Clubs Are in Fine Shape after
Trip—Dance to Be Limited
To 400 Couples—Concert Be-
gins at 8:15 O'clock

SIGNUPS ON SALE WEDNESDAY

Signups for the Winter Concert of the Musical Clubs will go on sale Wednesday, January 12, at noon in the main lobby. With the return of the clubs from their trip, they hope to run off the best concert ever held at Technology. It will be held at the Copley Plaza on Friday evening, January 28. Reisman's orchestra of fifteen pieces will furnish the music for the dance, this being the same orchestra as played at the Prom last year. Of course, Reisman himself will be present.

The signups will be sold at \$2.00 apiece and will be redeemed on Wednesday, January 19, for \$3.00 more in the main lobby. The limit has been placed at 400 couples and all seats will be reserved. Last year the signups for all the 300 seats were sold in the first hour and a half of sale, so all men are advised to get in line early. The concert will begin at 8:15 o'clock sharp and will last till about 10 o'clock. The dancers will then take possession of the floor and may tiddle till 2 o'clock.

CORPORATION XV HAS THREE NEW OFFICERS

H. H. MORSE DISCUSSES EXPORTS

D. D. Spoor '22, was elected president of Corporation XV at a meeting held in north hall last night. Spoor is circulation manager of the Tech Engineering News, president of the California Club, a member of the musical clubs, and a Junior member of the board of Corporation XV. L. W. Conant '21, who retired as president because he was over-pointed, was elected to fill the position of Senior member of the board made vacant by the resignation of A. W. Norton '21. Both positions of Junior board members were opened by the election of Spoor as president, and the resignation of G. W. Alder '22, because of being over-pointed. E. R. Baldrige '22, and R. H. Brown '22, were elected to these positions.

The first business of the meeting was in regard to the issue of the stock certificates. Ex-President Conant explained in brief the work of the officers of Corporation XV, to have it re-organized as a stock-issuing corporation, holding a charter from the State. The charter permits the capital stock to be issued up to the amount of \$10,000.00, each share assessable at the rate of \$1.50 a year until graduation, when the stock is "Paid-Up." The stockholders voted to accept the new certificates.

H. H. Morse, manager of the export department of The Regal Shoe Company of Boston, and chairman of the Boston Export Board Table, spoke on exporting, using as his subject, "Merchandising Goods in Foreign Lands." He pointed out that the United States was at the cross-roads of foreign trade, and explained methods of conducting and developing foreign trade.

On the other hand, the college union committee cares not to take it over, so it will remain closed.

Rehearsals Under Way

The costumes will be designed by the co-eds at the Institute. They are being rapidly completed due to hard work put in during the Christmas recess.

First tryouts for the ballet will be held next Monday afternoon at 5 o'clock in the gymnasium. The management has been successful in retaining the services of Miss Virginia Tanner who will coach the aspirants. Miss Tanner needs no introduction to Institute men as she has coached the ballet for several former Tech Shows.

Rehearsals for the cast are being conducted along a different method than in the past. The men are divided into groups which rehearse together once a week and the whole cast holds a rehearsal twice a week.

The scenery which is a necessity for every good musical comedy is rapidly taking form and will be due Saturday, January 15.

King's College arrived in Boston Wednesday afternoon and worked out at the Arena at noon that day. The Institute team and King's both got in their final session yesterday noon when each had a chance to give the other the once over. Six-man hockey will be played.

The Institute lineup was determined Wednesday night by Coach Gaw following practice. When the teams agreed on six men, Charley Grant, the former Melrose High captain and last year's freshman star was shifted from the rover position out onto right wing. The forward line now consists of Grant, Dan MacNeil at center, and Arnold Taylor at left wing. Captain DuVernet will play cover point, Neil MacNeil point and Hugh Nickle will play goal.

Two Veterans Start

This is the strangest combination Technology could present against the visitors and represents a very formidable array of hockey talent. The final lineup was in doubt until Wednesday night's practice was finished and even then it required a conference of Gaw and DuVernet to pick the six best men.

The Institute team is well fortified with substitutes and it is almost certain that the six starters will not go through the game. Of those who start the game tonight, only two were on the varsity hockey team last year—Dan MacNeil, last year's captain and John N. DuVernet, this year's leader.

MacNeil at center is in great form and will take a particular delight in pinning a defeat on his compatriots from the Northland in tonight's tussle.

Eleven Visitors Here

Grant and Taylor, in the wing positions, have displaced Delany and Thomas, two veterans of last year. It was expected that Bill Cauldwell would be at his old position of point to start tonight's fray but Neil MacNeil has ousted him. Hugh Nickle draws the net-tending job, having won it from a horde of competitors, chief among whom were Denton Massey of last year's freshman team and Ted Schwamb last year's goal tend. Nickle is a Canadian and pushes them away from the meshes like an oilskin does the rain-drops.

The Canadians brought down eleven men. After the game with Technology tonight they play Harvard at the Arena on Saturday night. The cooler weather in their country has made it possible for them to get a much earlier start than was possible in these parts with the result they have been on the ice now for six weeks
