THE MAIL SYSTEM AT THE INSTITUTE

OF late there have been many complaints from students concerning the delivery of mail addressed to them at the Institute. Comment has been made of the large number of mistakes which have been made in forwarding mail, and of the alleged inefficiency of the department. A large part of the trouble is due to the disinterested attitude of students in keeping their address cards up to date, and it is also due to the fact that students fail to notify the superintendent's office as to the disposition of their mail. Changes made on address cards should be made in duplicate, otherwise the mail department will receive no notification of the fact. If no instruction as to the forwarding of letters is left, lists of those remaining unclaimed will be published periodically, and men should consult these lists frequently.

MOTORISTS, ATTENTION

THE number of men who come to the Institute in automobiles has increased greatly in the last few years and at present there are many machines parked here daily. We have observed that very little system is shown in the manner of parking at the Massachusetts Avenue entrance, machines being left in all places and positions. It frequently happens that when a man comes out and wishes to drive away he finds that he is completely surrounded by other machines whose owners have been too careless to think of other people. If the men with machines would be careful in parking them, form definite lines, leave plenty of room for the other fellow, and use a little system such as they would be required to do in most parking spaces, it would not only benefit everyone concerned, but would also improve the appearance of the grounds.

LOST ARTICLES

UNFORTUNATELY it seems to have become necessary to remind the students that all lost articles on being found are supposed to be turned in at the office of the superintendent of buildings, where they will be kept until called for, and the owner notified if possible. Of late there have been many articles lost which have never again come to light, and it is to be hoped that in the future these articles will be returned rather than retained under the law of 'Findings is keepings'!

Arthur M. Waitt '79, a noted engineer in New York, died at his home in Sharon, Connecticut, after an illness of a few weeks. He received his B.S. degree in Mechanical Engineering at Technology in 1879.

Mr. Waitt served with the New York Central Railroad for 25 years, during which time he was made a member of the electrical traction commission which planned the electrification of the railroad. For the past decade he was a consulting engineer with offices in New York and was well known in engineering circles of the metropolis. He was a member of the New York Railroad Club, American Society of Mechanical Engineers, St. Louis Railroad Club, Hartford Club and a number of other organizations. He is survived by his wife and one son, Weyner H. Waitt.

12 JOBS AVAILABLE NOW IN INDUSTRIAL SOCIAL SERVICE

T. A. C. Calls for More Students to Aid in Work

At the present time, in connection with the program of industrial social service carried on through the T. A. C., there are 12 jobs available for Institute men in this field. They are the following: At the Denison House, 93 Tyler St., Boston, three men are wanted to teach English to Armenians and Syrians at 8 P.M. on Wednesdays; at the Brighton Community House, 31 Lincoln St., Boston, two men to man boys' clubs are needed evenings; the Women's Municipal League, 25 Huntington Ave., Boston, wishes two men to serve on a committee of Armenians, aiding them in their discussions of their problems in America, at meetings Tuesday at 4:30 o'clock; three men may assist in boys' work Mondays at the Cambridge Neighborhood House, Harvard and Moore St.; one man to tutor a boy in French two hours a week is wanted by the Cambridge Y. M. C. A.; while at the Railroad Y. M. C. A. in Chelsea a man is needed to instruct 18 or 20 Poles in English, between 12:20 and 12:40 o'clock two days a week.
