INJURIES PROVE FATAL TO PRINCETON SWIMMER

E. A. Smith, member of the Princeton water polo team, died as a result of an operation performed on his ear for a mastoid abscess sustained in the game with the Navy.

An average of ten dollars a man with a total of \$15,213.01, has been subscribed for the Hoover Drive at Princeton.

One hundred and twenty memorial scholarships of \$200 each have been founded by the Board of Trustees of Princeton in memory of the 120 Princeton men who died in the world war.

Dartmouth College has been compelled to announce the closing of its list of applications for admission in the fall of 1921 as over 1200 seek admission and there is room for only 500 more men.

No definite quota has been set for the Dartmouth Hoover Relief fund drive which has just been started, but it is hoped that one dollar a man will be contributed.

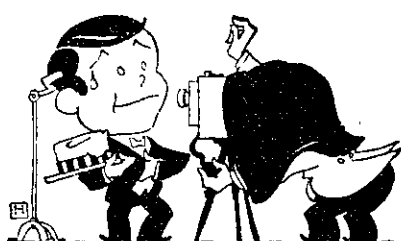

Send Four Delegates

About 41 colleges from all over the country have been invited to attend the conference and about 80 per cent have signified their intention of taking part while 12 have already chosen their delegates. Each one has been asked to send four delegates as it is planned to hold four separate meetings simultaneously; one discussing the problems of student governing bodies, another athletics, another publications, and another musical clubs and dramatics. Every college is asked to have a delegate at each of these meetings. The final meeting on April 16 will be a general one at which the results of the preliminary meetings will be announced. The results will also be published in pamphlet form to be distributed to those colleges interested.

The Institute will be represented by R. H. Smithwick '21, on student governing bodies and general problems; N. W. Russell '22, on athletics; D. C. Carpenter '22, on publications; and Stuart Nixon '21, on musical clubs and dramatics.
