CORPORATION XV WILL VISIT GENERAL ELECTRIC COMPANY

The Lynn Works of The General Electric will be the goal of the next trip by Corporation XV, Wednesday, February 9. The Lynn Works are the second in size of the Company's plants, covering more than 250 acres, and normally employing more than 12,000 men and women. The River Works are engaged in the production of small motors, turbo-generators, turbo-air-compressors, arc lamps, and transformers.

The party will be limited to 50 and will leave the North Station at 1.40 o'clock. Small groups will be formed at the works, to be guided through the various departments. Arrangements are being made for supper at the plant, at which officials of the Company will speak. The total expenses of the trip, including transportation and supper, will be about \$1.10. The party will return to Boston by 7.30 o'clock.

MATMEN SPLIT EVEN

Lose to Princeton But Defeat Brooklyn Polytech

Not a whit disheartened by the 17-8 defeat administered them by Princeton at the latter's quarters, the Institute grapplers staged a comeback at the Brooklyn Polytech, last Saturday, the result being a 28-3 victory for the Beavers, with the home team lucky to get even the 3. Thomas, Technology's 158 pounder, was injured Friday, so Captain Buttler wrestled in both the 145 and 158 pound bouts, splitting even by winning his own class from Rubien of Brooklyn, and losing the 158 pound contest to Gellman.

The contest for the 115 pound crown between Davis of the Institute and Daniels of Brooklyn was cut short when Davis secured a head and body-hold, and thus the victory.

Watts Humphrey of the Institute made use of a scissors and half nelson in defeating Seiken in the 175 pound contest, while Russel added a final "five" to the Beavers' score, by a body-hold and so a defeat on Riegger, in the unlimited class bout.

The preceding Friday, the Institute grapplers lost a hard-fought battle to the Tigers, at Princeton, the resultant score being 17-8. Every bout was closely contested, the first, between Davis of the Beavers and Cooth of the Tigers, for the 115 pound victory, being prolonged two extra period before Davis secured an arm-lock and body-hold, and so the victory. The 135 pound contest between Morrison of Princeton and Richards of the Institute was the feature bout of the meet, resulting in the decision being awarded the Princetonian. The home team won in the 125 pound contest with Hazeltine of Technology and Cover of Princeton as the contestants.

HARVARD HAS KEEN EDGE

The Technology fencing balloon was punctured by the swords of the Harvard fencers Saturday afternoon, the Institute representatives dropping a hard-fought match by a score of 5-4 in the Hemenway gym. YALE SWIMMERS BREAK WORLD'S RELAY RECORD

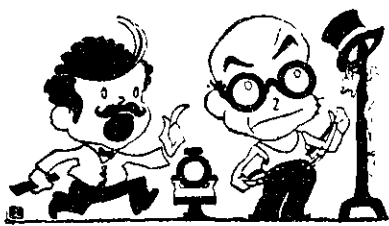

Princeton continued her winning streak by defeating the Yale sextet 4 to 2 in one of the most exciting and hard fought games ever played in the triangular hockey league series. At the end of the second half, the score was a 2-2 tie, but Princeton scored two goals in an extra period.

Penn took the lead from Dartmouth in the basketball league by winning 26-18. A sensational second half spurt by the Green failed to overcome the early lead acquired by Penn. Pony polo has been made a new minor sport at Penn. A strong squad has been formed and it is expected that a strong team will be developed. The first game is scheduled for Saturday with the First Cavalry Troop.

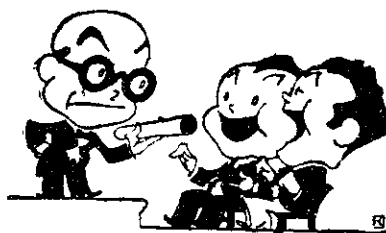
