CLINIC GROWS

Number of Patients Doubled During First Term

In a recent statement upon the work of the Medical Clinic, Dr. G. W. Morse, head of the Medical Department at Technology, expressed himself as pleased with the work that the clinic is doing and said that it had come up to all the expectations of those in charge.

Dr. Morse said that the general health of the Institute was very good considering the difficulties of keeping in touch with the students. This is due to the fact that out of 3062 men at the Institute, only 165 live in the dormitories where their food, living conditions, etc., could be under medical supervision. Of the remainder, 1176 live at home, and 1721 in boarding houses. This condition leaves a large percentage of the student body exposed to outside sources of contagion which cannot be very well removed. Besides the 3062 members of the student body the Medical Department is also responsible for the health of 45 officers and instructors, and 852 employees.

At the beginning of the first term the number of visits at the Clinic rooms numbered about 25 per day or 600 per month. Since that time the number has increased to about 50 per day, an increase of 100 per cent in three months. The Medical Department also took charge of the physical examinations of 700 freshmen and out of that number found 167 who had ailments requiring medical attention.

The following note has been received from the Medical Director: "Owing to the prevalence during the last few weeks of an infection of the upper air passages, I feel it necessary that each instructor be advised to send any men who are seen coughing or sneezing in the classroom, or who are apparently suffering from colds and coughs, to the Medical Department, and to isolate such cases as far as possible. I feel this is necessary, as these infections seem to be very contagious."

TICKETS STILL OBTAINABLE

Today is the last day that tickets to the Army and Navy ball can be obtained. A few tickets are still left at the Department of Military Science. The ball will be held in the East Armory in Boston on February 2 and will last from 8 till 2 o'clock.

COMMITTEE INCREASES RATES IN DORMITORY

Between Three and Four Hundred
Now On Waiting List

At a recent meeting, the Administrative Committee voted for an increase in the dormitory rates to take effect at the end of the third term, and including the summer term. The exact amount of the increase has not been determined as yet but it will probably be around 20 per cent.

There are now between three and four hundred on the waiting list, but the number that can be accommodated cannot as yet be determined. This is due to the fact that the men now in the rooms have not submitted their applications and these have the first claim on the leases. Applications can still be placed on file at the Bursar's office.

Second B. C. Game Tomorrow

Better Play Expected of Both
Teams in Fast Arena Combat

PRICE OF TICKETS REDUCED

The second match of a five game series between the M. I. T. Hockey Team and Boston College will be played at the Boston Arena tomorrow night at 8.15. A large crowd is expected to be on hand due to the fact that both teams have shown a decided improvement since their last encounter with one another. The Institute team in a short practice scrimmage

at the Arena last night defeated the Harvard varsity 1-0. The winner of this game will play Mass. Aggies next week.

Boston College showed its strength in the Dartmouth game Thursday night when they beat the Green 5-0. The brand of hockey displayed in this game was vastly superior to anything that the boys from the height have heretofore exhibited. The M. I. T. team has not played a regular game in the last two weeks owing to the fact that the Mass. Aggie game scheduled for Saturday was called off as no surface was available for the game. That the Beavers are in better condition was demonstrated in their practice last night. Coach Gaw has now reached the time when if the Institute team does not clean up there will be no alibi, for he has been showing the men the fine points of the game with the result that the team work has increased greatly.

To enable more Technology students to attend the contest, tomorrow night, the management has been able to secure a substantial reduction on all seats for T. A. C. members. In the price of all seats, this represents a reduction of thirty to fifty per cent. The best seats for the Boston College game will sell for \$1.10, and general admission will be 55 cents. On all price pasteboards, free public skating is included after the game. Tickets will be on sale in the main lobby and in Walker between 12 and 2 today and until 5 o'clock Wednesday.

RADIO SOCIETY WILL HAVE NOVEL ENTERTAINMENT

The Radio Society has something up its sleeve with regard to the annual banquet, a date for which has not yet been appointed. Final plans have not been perfected, but it is rumored that the attraction of the evening will be extremely novel.

The wireless telephone installed early in December has seen considerable use by the members of the society, and was also used to carry messages for the members of the Georgia delegation when it visited the Institute early in December. The telephone is low in efficiency, but can be operated with maximum ease and simplicity. The power is obtained from storage batteries and by the use of a dynamometer panel the voltage is increased from 12 volts to 350 volts. The radius of the instrument is five miles, but it has been heard in Bristol, Ct., a distance of 150 miles.

RUTGERS WINS

Relay Lost by Six Inches in Close Race

Although defeated by Rutgers, 30-23, Saturday at New Brunswick, our varsity swimmers are not downhearted. In fact it would have been some surprise to Rutgers, with her Olympic champion Giebel, and Junior National champ Ross, if we had shown up first. As it was, the Technology fish gave the champs a run for their money.

The relay, which coach Holm was counting on to be one of the big factors in the meet, was close. Although losing yards the first lap, the Technology men regained their distance with each lap, until at the start of the last lap, they were ahead. Half way on this lap, Biddell lost his lead, slightly, and was beaten by only six inches.

In the plunge, there was no opposition to Kendall and Stalbird. The two Engineers outplunged their small opponents with ease, Kendall taking first easily with only 59 feet.

The dives went to the visitors also. Purinton took five markers, and Ferdinand one, showing mighty good form against skilled opponents.

For the rest, victory rested largely with Rutgers. Palmer and Green, however, took seconds, and Webber, and Biddell thirds. It was the hundred yard swim which decided the meet against the Institute. With the score tied, Leo Giebel came in first, with Ross second, after a spectacular sprint against Biddell, thus securing the winning points.

1600 INSTEAD OF 600 NOW EAT AT WALKER

Best Service to Students Is Aim
of Managers G. W. Thissell
and V. H. Philbrook—Service
Will Soon Be on Paying Basis

ANTICIPATE LOWER PRICES

"There is no question but that prices can be reduced, and the size of the portions increased, if the patronage continues to increase," is the hopeful statement made by Manager Philbrook in regard to the Walker cafeteria. The number served is now 1600 a day, instead of the 600 that were served before the restaurant was taken over by the Georgian management. However, only one counter is now used, and in order to get the maximum benefits from the service both counters should be used, which would mean serving 2600 instead of the present 1600. 600 now go by the counter between 12 and 12.30 o'clock, and another 500 could be taken care of in the same time, by using the other counter.

Mr. G. W. Thissell, formerly at the Georgian Cafeteria in Cambridge is now associate manager with Mr. Philbrook, and they have been given complete authority in the management and will make any changes that will improve the service. They wish it to be known to the men here, that their aim is to give the best possible service to them and they will welcome any criticisms and suggestions for improvements. For convenience the supper hour has been made an hour earlier, the dining hall now being open at 4.45 o'clock in the afternoon. Although this service was formerly maintained at a loss, the management believes it will soon be on a paying basis, owing to the increased patronage.

ADDRESSES 1400 STUDENTS

Dr. F. N. Seerley's Lectures Attract Great Numbers

By the time he had completed his series of addresses at the Institute, Dr. F. N. Seerley of the Y. M. C. A. College at Springfield had spoken to 11 different groups of undergraduates and a total of 1400 students. His final public lecture was delivered last Friday on the subject of "Motherhood" before an audience of over 700, a number which greatly overtaxed the capacity of room 10-250, and which has not been equalled since last year at the commemoration exercises in honor of late President MacLaurin.

Dr. Seerley also gave two talks in the west lounge of Walker, four in the nearby fraternity houses, two in the dormitories and one before the T. C. A. From the Institute he proceeded to Williams College.
