And Drops in Fatal Collapse
—Funeral Today in First
Parish, Brookline

Funeral services for the late Professor W. T. Sedgwick, who died suddenly Tuesday night, will be held today at noon in the First Unitarian Church, Walnut and Warren streets, Brookline, where Professor Sedgwick was for many years a regular attendant. Rev. Abbot Peterson, pastor of the church, will conduct the service.

CHANGES BEGUN IN WALKER MEMORIAL

Handball Courts Will Be Used
For Original Purpose—M. I.
T. A. A. May Be Put in New
Office in Basement

WRESTLERS MOVE TO GYM

Numerous changes are to be made in Walker Memorial to the end that some of the handball courts may be used for the purpose for which they were designed. The immediate action is the removal of the T. E. N. to the Orchestra office and the removal of the wrestlers to the gym.

As the plans now are the Orchestra will be moved into the Show office and the Finance Committee to the office off the West Lounge. Then the T. E. N. will occupy the office thus made vacant. The wrestlers started moving into the gym and when these arrangements are completed two handball courts will be released.

Two offices will be constructed in the basement of Walker, and when these are completed there is a possibility that the M. I. T. A. A. will be moved into one. Owing to the shortage of locker facilities, one of the handball courts will be temporarily used for a locker room until the triple deck lockers ordered for the main locker room arrive. However, the plan is to eventually release all the handball courts for that purpose.

INSTITUTE MAY HAVE FISHERIES COLLEGE

Favorable Action by the Ad-
ministrative Committee on
Prof. Prescott's Report
Means Establishment

WOULD BE SECOND IN U. S.

Technology may have the second fisheries college to be established in the United States if the administrative committee acts favorably upon the report of Prof. Prescott, who has just returned from the fisheries college of the University of Washington in Seattle.

The fisheries college of the University of Washington has met with such success in its one year of operation that the local fish interests have been trying to get Technology to undertake the establishment of a similar one. So urgent were the demands of the fish industry on the West coast that the buildings for the college were presented to it.

Beside the report to the administrative committee, Prof. Prescott will submit a report to J. C. Wheeler of the Bay State Fisheries and Gardner Poole who was head of the fish division of the Food Administration during the war.

The Farmers, while splendidly guarded by Blood and Hubbard made every shot good and as a result gained the heavy end in a final score of 18-12. The score at the end of the first half was 7-9 in favor of the Aggies.

The outstanding feature of the game was the wonderful exhibition of playing given by Gowdy, the Farmer's Captain. He was a tower of strength and constantly interfered with the Varsity's attempts at passing and shooting. On a par with him was "Dutch" Roser, the Aggies' right forward. His passing was especially brilliant and his consistent foul shooting gave his team the margin necessary to win the game.

Tillie Tonon was hurt during the first period and was forced to retire from the game. The team seemed lost without him and though he returned in the second half, his brilliant performance of the first half was lacking and this seemed to dishearten the whole team. These casual remarks of former students made to me within a few weeks are illustrative of the inspiration of his teaching and of the precious relations of confidence and affection which have always existed between Professor Sedgwick and the young men who studied with him. In his early days he was a scientist, keen for research; in his middle life he was an educator in science and an administrator in public health, and in his later life he was scientist, educator, administrator, and counselor,—but always, first and foremost, he was the friend of young men.

Was Sedgwick's Pupil

I count myself fortunate to have been one of these young men,—one who knew him in the early days when the science of bacteriology was in its infancy and when a splendid vision of the applications of biology to problems of sanitary engineering and public health was dawning in his soul. I was fortunate in being present at a dinner attended by about 75 of Professor Sedgwick's former students in 1906, at which time a volume of scientific papers written by them in commemoration of the 25th anniversary of his doctorate was presented to him. Now, fifteen years later, his students are far more numerous and through them his influence has been felt not only throughout America but the world over.

I count myself fortunate also to have been associated with Professor Sedgwick in recent years in the Public Health Council of the State Department of Public Health and the Administrative Board of the School
