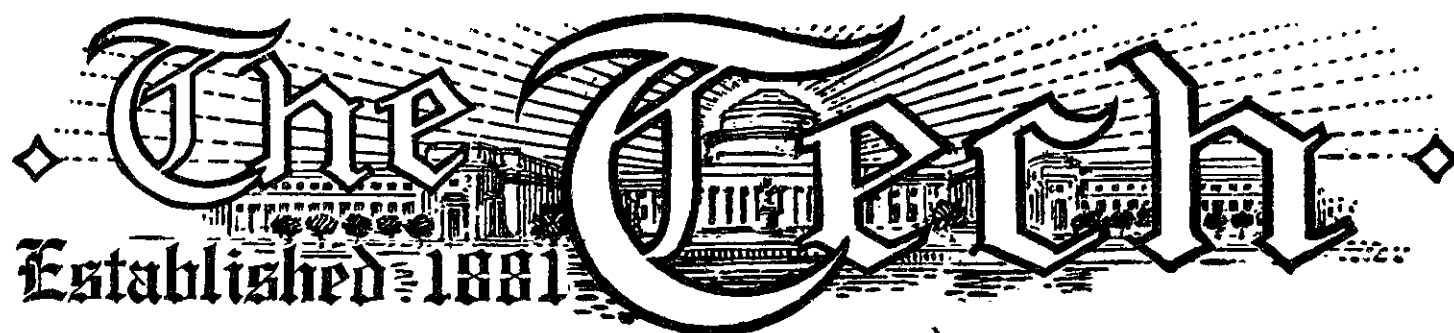

TONON NAMED TEMPORARY CAPTAIN

For the first time in nearly ten years the Cardinal and Gray colors will be seen in a varsity basketball game Saturday, when the Institute quintet clashes with the Rhode Island State College five in the Walker Memorial gym. Following the varsity clash the freshmen open their season against the Tabor Academy team.

Coach Dutch Ayer gave his charges a stiff workout last night with an eye to picking the team, and in a talk to the men after practice expressed himself as dissatisfied with their showing. He told the men that they were not showing enough pep, and gave them a general rebuke. As a result of the practice the lineup which had been formulated as the varsity lineup will probably undergo a few changes at the hands of Coach Ayer.

Ayer believes that he has the men to make up a championship team, but finds that trouble over which men he can use and eligibility troubles complicate his problem of selecting a team. One of the candidates whose work has pleased Coach Ayer is under an ineligibility shadow, due to the one year rule, having played with the Mechanic's Institute team before he came to Technology. But Sawyer believes he is eligible under the immunity granted to service men, and Manager R. K. Thulmon hopes to have the matter cleared up in time to allow Sawyer to play in the opener.

The Institute Committee voted to appoint a committee to have charge of raising a fund for donation toward the Hoover relief work in Europe at its first meeting of the term yesterday afternoon in the faculty room, Walker. They also voted to place a death on the MacLaurin memorial at Walker Saturday, the anniversary of the death of the Institute's late president.

Other features of the meeting were the election of Carleton H. Talcott, Jr., to be chairman of the activities committee and the acceptance of a report by the committee on the distribution of Tech Night tickets which limits the number of tickets to 5 to each purchaser. The following were the absentees: Garvin Bawden '22, M. Biddell '22, H. Y. Satterlee '23, and H. L. Walker '24. Dwight W. Weist, representing the Hoover relief committee, addressed the meeting, urging Technology to do as other colleges have done in the matter of contribution to the relief in Europe. 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EXECUTIVE BOARD COM- PLETES REORGANIZATION

The Executive Committee of the combined Professional Societies completed its reorganization in a meeting held Tuesday evening. The membership has been doubled and a new board of officers has been elected. The Committee formerly comprised the presidents of the various Professional Societies of the Institute; but by a recent committee ruling, which went into effect Tuesday, the president of each society was permitted to appoint a junior delegate to the committee from his board of officers. In most cases this was the vice-president.

In committee meetings each society has only one vote, the senior delegate from the society casting the vote for his organization. The admission of the junior delegates insures each organization of a vote at every meeting.

TECHNIQUE HOPES TO REACH 2500 IN SIGNUP CAMPAIGN

Nine Tenths of the Copy Is in The Hands of the Printer Now—Rest Will Be in by January 20 at the Latest

JUNIOR BOARD CHOSEN SOON

With the closing date of the Technique signup campaign only two days away, and spurred on by the promise of double credit for all those sold after yesterday morning, the competitors are redoubling their efforts to add to the large number of books already sold. With deposits totaling about 2,000 obtained so far, the Technique Board is looking forward to the time when the 2,500 mark will be reached and is fully expectant that this feat will be accomplished before the competition closes on Saturday.

The final date for all material has been set at January 20 and with nine-tenths of the copy now in the hands of the printers, Perry and Elliott Co. the book will soon be ready for the binders. All other material necessary is now at the bindery. Boston Book-binding Co. and as soon as the printing has been completed, it will be rushed to the binders for its final stage of manufacture.

Since its first planning was done about \$2,000 worth of improvements have been added, thus advancing the value of the book in a marked degree.

At the finish of this campaign the successful competitors for the Junior board will be announced, Sophomore and freshman editorial parts being announced on Monday while the Sophomore business section competition will continue to the following Monday.

FACULTY IS QUIZZED ON SUMMER SCHOOL

Plans Considered to Maintain Stress of Work in Laboratories in Summer as well as in Winter

MAY OFFER NORMAL COURSE

Queries, the answers to which are expected to have a bearing on the possible extension of the Institute's summer school, have been addressed to the members of the Faculty here by the Administrative Committee in the form of a questionnaire.

The questionnaire sets forth that although the research laboratories in electrical engineering, physical chemistry, applied chemistry, and the new laboratory of industrial physics are now run on nearly a year-round basis, there still remains an opportunity for the furtherance of this work in the summer when the simplified and concentrated schedules find the laboratories freed from their greatest loads.

Regarding the Technology Plan the questionnaire frankly admits that embarrassment was incurred last summer through the absence of so many members of the instructing staff and inconvenience was caused the contractors thereby. The Administrative Committee feels that either the Institute should make an effort to be prepared to do much of this work in the summer and carry on a campaign to encourage their contractors to send in more problems in the summer, or do just the opposite, that is, divert the contractors' work from the summer months to some time when there is a larger staff in residence at the Institute.

The Administrative Committee feels, according to the questionnaire, that Technology has never been able, through press of internal duties, to do its share toward offering summer courses to teachers. Whereas Harvard, Chicago, Berkeley, and Columbia attract many hundreds of teachers to their summer courses, Technology, while possessing the facilities for giving perhaps better courses in the sciences than any of these universities, has never made an effort to bring them to its doors.

For an initial meet, that with the Secretaries promises to prove an exceptionally rigorous test for the wearers of the Cardinal and Gray. The visitors have a strong, well-balanced aggregation of stars, and with the advantage of age and experience expect to leave Cambridge tonight with a victory.

Allen Addicks '21, who will lead the engineers this year, refuses to hazard any predictions on the outcome of the contest, but there is little doubt that he will be more than satisfied if his teammates succeed in defeating the up-Staters this afternoon. He declared yesterday that he feared the Springfield representatives more than those of any college on the local schedule, but also added that the Institute is now represented by one of the strongest teams in his history and stands an even chance of winning today.

The Technology lineup will include the same men who composed last year's team, with two exceptions. Dick Longmaid, a newcomer with a powerful punch and scintillating speed, will handle the gloves in the 135-lb. class, while Charlie Reeves, the East Dedham lad, will fight in the heavyweight division. All the other men are veterans of the squared circle.

In this afternoon's meet Captain Addicks will fight in the 125 lb. class, but in all bouts of the Intercollegiate Association he will move up to the 135-lb. section. Allen is more at home in the lighter class, but by the league
