Blood and Hubbard are a pair of strong defense men, both of them experienced. Blood is a veteran of the strong Taunton Y. M. C. A. team, while Hubbard came to Technology with training on the Cushing Academy five.

WRESTLING CANDIDATES BEGIN
FINAL BOUTS FOR POSITIONS

The beginning of the varsity wrestling elimination bouts took place Monday afternoon, January 10, at the wrestling room, Walker Memorial, and solicited a large enthusiastic audience. Despite temporary darkness because of a blown-out fuse, the bouts were begun with a rather indeterminate contest for the 155 lb. class, varsity. Barnard and Davis officiated as entertainers, and kept both the mat and the timekeeper busy for nine minutes. Barnard finally obtaining the victory by decision. In the frosh finals, Ames, candidate for the 145 lb. class, obtained the decision over Riegel, and with the advent of the lights, meted out a like result to Ruggles, who endeavored to end the contest by spectacular falls.

Wednesday, Davis again met Barnard, and won by decision, making another bout necessary for a final decision. In the frosh bouts, Ames defeated Lord in 4½ minutes, and so cleared the 145 lb. class of all competitors. J. H. Graham proved his claim to the 175 pound class giving Estabrooke and Thomas unlooked-for defeat, while Hazeltine eliminated Strauss from the 125 pound varsity candidates.

The 115 lb. class, varsity, is to be contested for by Roche, Davis, and Barnard. Herrick, Warburton, and Hazeltine are listed as candidates for the 125 lb. position. Rogers, Guy, T. O. Richards, Meeres, and McManan are candidates for the 135 lb. Butler is the only man out for the 145 lb., while Briggs will meet Thomas for the 155 lb. In the 175 lb. lists, Russell is unchallenged, while Humphrey's superiority remained unquestioned.

In the last half, M. I. T. was forced to play an entirely defensive game for the B. C. skaters came back strong after their rest. Only once in this period was there a real chance to score and this no one took advantage of. Dan MacNeil, about ten feet in front of the net made a center pass with nobody around to cage it. Twice Captain John DuVernet broke away from the B. C. men and skated well up the field, but was unable to rush the puck past the defense line. In a tight play against the wall, F. Morrissey collided with Bill Cauldwell, the latter throwing his shoulder out of joint, but with a little twisting, he was in action again. In the last two minutes of play, Leo Morrissey, the cover-point pushed the rubber disc in, winning the game for B. C.

The next game will be with Boston College on Thursday Jan. 27. As it was agreed upon that the winner of last night's contest was to play Dartmouth, no game has been arranged for next week.

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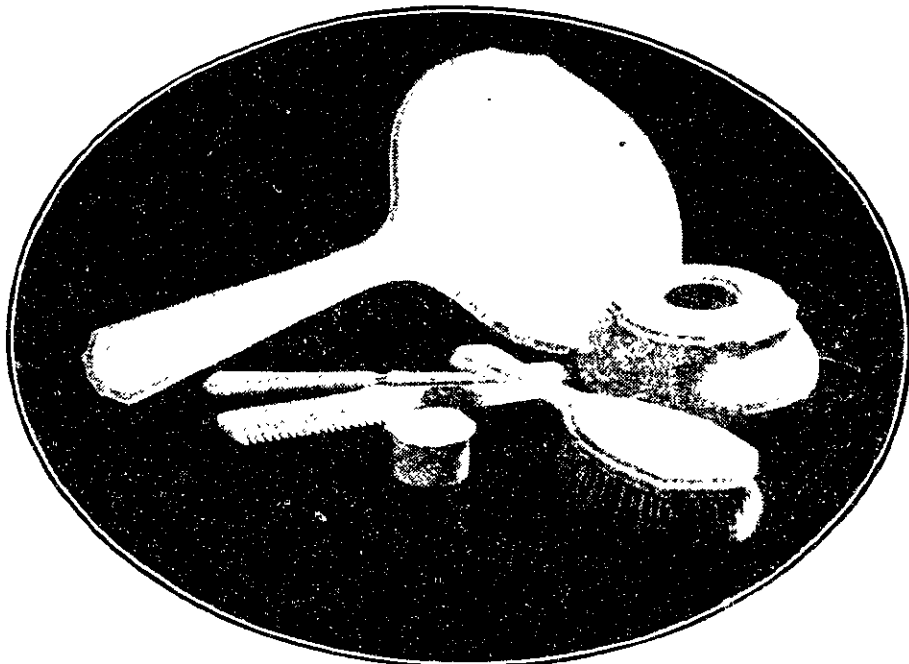
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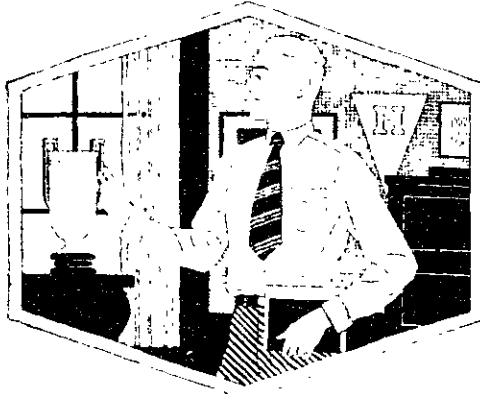
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
