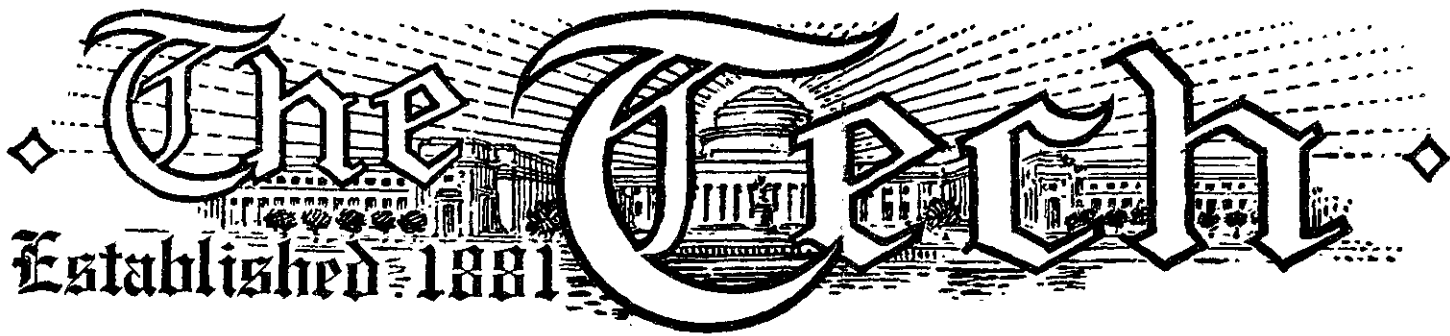


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BASKETBALL TEAM BOWS TO PROVIDENCE QUINTET

**Brown Team Outplays Cardinal and Gray in Both
Periods of Game and Wins by Score 25 to 13—
Freshman Defeat Wentworth Institute**

The Bear visited Technology last Wednesday night, and with usual Brunonian habits, secured a hearty meal for its repast. Outplaying the Technology quintet in every department, it won the game by the score of 25 to 13. With perfect team play and excellent shooting, the Brown quintet secured the lead early in the game and thereafter was never in danger. Though Technology showed an occasional spurt which could have put them in the lead if continued, nevertheless the spurt was only temporary and they soon relaxed into their old listless style of play.

Applegate and Mallory showed especially brilliant work for the visitors. Mallory's shots from the center of the floor proving especially spectacular. Barret was sent in in the second half and showed that he should have played the whole game. He is a former football star and is well high irresistible when he starts dribbling down the floor. In the last five minutes he scored 4 field goals in rapid succession. The Brown guards are to be complimented on their work, for they blocked many possible shots by their quick covering.

of Springfield Lecturer

"Only one thing will make a man and that is 'I will,' the will to put something in that brain of mine to help me carry out life's program," said Dr. F. N. Seerly, Dean of Springfield Y. M. C. A. College, in his lecture on "Manhood" yesterday afternoon in room 10-250.

"While in New York the other day," he continued, "I stood gazing up at the Hotel Vanderbilt, as I was looking an airplane passed over, and it occurred to me that this mighty structure, that airplane, were the work of the brain of a human being. As I stood there a man came out of a house nearby, handsome, well-dressed, looking as though he might have brains, but I am sorry to say that he could hardly stay on the sidewalk. Is there anything more pitiable than a man, wealthy, educated, and yet unable to control himself?"

"Be Clean in Mind"

"If the young man only knew what goes into the blood, he would be more careful of what he puts into the stomach," said Dr. Seerly in explaining the delicate mechanism of the human body. He said that one-fourth of the blood passes through the brain in three minutes and that any kind of poisoning quickly finds its way through the system.

Harold Casson and Paul Sullivan, of 210 Bay State Road, while skating on Charles River late Wednesday afternoon found themselves on thin ice, literally. Unable to recall themselves from their unfortunate situation, they had no alternative but to submit to a cold plunge without waiting for morning. The congealing—if not congenial—waters of the Charles awoke within the young men a desire for song, not so much quality as quantity.

They found an audience in a nearby fraternity house, who, by coats, life-preservers and hard work, pulled the frozen ones to warmth and safety. The heroes are: C. B. Barbour '22, B. G. Hinds '22, R. M. Vincent '23, E. W. Reynolds '24, and W. F. Rivers '24.

Half a score of Boston policemen came to the rescue and worked manfully, if inefficiently. A lifeboat, aroused from its winter-long slumber, found its frozen falls most rudely yanked and hauled. The boat was still resting securely between its davits when the boys were pulled out. Later an ambulance called at Sullivan's home but it was not needed.

Vincent, who was a member of the Royal Flying Corps during the war, gave Sullivan a massage.

INSTITUTE BECOMING A GRADUATE SCHOOL

**Large Number Entering from
Other Colleges Causes Extension
of Courses—New Entrance
Requirements**

CHEMISTRY CREDIT NEEDED

The increasingly large number of men entering the Institute from other colleges brings to Technology the necessity of offering advanced courses on a more extended scale than ever before, according to a report read to the faculty Wednesday afternoon by Professor Frank Adyelette, chairman of the committee on admissions.

Professor Adyelette furnished the faculty with figures which show strikingly the increase of transferees at the Institute in the past nine years. The following are the percentage ratios of men who transfer to Technology from other colleges to the men who enter the Institute from secondary schools, since 1912: 1912, 22 per cent; 1913, 34 per cent; 1914, 59 per cent; 1915, 60 per cent; 1916, 71 per cent; 1918, 36 per cent; 1919, 38 per cent.

**DR. CHAFFEE SPEAKS AT
RADIO SOCIETY MEETING**

Dr. E. L. Chaffee '07, of the Cruft Laboratory at Harvard, gave a talk to the members of the Radio Society last Tuesday night in north hall. His subject was modulation and interference about which he gave a detailed mathematical analysis, on the distribution in the emitted wave of the station. Although the number of men present was small because of the severity of the weather, those who had the opportunity to hear Dr. Chaffee voiced their interest at the close of the talk by asking questions of all sorts on the subject of the evening and on radio in general.

**PROF. DOTEN MADE PRESIDENT
OF AMER. STATISTICAL ORG.**

Professor Carroll W. Doten of the Economics Department, has been appointed president of the American Statistical Organization. He has been secretary of this organization for 12 years, and vice-president for three years. This is one of the oldest scientific societies in the Country, has 1000 members, and is organized to compile, interpret, and disseminate technical knowledge.

The sentiment for varsity sport on a more extensive plane was voiced at a recent meeting of the Technology Athletic Club by the club president, Watts S. Humphrey '21, who said "It is logical to suppose that we may have a varsity baseball team here in the spring."

Feeling that the readers of THE TECH would welcome the opinion of athletic authorities on the subject of varsity football, the Sporting Editor asked Dr. Rowe to make a statement on the proposition and he has submitted the following:

It is with much regret that I open my statement by saying that I feel football to lie wholly outside the range of possibility at the Institute. In the first place football is a sport which requires the constant and concerted effort of a large group of men, all working at the same time. Secondly, it is a sport which, absolutely dependent upon daylight, is
