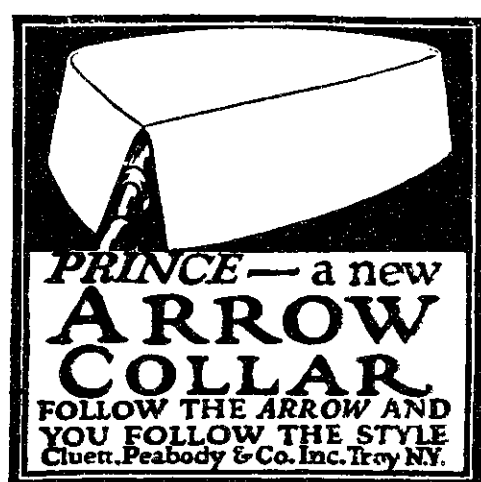

INSTITUTE COMMITTEE AMENDS THREE BY-LAWS

disapprove of this expenditure as it seems fit. No Student Tax money shall be spent by undergraduates until such expenditures have been approved by the Budget Committee.

"It shall submit copies of all approved budgets of undergraduate organizations spending Student Tax money, to the Chairman of the Finance Committee, and also shall submit copies of all approved budgets of athletic organizations spending Student Tax money, to the Treasurer of the M. I. T. A. A."

Section 10 of Article V shall be revised by the addition of the following sentence at the beginning of paragraph 2: "It shall be the duty of the Finance Committee to make sure that all money appropriated by the Budget Committee is disbursed as allotted." Also, that phrase at the beginning of paragraph 2 reading, "the Committee shall have the power" be struck out and the following substituted in its place: "It shall also be the duty of the Committee."

The following shall be inserted as Section 6 of Article VI: "No one shall be allowed to resign from an office received by virtue of a popular election in order to hold a subsequent position obtained in a like manner."

The motion made by W. G. Loesch '21, to put a curb upon future entertainments held in Walker Memorial was also passed at this meeting. The absentees were: F. O. Billings '23, J. W. Church '22, D. B. McGuire '21, G. W. Pollock '21, A. D. Harvey '21, and W. H. Young '21.

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NO VACATION FOR W. M. ROSS AND CO.

T. C. A. Office Open During
Holiday Season to Get Ready
For Solicitation of Alumni
And Parents

WANT SECOND TERM BOOKS

Neither exams nor vacations will succeed in weighing down the portcullis at the office of the Technology Christian Association. Wallie Ross and his stenographer will keep the portals wide open all through the holidays.

Vacation time and its accompanying departure of students will give the T.C.A. an opportunity to do a little work among the alumni of the Institute and the parents of the students here. Preparatory to a canvass of alumni and students' parents for money, the T.C.A. will be busy getting ready letters and other appurtenances to a successful campaign.

New Statement Ready

As was the case in the canvass of students here this fall, the T.C.A. will not conduct a "drive" for money. The association abhors the word. Rather it is a presentation to the alumni and parents of students of an opportunity to assist financially in the work of the Technology Christian Association.

Mr. Ross has brought up to date his facts on service rendered by the T. C. A. and is prepared to set before his prospective contributors a full statement of just what the T.C.A. is doing here at the Institute in the way of helping students.

The facts are bare, untrimmed. The "1300 men furnished with rooms," does not tell the story of the students who are not satisfied with a room they pick themselves, and being far from home, sometimes even farther than a letter will reach, find in the T.C.A. an opportunity for personal advice which augments most splendidly in some cases a mere list of rooms.

Jobs Are Scarce

While the major portion of the T. C. A. business during vacation will be concerned with getting ready for the money canvass, the problem of getting holiday jobs for men who have to stay at school during the holidays will be met by the association.

The undergraduate employment bureau is not holding office hours during vacation and Mr. Ross has taken over the work. The bureau has been experiencing considerable difficulty of late in finding enough jobs for the number of men who want work. Due to the fact that the number of jobs is less than last year on account of short-time operations of factories everywhere, the business of getting positions for men has been a very difficult proposition.

Men have already come into the T.C.A. office looking for books for their next term's work and the association extends an appeal to students for books that will be used during the second term, in any course or year.

While your reporter was in the T.C.A. office a man came in to collect money for books that the association had sold for him but instead of taking the money he told Mr. Ross that he would donate the sum to the T.C.A.

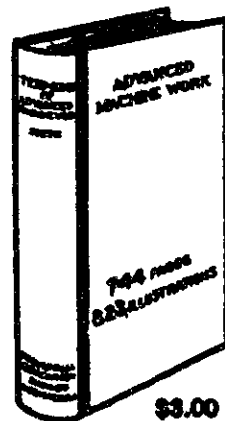
