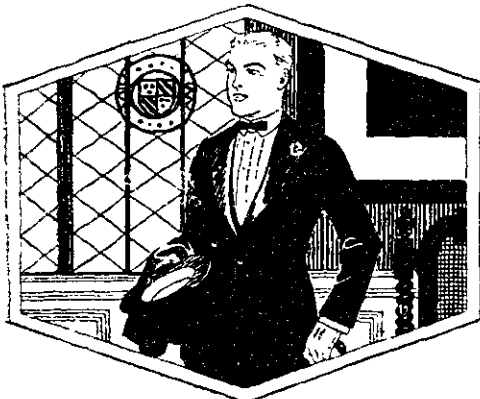

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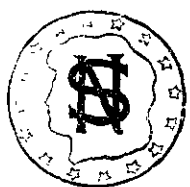

tion of the new treasurer. It was with little discussion that the approval of the additions to the constitutions was secured and also of that part of the by-laws referring to the Executive Committee which is a new feature in the A. A. organization. But that part of the by-laws referring to the duties of the newly elected treasurer gave the council a chance to wield their blue pencils in great style. The interpretation of the phraseology of the various sections brought forth discussion. The intended meaning of the sections was often mistaken by the graduate advisors but after explanation and evidences of efficiency, most of the sections were passed.

Motion Defeated

It was explained at this time by Dr. Rowe, Secretary of the Advisory Council that the tendency in the past year had been toward a graduate manager of athletics. Quite abruptly to be sure Dr. Rowe put this in the form of a motion, after the consideration for some time of an article referring the power of the Treasurer to "approve all contracts." It was meant by the framers of this section that the article would permit a check on the managers of the various teams and with the experience of a treasurer familiar with contracts, assure there would be in the future no leaky or indefinite contracts with coaches, and also that the managers are not running over their budget for meets and coaches as outlined at the first of the year.

Dr. Rowe immediately took up the illegality of having the treasurer sign it and therefore to make it legal to secure a graduate treasurer to handle athletics. He thought that this was evidence that the undergraduates were discouraged with their own management, although he praised the work they had done. After some discussion on the subject, and the proving of the scheme to be financially impossible and still keep up the various teams, his motion was defeated. Finally the blanket article referring to the power of the treasurer to supervise all athletic expendi-

tures was entirely erased from the list.

Teams Report Financial Status

A report from the Rifle Team on the financial status of the team was read and discussed. Manager Johnson told of the expenses incurred by himself and his team-mates and of the budget submitted this year. However his report was laid on the table to be referred to the Budget Committee for further action.

The meeting was brought to a close after a report from both the basketball team and the soccer team was read.

tion and Faculty of the Institute with the necessity of establishing an undergraduate course in aeronautics.

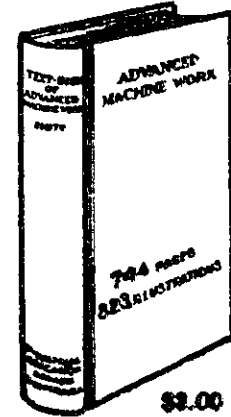
