Elimination Bouts to Determine Boxing Team

Boxing trials will be held in the Walker Gym, December 9, from four to six. All men who are going to try for the team should hand their names and the class they wish to fight in, to either Captain Addicks or Manager Greenwalt. Two pounds overweight will be allowed in each class. These will be the final tryouts to pick the men for the first trip, which will come some time in January.

T. Barnard, a last year's man, has shown much improvement and will probably get the 115 pound class. The 125 pound class will be a match between Bresh, a former Georgia Tech champion, and Fritz Paul, who boxed on Technology's team last year. Both these men are trying for a lower class than they boxed in before, both of them having boxed in the 135 pound class last year. A. L. Addicks, on the other hand, formerly a 125 pound man, is stepping up a class and will box in the 135 pound class. The 145 pound class will have to be filled from the new men, and Longmaid and Warren are the two most likely candidates. Reeves is good in the 175 pound class and T. Broctor in the heavyweight class.

HOCKEY NEEDS MEN
Coach Gaw Starts to Mold Puck Chasers into Crack Team

More men are needed for hockey. Coach Chippie Gaw has found the quality of the 40 candidates all to the good but the quantity is not satisfactory. Captain John DuVernet has announced that he wants the squad cut this week at three o'clock Tuesday and Thursday and at one o'clock on Saturday in the hangar. New men will report there to the coach. Freshmen may substitute hockey for physical training during the next term if they report to Mr. Kanaly at his office in Walker before December 15.

In order to condition the men short work-outs on the track or a little soccer are planned. However, at present the coach has been giving the men his personal attention in shooting. He is strongly in favor of this practice so that all the men will be able to shoot fairly accurately before getting on the ice. Most of the candidates know the fundamentals of the art and Gaw is showing them the tricks and fine points that help to cage the puck.

Ted Schwamb '22 and H. C. Gayley '22 have been holding down the cage positions. Both have been working overtime so there is ample opportunity for any other good goal material to get some practice. Goal pads have been secured and new candidates will be outfitted.

Coach Gaw is particularly anxious to have some more fast forwards. He wants to develop a good shooting outfit that will work together. By conditioning the men and giving them the feel of the puck he hopes to have a team that can play as soon as it gets on the ice. Teamwork will be developed there.

Practice will be held until December 13 when examinations will stop the work. Captain DuVernet will have practice on ice during the holidays if the weather is kind enough to supply it.

PLAN TO REPORT ON T. A. C. AND M.I.T.A.A. ON THURSDAY

The work of the committee investigating the T. A. C. and M. I. T. A. A. is well underway. ANNOUNCE RELAY MEN ON NEW INDOOR LISTS

Chittick '22 Fastest of Baton Passers in Spite of Injured Tendon—Men to Run Outdoor Distances

PLAN 1921 CROSS-COUNTRY

Lists of the varsity and freshman first string relay candidates for the indoor track season, were released yesterday by Coach Frank Kanaly. These lists are tentative and will be changed after the trials the first of which come on next Saturday. Yardley Chittick '22 in spite of pulling a tendon in his left leg, during the second lap of the day, covering the 300 yards in the fast time of 34 seconds flat. Chittick's injury will probably keep him out of training until after Christmas. The fastest freshman time was made by Rowe.

The lists of men who are retained on the first string are as follows:

New Indoor Distances

The relays this year will be run during the meets in the new Boston Arena and since the track there is 12 laps to the mile the relays will be 440 and 880 yards per man respectively of the former indoor distances of 330 and 780 yards. The indoor distances will accordingly hereafter correspond to the ones run outdoors in the spring.

Cross-Country Men Meet

Two meetings were held yesterday afternoon in room 10-267 for all men interested in cross-country and distance running. The meetings were called by Captain-elect Sanborn who presided at one and addressed the men. Retiring-Captain MacMahon addressed the other meeting. They spoke on the necessity of all men interested in cross-country starting training in the spring and keeping in shape during the summer in order to be in good form when the fall season opens. Coach Kanaly spoke at both of the meetings and pointed out that Technology had the chance to produce a championship team in 1921 if the men trained consistently. He also said that a large number of stars from the other colleges would graduate in the spring and be unable to compete next year.

TEAM CHOSEN TENTATIVELY—PRINCETON MEET CANCELLED

Temporary choice of the swimming team has been made both in the varsity and freshman squads, in order that the pictures may be taken this week. After the pictures it is doubtful if any changes will be made, except in the cases of a few men who have been unable to come out this term.

Notice was received this week from Princeton that the meet with them which was pending will have to be cancelled.

Practice has been held three times a week regularly, and the two groups under Coach Holm, and Captain Biddell have shown well as to form. Less attention has been paid to speed, and not enough time trials have been to get any definite idea of the relative speed of the men.

Manager Geckler and Assistant Manager Meech have been unable to attend practice this week, due to sickness.

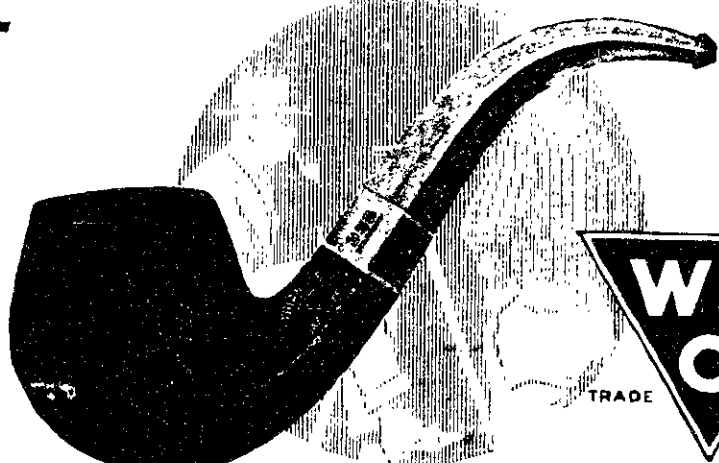
Figures given out by the Yale Athletic Association show that \$400,000 was taken in by Yale on football alone, of which \$235,000 was from the Yale-Harvard game.

Sophomores and freshmen are eligible for the first and second assistant hockey manager competitions just opening. The competitions will last until the end of this season when

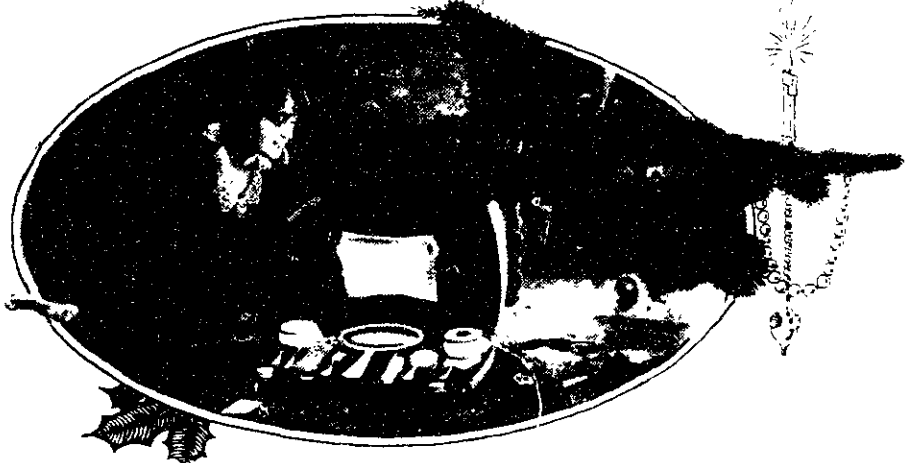
