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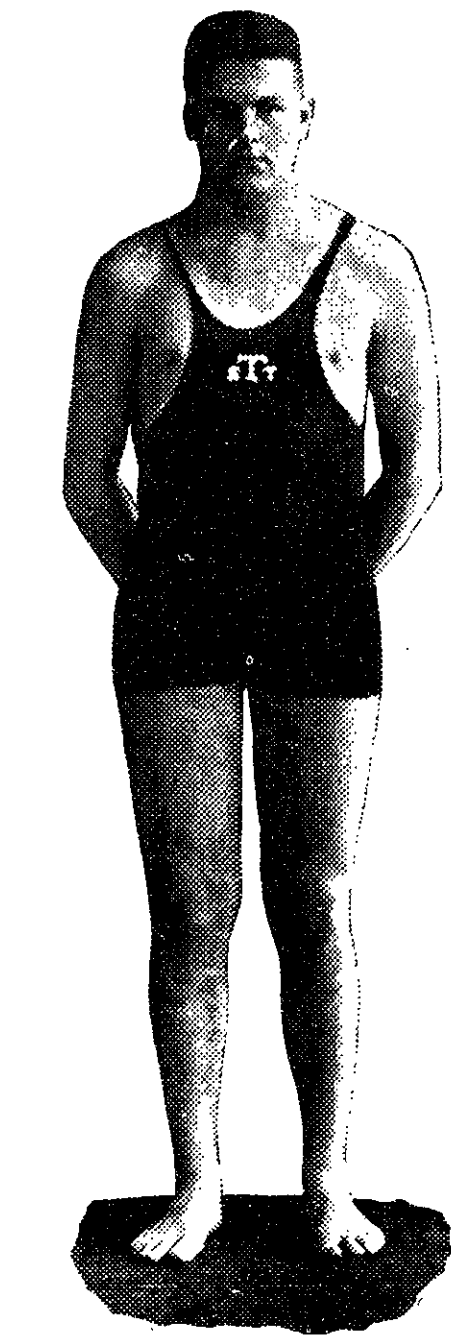

Technology Plays Tufts On Outdoor Ice Tomorrow

Captain John DuVernet's hockey team meets Tufts tomorrow, provided outdoor ice is available. The weather, while quite satisfactory to Harvard Bridge travelers this winter, has been disappointing the hockey management with monotonous regularity. However it is hoped that tomorrow's game can be played.

Tufts has not been showing much this season and a Technology win should result. The regular engineering team will play with the exception of Bill Cauldwell, on right wing, who is threatened with water on the knee. The rink has not been definitely selected and six or seven men will play as decided on the spot.

Play Harvard Next Wednesday
The next big event on the ice calendar is the Harvard game which has been changed from February 17 to Wednesday, February 16, in the Arena. The Crimson is hot on the trail of the intercollegiate bunting and doesn't intend to permit a bunch of engineers to interrupt her triumphant progress. The Technology outfit will be in perfect trim for this game which is the climax of its season. When the famous Harvard team-play and our individual scrappiness comes together a whirlwind finish may be expected.

On February 22 the team will travel to Hanover to play with Dartmouth. The big Green team hasn't been doing very well this season and is anxious to win before the enthusiastic Hanoverians.

Local fans will undoubtedly demand a rubber game between Boston College and Technology. These teams have each beaten the other once this year, the score in each case being 4-3. The deciding game is by no means settled on and if played will close the engineering ice campaign around March 1.

This afternoon the Cardinal and Gray was to have scrimmaged Yale in practice, but the Ell's management has telegraphed that it will be impossible for the team to do so. Yale is to play Dartmouth tomorrow night in Hanover. Manager E. W. Vilett '22 tried to arrange games with both the Bulldog and Princeton but wasn't successful because of the limited number of games these teams are permitted to schedule.

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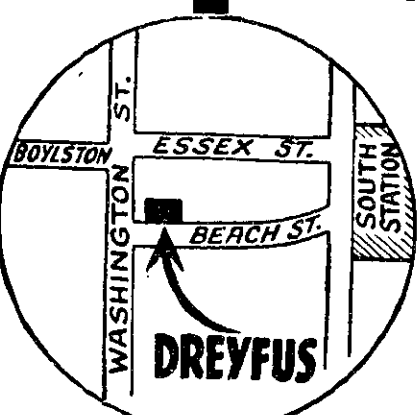
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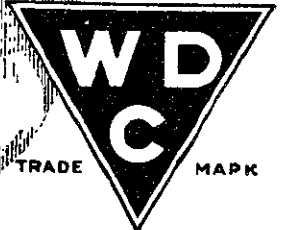
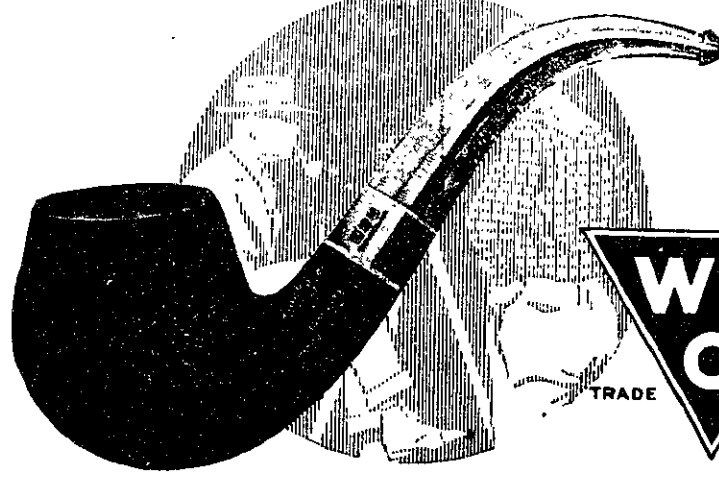
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
