

BOSTON COLLEGE RETURNS TOMORROW FOR SECOND COMBAT

VARSITY SMOTHERS NORTHEASTERN 37-18

Preliminary Game Becomes Head-liner When Freshmen Defeat New Hampshire State in Extra Period

FROSH SCORE IS 35-34

The Varsity Basketball team came back strong last Friday night and smothered the five from Northeastern College by a score of 37 to 18. It was a walkaway for Technology, and was only made interesting by the brilliant team work of the latter and the individual starrng of Boyer. Boyer made seven free throws out of a possible nine, a very noticeable improvement over his past work and also scored eight field baskets. Acting Capt. Hubbard's work in the back of it is to be complimented also. The real contest of the evening was furnished by the yearlings in a preliminary contest with New Hampshire State freshmen. This was a game replete with tie scores and close shots, keeping the spectators on the jump every minute. With a half a minute left to play and the score 30 to 29 in favor of the Technology five, a foul was called on Davidson. Metcalf, the individual star for the visitors tossed the ball through the hoop and the score was a tie. It was decided to continue for five minutes longer. Soon after the extra period started, Metcalf made another score putting New Hampshire in the lead.

Yearlings Retaliate

But the yearlings came back in a minute and Davidson and Lehan each scored a basket in rapid succession. Though New Hampshire succeeded in making an additional four points, in this period, they made a very costly blunder, in that Lehan dropped the ball through the basket on the free throw and the game was Technology's, by the score of 35 to 34. This makes the Tech straight win for the freshmen. Metcalf, the center on the New Hampshire State team was the best point player and all around player seen on the floor that night. He is a hard man to guard and is a perfect shot.

FROSH MERMEN DOWN ENGLISH HIGH TEAM

Take 43 Out of a Possible 53 Points in Dual Meet at Curtis Hall—Kemp Shines in Dives —Marsh Shows His Speed

CATES PLUNGES 61 FEET

Did those frosh water-scorchers make up for last week's defeat when they downed English High, Saturday afternoon, at Curtis Hall, 43-10? They did! Fought under the most adverse conditions, the aquatic battle showed some good plunges, and some plucky diving.

Kemp Wins Diving Despite Bruises

It may have been because the water was too dirty to see bottom; or it may have been because the spring-board was stiffer than an I-beam; but whatever the reason, both Kemp and Burger struck the bottom, which had a surface like the side of a stucco house, again and again. Burger escaped with only a few black and blue places, and a cut or two, but Kemp was not so lucky. His fingers were torn open at the ends, he suffered many cuts and bruises on his legs, and on his last dive he bumped his head on the bottom with such force that he would probably have been unable to continue in the meet. Incidentally, Art knocked down five points by taking first place in the dives. His diving was not only far better than that of the English High men, but showed great improvement over last week's work.

Engineers Show No Mercy

In practically all the events, Technology took first and second. In the plunge, however, Thomas seemed unable to come up to standard. His best distance of 45 feet was beaten by Brodny. Cates took first place for the Beavers with 61 feet 2 inches. The relay was rather hard fought, but gaining on the last lap, Nip March came through with victory for the Institute. The time was 1:56. In the 50, Nip left his three adversaries behind, and finished in 27 1-5 seconds. The fight for second place between Bruner and Taylor was close, but Taylor won. Marsh took first also in the century, gaining about two yards on his nearest competitor each lap. The time was 1:08:02. In the 200, the men ran in pairs, that is Dunn and Evans swam very evenly, and behind them some distance, the two English High men, Russell and Holder. At the beginning of the fifth lap, it became evident that Evans would win, and at the same time, Russell pulled away from Holder.

It is believed that Henniger, who has been sick for some time, will return this week. He is a valuable plunger, and is sure to bring in some points for Technology.

MAKE IT FOUR STRAIGHT

The freshmen quintet traveled to Andover last Saturday afternoon and there met the five from the Academy. They returned homewards after a rather rough game, victors by the score of 23 to 19. At the end of the first half the score was 18 to 5 in favor of the Freshmen, but the Andover five came back strong in the second and it was only a last minute brace by the freshmen that made it possible for them to win the game. Lehan starred for Technology, scoring most of the field goals. The lineup was Lehan and Davidson, forwards; Kennedy, center; Cook and Bastian, guards.

GRAPPLERS UNLUCKY

Team Meets with First Defeat In Two Years

Technology grapplers met with their first defeat since 1919, last Saturday, when Brown University obtained a 19-6 victory at the Lyman gym, Providence, in a meet that was full of fast and clever grappling. The Brunonians won five bouts, of which two were falls. In two of the bouts, extra periods were necessary before a decision could be rendered.

The bouts started auspiciously for Technology. Davis, Technology's 115 pounder, wrestled the decision from Staples of Brown, in a bout full of fast work. In the 125 pound bout between Hazeltine of the Engineers, and Holt of the hillmen, an extra three minute period was necessary before the Institute man was awarded the decision. Richards of the Institute proved an impossible man for his 135 pound opponent, Dustin, to down and the large crowd present were given a nine minute period full of speedy work, with the decision finally going to the Brunonian.

Captains Feature

The feature bout of the meet, however, took place between the captains of the respective teams, Buttler of Technology, and Dodge of the hillmen. Both men evinced their knowledge of the wrestling game in a bout that provided the spectators with thrills galore. With the expiration of the time limit, no decision had been reached, and in the three minutes overtime that was allowed, the Brown captain was given the decision. J. Spellman of Brown and Russell of the Engineers, the two husky contenders in the heavyweight contest, wrestled the full time before the Brunonian was awarded the decision

by Referee Pinkham. The only two falls of the meet were won by the Brunonians. The beginning moments of the 158 pound contest between Thomas of Technology and R. Spellman of Brown, seemed to auger a draw, but the hillman, by a sudden burst of strength and speed, obtained the first fall of the meet. The only other fall resulted in the 175 pound contest, when Shurtleff of Brown, obtained the victory over Watts Humphrey of the Institute.

Frosh More Lucky

The Institute freshman team were more successful in their meet with the Tufts Freshmen at the Walker gym, when they meted out a 20-11 defeat to the invaders. Ames of the Engineer cubs wrestled twice in two 145 pounds bouts, and split even.
