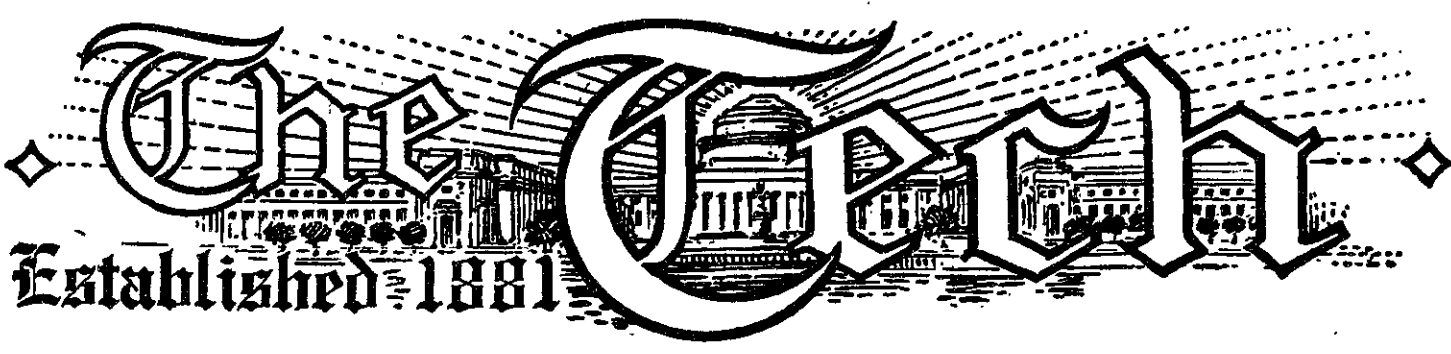


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DEMAND FOR TICKETS CHANGES SHOW DATE

Two Northampton Performances to Be Given March 17—
Could Not Accommodate All
At One Show

RESERVATIONS FRIDAY

Due to the increased demand for tickets, the Tech Show management have found it necessary to change the date of the Northampton performance to Thursday, March 17.

It was originally planned to give one performance at Northampton, Saturday, March 12, and then make a tour of New Hampshire and Maine giving performances at Manchester, N. H., and Portland Me., returning for the regular Boston performances March 18 and 19. The demand for tickets by the Smith College students has swamped the show office and in order to take care of all applications, at least two performances will be necessary at Northampton. Notice from the Academy of Music was received yesterday giving the information that the theatre had been reserved for Tech Show on March 17.

Tickets for these performances will be sent to Northampton the first of next week but reservations will be made for Technology students who apply at the Show office Friday. The maximum price for the matinee will be \$2.00 and for the evening performance will be \$2.50.

HOOVER AND SUZZALLO NOT CONSIDERED FOR PRESIDENCY

Other Information Not Forthcoming in Attempt
of THE TECH to Lift Veil of Secrecy
Surrounding Matter

'PUBLICITY DISTASTEFUL' SAYS HUMPHREYS

"Herbert Hoover is not interested in the presidency of Technology, and President Henry Suzzallo of Washington University has not been considered for the position" said Charles T. Main '76 late Sunday. Mr. Main, who is a member of the Corporation Executive Committee, added that although the committee has not definitely chosen a man, they are actively engaged in the selection. When interviewed, each member of the Executive Committee who was in Boston said that he could not state when the next president would be chosen, but the general opinion seemed to be that the appointment might be announced before the Summer vacation.

EXCEED QUOTA

Technology Raises \$2,200 for
Hoover Fund

The Institute not only secured the quota set for the Hoover fund but carried it \$200 further, according to I. D. Jakobson '21, chairman of the committee in charge. The estimate shows that about \$2,200 were raised by the dinner last Wednesday.

The support accorded the campaign was more than satisfactory, the committee states, the Faculty, the fraternities, and the student body giving full co-operation.

HOLD HOUSE-PARTIES

Fraternities Plan Activities
For Junior Week

The plans of the fraternities for Junior Week center around the house-party, which has come to be part of the Junior Week program for them. The houses will entertain with parties ranging from 10 couples to in some cases as many as 30 couples.

The night of the prom, one room will be reserved for supper for fraternities and other organizations and groups who so desire, at which separate tables will be reserved, which will be decorated with school, fraternity and club banners.

Most of the parties will start Wednesday night, when some kind of entertainment will be given at the fraternity houses. In some cases this will consist of a mock initiation for the benefit of the visitors, or some form of entertainment to get the visitors acquainted with each other.

Saturday night there will be a progressive dance among the various houses. The fraternities are arranged in groups according to the nearness to each other, and each one will run a dance. After dancing at one house for a time they will go to another house, and so on until all the houses in the group have been visited.

Among other things, it is planned to have printed a pamphlet with the names and addresses of all the Junior Week visitors.

Everett Morss '85 said that while he could not say definitely when the selection would take place, the committee was working hard upon the problem, and that "it is very desirable to select a man as soon as possible." Mr. Morss said that a meeting of the Corporation was scheduled for March 10, but that it was very doubtful if the executive committee would have any name to submit at that time.

Walter Humphreys '97, when interviewed gave no information whatever. "Publicity is very distasteful to the committee at this time," he said, "We should like to have no conjectures published." He could not tell when the election would take place, nor would he vouchsafe any information as to whether Hoover or President Suzzallo had been considered.

Francis R. Hart '89 was out of town until Wednesday, but Mrs. Hart confided that she thought that Mr. Hart was "as much in the dark on the matter as you are."

Frederick P. Fish, when called to the telephone said "I don't know anything about it. Get hold of Mr. Walter Humphreys."

The two names which had been most frequently mentioned in the undercurrent of gossip about the Institute are Mr. Hoover and President Suzzallo of Washington. These rumors are now disposed of by Mr. Main's statement. It seems possible that the Institute will remain without an executive for at least six months and possibly longer.

The president of Technology is selected by the Executive Committee, but the committee submits the name chosen to a meeting of the Corporation for ratification before the appointment is made public.

CONDITION IMPROVING

J. B. McCue '23, who received serious burns about the eyes from an acid explosion in the organic laboratory last Wednesday afternoon, is reported as doing nicely by the doctors who are attending him at the Eye and Ear Infirmary on Charles Street. His condition has greatly improved within the last 24 hours and, while the danger to his eyes has not yet passed, the doctors feel confident that he will recover completely. They will, however, not be able to say certainly what the result will be before next week.
