S. N. T. C. were organized the following fall.

When the war was over and the Institute back at a regular schedule, the question of the annual Field Day was again brought to mind. It was decided to hold this in the spring and to make a crew race between the two lower classes and one of the events. The Sophomores won this race by a small margin and to my mind it was this race that established crew at Technology. Crowds on the river was of no small size, and it was a yelling, cheering crowd, all intensely interested in a very close race. There were a few races with prep schools and freshmen crews from Harvard that practised on the river, but no definite schedule was made.

Next in the fall of 1919, the crew race was again an event of Field Day and it has now come to stay. During that winter there was a movement to start a varsity crew at the Institute and about 40 men responded to the call. Under the able training of Pat Manning coach, and with the use of a good strong lightweight shell, a remarkably good light varsity crew was put on the river. It was called the first crew of the Rowing Association, since the crew had not been adopted as yet as a varsity sport by the Advisory Council on Athletics. This crew practiced hard and conscientiously and had two races that spring. One with the Norton Boat Club of Worcester and one with the Harvard Varsity Crew. The former it won by four lengths of open water, the other it lost by a quarter length of closed water. A freshman crew was also developed which showed remarkable skill in rowing and they were very successful in their races, winning all but one.

This spring will see a Technology crew on the river again—not one eight, but several, and they are going to do big things. Not too big, for crew is only a baby at the Stute, but with proper nourishment it's going to develop into a big sport.
