T. hockey team. This was announced last night at the first meeting of the candidates. About forty men turned out for the meeting of which number fifteen were freshmen. Manager Vilett '22 and Captain J. DuVernet addressed the men and outlined plans for the season.

Gaw has had considerable experience both in coaching and in playing hockey since his graduation from Newton High School. At Newton he played on the hockey team and pitched for the baseball team, later signing up with the Chicago Cubs. Last year Gaw coached the crack Ponfret School team. The coach supervised practice which was held in the airplane hangar on Wednesday. It is not likely that the team will get on the ice before the beginning of the second term unless it is cold enough to provide a skating surface.

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PLAN SPECIAL TRAIN TO NEW YORK FOR THE 20th

AIR SERVICE UNIT PLANS TAKE SHAPE

Seniors May Enter Course Now—Many Phases of Aeronautical Work Developed by Lectures at A. E. S. Smoker

MANAGING BOARD CHOSEN

According to plans for the proposed air service unit at Technology, which were outlined on Tuesday evening at the smoker of the Aeronautical Engineering Society, a remarkable opportunity is open at present to Seniors who desire to obtain a reserve officer's commission in the army or to receive instruction in flying.

According to the system which will go into effect if an air service unit is established here, a two year regulation R. O. T. C. course will be required before a man can specialize in aeronautical work, and then, two years' work in the air service unit, spending a total of three hours a week during the school year upon aeronautical and military subjects, and six weeks at a summer camp or flying school before receiving a reserve officer's commission. Active service, not exceeding six months, will then be required before retiring with a reserve officer's commission or a commission in the regular army.

Good Only This Term
However, at the present time, those members of the Class of 1921 who desire to enter the unit will be able to do so, and will be required to take three hours a week, one hour class room work and the remainder preparation, until June, and spend six weeks this summer at flying school in order to be commissioned as a second lieutenant in the Reserve. PLAN FORMATION OF CLUB FOR DARTMOUTH MEN HERE

There will be a meeting of all former Dartmouth men at the Institute whether graduates, undergraduates, or former faculty members, with the idea of starting a Dartmouth Club at Technology, in the Walker Library at 5 o'clock Wednesday, December 8. There are 30 or more men from the college now at the Institute and the need of such an organization has been felt for some time; the present move for the formation of the club was begun by Wallie Ross, Dartmouth '09, Secretary of the T. C. A.

All men from Craven Laycock's School for Boys are urged to attend and meet the other Dartmouth men here. A permanent organization will be formed, which will be the first Dartmouth Club at any other school or college.

At the final meeting of the Advisory Council for this term, held Wednesday evening at the Engineer's Club on Commonwealth Avenue, the passing of a motion to slightly lower the bars for insignia awards to cross country men, the final approval of the A. A. plans for a separate treasurer, and the discussion and action concerning the securing of a graduate manager were the main points of interest passed upon.

A letter of Major Briggs was referred to, concerning our very stringent rules of insignia awards, and the question was brought before the council as regards the advisability of making these a bit more lenient. The matter was considered from all sides and Mr. George Brown of the B. A. A., who was present at the meeting as a visitor, when asked concerning his idea, expressed his belief that in the present form the rules were much too strict. At present any man to win his "T" must place twelfth or better in the I. C. A. A. A. A. or fifth place or better in the N. E. I. C. A. A. meets. Finally a motion was passed to the following effect: That a man to win his "T" must be one of the first 15 per cent of the number of starters in the I. C. A. A. A. A. or one of the first 10 percent in the N. E. I. C. A. A. That is 10 or 15 percent of the number of starters is taken as the case may be, and the man must place 90 percent or better than the others to win his "T."
