

MITTMEN SPILL THE DOPE AND BREAK EVEN WITH SPRINGFIELD

All of which means that Captain Allen Addicks and his Institute mittmen spilled the dope all around the landscape last Friday afternoon, emerging from their first dual meet of the season with an even break out of six bouts and the knowledge that we have a hefty bunch of sluggers here at Technology.

According to the seers, the lads from up-state were pre-ordained to run away with the match. They did grab three bouts—in the 135, 145 and 175-lb. classes, but the other trio of contests were gracefully corralled by the home talent. It's rumored that the championship bug is buzzing around the bonnet of Coach Nap Boutlier these days.

In the initial contest of the afternoon Tommy Barnard, wearing the Cardinal and Gray in the 115-lb. class had no trouble in outpointing McCarragher of Springfield in every one of their three rounds. Tommy battered

down his opponent's defense with a series of left jabs that had the secretary bewildered.

Proctor Pounds Miller

The prettiest bout of the day, from a scientific standpoint, was that between Captain Allen Addicks, of the Technology team, and Bill Snyder in the 125-lb. class. The visitor had a shade on the local leader in the first round, but in the last two period the Institute youth drove Snyder around the ring with a whirlwind of blows. A kayo seemed imminent when the bell rang. Judges Fitzpatrick and Brady both gave Addicks the decision. The next two bouts went to Springfield. Dick Longmaid failed to hold the advantage he had gained over Russell in the first two sessions, and was all in when the fight was over. In the 145-lb. class, Pucillo, of Springfield got the verdict over Fred Koch. The fans disagreed when the result was announced, and it did seem as if Fred had the lead in points.

Tommy Proctor and Miller, who clashed in the 158-lb. division, put on a great battle. Both men sparred in the first round, but in the second session the fighting became fast and furious. Miller showed the greater speed, especially after the clinches, but Tommy slugged like a demon. Just before the end of the period the engineer swung his left to Miller's head. It looked as if the end had come, but the secretary rallied and managed to last out the round. The third period was about even, and after an extra session had been called for by the judges, they handed the decision to the Technology boxer.

Charlie Reeves didn't have a chance against Soldier Adams of Springfield, boxing in the 175-lb. division. The visitor had all the earmarks of a pro, and before the first round was thirty seconds long Jack Sullivan, in the Institute corner, tossed a towel into the ring, scoring a technical knockout for Adams.

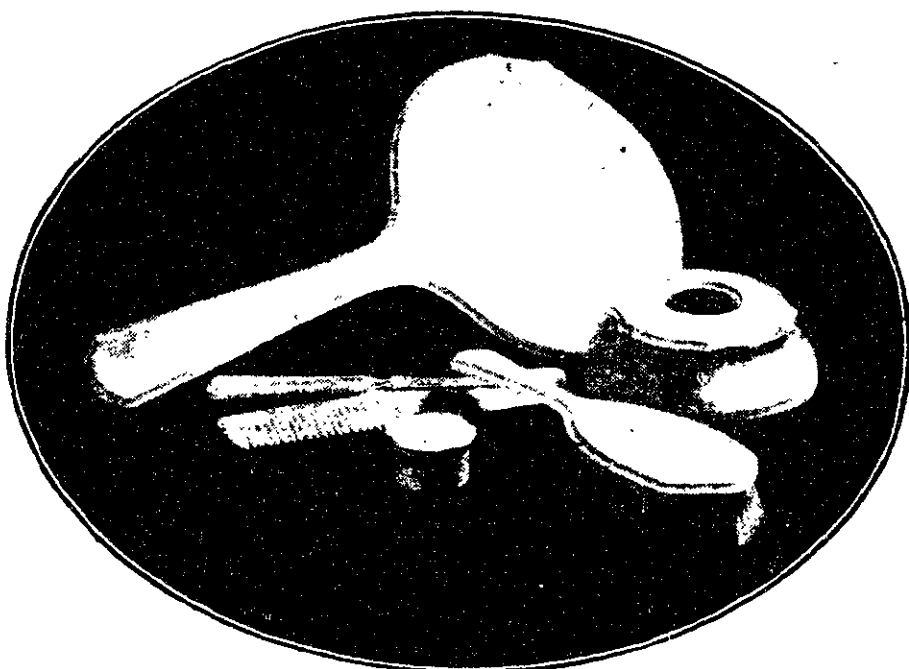
