#### Team Shows Improvement

Technology showed up much better in their latest encounter than they have in any other game. Although the players still show a lack of physical condition, they survived more trying circumstances in this game. Dan MacNeil did not shine as he has in the past, but his brother Neil kept the family name in the foreground. Arnie Taylor has not yet come up to the standard of playing which he exhibited in the Kings College game, which is more than likely due to his recent illness. For the first time this season Ed Delany was seen in action for any length of time and he made a good showing. Now that three fifteen minute periods are being played, it is probable that Coach Gaw will send in more men as there are several valuable substitutes on the bench at present.

Both teams voiced objections to the officiating, and in one instance particularly. In the closing moments of the first period, Captain Hughes caged the puck just as the gong sounded indicating that the period was over. The referees ruled that the goal did not count and B. C. objected.

Just twelve seconds after the second period got under way, Taylor added another to Technology's score. A few seconds later Leo Hughes rushed the rubber disc past goal tender Nickle for the first B. C. goal. Curry tied the score on a rebound from Healy's stick. Chief Frank Morrissey raised Boston College's hopes by putting his team in the lead during the third period, but not for long, for Dan MacNeil scored another for Technology.

After a ten minute rest, both teams came back on the ice, the Beavers apparently in better condition, but after ten minutes of overtime both teams were near collapse.
