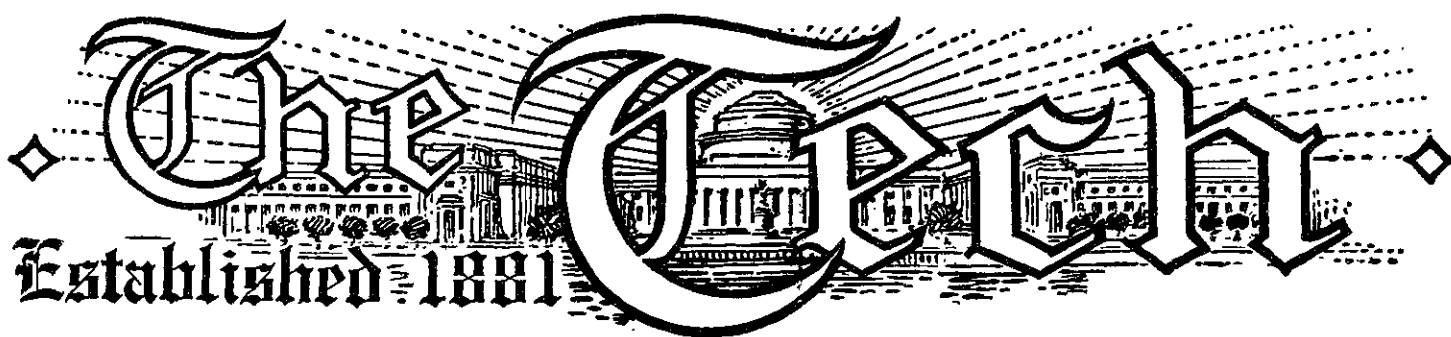


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PLANS ARE COMPLETED FOR HOOVER BANQUET

Committee Announces Names of the Speakers—
Assembly to Receive a Personal Message
From Hoover

SPECIAL FEATURES ARE BEING ARRANGED

Plans for the Hoover Dinner are rapidly nearing completion, Irving Jakobson, chairman of the committee announced yesterday. Speakers for the occasion have been named, as follows: William B. Poland '90, Chevalier of the Legion of Honor; Elliot Wadsworth, former Executive Officer of the American Red Cross; James Jackson, Treasurer of the State of Massachusetts; and Leonard Metcalf '92, President of the Alumni Association.

An effort is being made to secure an amplifier from the telephone company so that all present may hear Hoover's voice over the phone some time during the evening. If this cannot be arranged, Hoover will send a telegram as a personal message to his supporters at Technology.

Tickets will be on sale today in the main lobby from 12 to 2, Saturday from 12 to 1, Monday and Tuesday from 12 to 2. A large crowd is expected and the committee suggests that the old admonition will still hold true: "Come early and avoid the rush."

Information as to the plans show a number of features in addition to the addresses. The College girls who will serve are coming from C. S. S. Sargent, art schools and Emerson. After the dinner there is to be dancing, music furnished by Luke Walton's orchestra. The meals are being donated by the new management of the Walker Memorial Dining Service.

SAXOPHONES TO PLAY

Sextette in Tech Show—Dress
Rehearsal March 8

Although there will be no saxaphones in the Tech Show orchestra, this popular instrument will be heard in the show as it has been decided to form a saxophone sextette to play separate from the orchestra.

Those who have been chosen to play alto and melody are, C. A. Geisinger, '22, H. J. Lehman '24, M. A. Youtg, B. S. Falk, '22, and W. L. Knoepe, '21. There is still a man to be chosen to play baritone or base. Candidates who wish to try out for this part should report at the rehearsal the time of which will be posted on the bulletin board. The sextette will play on the stage, but it has not yet been definitely decided whether it will be during the intermission or in a special act.

The M.I.T. Orchestra will meet Sunday morning at 9 o'clock at Ye Craftman's Studio for a group picture, after which they will adjourn to building 30 where practice will be held. Coach Duggan, who is a member of the Masque, journees to Boston every week-end from New York, to direct the rehearsals.

A full dress rehearsal of the entire cast will be held Sunday March 8, at one of the down town theatres. TECHNOLOGY THIRD IN TITLE ONE-MILE RELAY

Chittick Does Final Quarter in
51 Seconds But Fails to Over-
take Penn and Syracuse Stars
Who Lead

MACMAHON AND SANBORN RUN

New York, Feb. 9.—Six track men from Technology competing here last night in the Millrose Athletic Association games brought credit to themselves and their school, showing in three different events on the evening's crowded program.

The Institute one-mile relay team placed third in the race for the inter-collegiate one-mile indoor championship of America after a spirited race. Pennsylvania was first and Syracuse second with Columbia fourth.

Chittick Shines in Relay

Captain William K. MacMahon and Elmer E. Sanborn ran in the Wannamaker special race over the mile-and-a-half distance but found the pace too stiff for them as set by Harold Cutbill of the Boston Athletic Association and Joie Ray of Hunter Mile fame. The fact that he had been training for the half-mile relay team for the last month told on Technology's track team captain and he did not finish.

In the seventy-yard handicap dash Jim Downey, with a handicap of three feet was shut out in his heat by McFadden of Pennsylvania, who had a handicap of eight feet.

The performance of Yardley Chittick, running anchor for the relay team brought favorable comment from Lawson Robertson, track coach at the University of Pennsylvania, who went over to Frank Kanaly after Chittick had finished up his relay and asked who his anchor man was.

Kanally's reply elicited from the Pennsy coach that he thought Chittick was a "find". "I clocked him in 51 seconds for his quarter", commented Robertson.

Penn Flyer Forced to Travel

And Chittick looked every bit as fast as 51 seconds. He tore around that track in a fashion that brought out the best that was in Earl Eby and the Syracuse anchor flyer to keep the

OTHER TEAS UNCROSSED

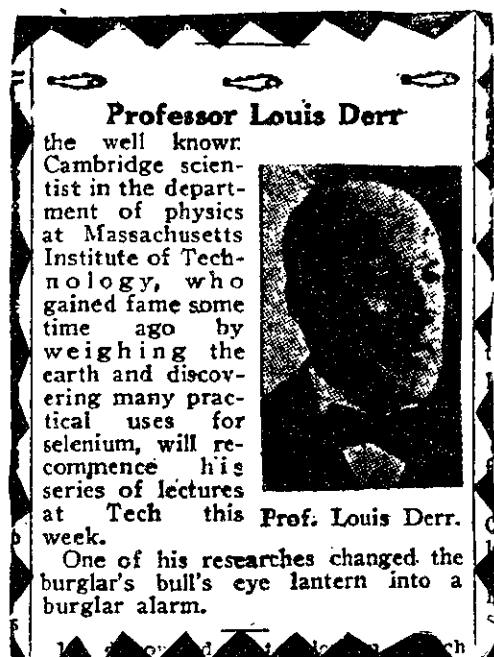

Tickets for Clubs' Concert
Obtainable at Office

The Combined Musical Clubs will present their usual concert program, including F. D. Gage '22, for the approval, of Wellesley in the Wellesley town hall Saturday evening, February 19. Owing to the size of the hall, the dancing for which Frank Gage's orchestra will furnish the music, will be limited to 100 couples. (It will last till 11.30 o'clock). Tickets for the affair may be obtained at the Musical Clubs' office in Walker or at Clements' Drug Store, Wellesley.

The tickets for the concert and dance, of which there will be only 100, will cost one dollar per person, while for the concert alone the price of admission will be 75 cents per person.

Miss E. F. Fisher, M. I. T. '96, Miss Tufts, and Mrs. Ward of Wellesley are co-operating with the Clubs in regard to the chaperones and will act as patronesses for the affair. They have, however, suggested that the men leave their lady friends at the hall, and the chaperones will see that they are taken back to the college dormitories. The reason for this is that special accommodations have been made for 100 men on train No. 14, which leaves Wellesley for Boston at about 11.40 o'clock.

Smith Concert Near

Admission to the Smith Concert will range from fifty cents to two dollars, and tickets may be obtained at the Academy of Music, Northampton, or at the office of the Clubs. The concert has been arranged for Monday, February 21 and the men will leave South Station at two o'clock in the afternoon. Accommodations for Club members have been secured at the Hotel Draper. A regular meeting of the Institute Committee was held yesterday. The executive committee reported that the request of the combined professional societies to hold an All-Technology Smoker in the spring should not be approved since it would not be in keeping with the purpose of the student tax.

The report of H. F. McMillan '21, for the committee in charge of the Technique Electoral Committee elections was accepted and the elections to this committee approved. A motion that the elections of class officers be held hereafter during the second week of April was passed. On motion of A. D. Harvey '21, a committee was appointed to conduct the elections for a class day committee.
