COMBINED MUSICAL CLUBS OF COLUMBIA TAKE TRIP

Columbia's Combined Musical Clubs took a short trip to Wilmington, Del., and Washington, D. C., between the Winter and Spring Semesters. The Wilmington concert was given under the auspices of the Delaware Columbia University Alumni Association and the Washington affair took place jointly with the Musical Clubs of George Washington University.

Columbia University has voted to discontinue their traditional freshman vs. Sophomore flag rush because four men were hurt rather seriously in the last encounter. A snow rush is suggested as a substitute.

The Hoover Relief Fund returns for Princeton show that \$13,698 have been subscribed, 73 per cent of the students numbering the contributors. Princeton's tuition fee has been raised from \$250 to \$300 by the Board of Trustees.

A new method for handling failures has been adopted at Princeton. The men who flunk are to go on probation for one term before being dropped from the University. Also no examinations will be given in the fall to remove conditions.

Princeton alumni from all parts of the country will gather at St. Louis on Lincoln's Birthday for the first annual meeting of the Alumni Association, a recently formed association of Princeton clubs.

More than 1000 students have enrolled in the evening School of Extended Teaching at Syracuse University.

The faculty of Ohio State has recommended for use, when possible, of alternate sets of examinations so that two students with the same questions will not be seated near each other. They believe that this system will do away with cheating.

GYM TEAM RAPIDLY ROUNDING INTO SHAPE FOR MEET

Eddie Hicks, the coach of the gym team, has been hard at work getting the aspirants for positions on the team into shape for the first meet, which occurs in Walker Memorial on February 19 with Harvard and Princeton as rivals. The squad has been cut with the result that 60 men out at the beginning of the year have been reduced to less than 20.

The team for the first meet will probably be chosen during the second week in February. Captain Whipple and Watts Humphrey, last year's captain, have been showing up well on the rings and parallels. Pew, another of last year's stars is doing fine work with the clubs, while R. O. Brink looks promising for the horse.

Coach Hicks has coached the Brown gym team for three years, before which he served on the Brown gym team captaining it during his last year there.

The hopes of the frosh for meeting Harvard 1924 have been dashed owing to the fact that Harvard has not material available for all pieces. However, they will probably meet the Exeter team at Exeter.

PROCURE AIRPLANE ENGINES FOR INSTRUCTIVE PURPOSES

Engines of Various Types Arrive at the Institute

During the past few weeks a number of airplane engines have been received at the Institute for use in the graduate course of Aeronautical Engineering, and for instruction of men in the Air Service Unit.

Quite a number of different types and makes of motors are represented by those which are now in the Steam, Hydraulic and Compressed Air Laboratory, among which are: the Liberty, Hispano Suiza, Benz, Fiat, Renault, Salmson, La Rhone and Clerget. Most of these engines were in use during the war.

It is at present planned to use them for instruction in assembling and construction in connection with a graduate course in Aeronautical Engineering which is being given by Professor Riley of the Mechanical Engineering Department. The Military Science Department also intends to put them to much the same use upon the return of Capt. White, who will take charge of the Air Service Unit in the near future, to the Institute. From present indications, however, they will not be mounted for the purpose of running tests; this, indeed, in some cases, would not be possible without the renewal of a number of parts.

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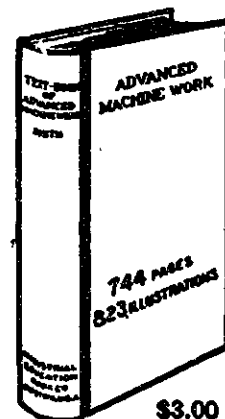
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PROF. PEABODY ELECTED
