HARVARD SHUT OUT IN TRIANGULAR GYM MEET

Technology Ties Princeton 24-24—Harvard Draws 6—Tumblers Save Day—Club Men Take First and Second

SLIP ON PARALLELS COSTLY

Technology's gymnasts tumbled Princeton to a standstill last Saturday evening, 24-24, while Harvard brought up the rear with six points. Princeton cleaned up in the horizontal bar and the horse, the first two events of the evening's amusement, and seemed to be counting on making the triangular meet a runaway. The Engineers' club twirling ability and skill on the rings kept them in the running, however, and on some first-class tumbling they collected eight points and a tie.

After being shut out on the horizontal and getting but third place on the horse the 350 Technology rooters present couldn't give a "We are happy" very sincerely. Watts Humphrey, last year's captain, remedied the situation by some very clever work on the rings. His arms were powerful enough to enable him to go through the most difficult maneuvers with little apparent effort. Nesmith Thompson, in his first year on the varsity, tied with Tuttle of Princeton for second place in this event.

One of the best exhibitions of the evening was that of Arthur Pew of the Beavers with the Indian clubs. Pew, while at Annapolis, carried off the inter-collegiate championship with the clubs and the smooth way in which he kept them moving took the crowd by storm. Joe Keenan was another of the Engineers who knew the tricks of his weapons. The work of Pew and Keenan accumulated eight points for Technology.

ANNAPOLIS WINS

Navy Swimmers Score 36-17 But Have to Fight

Although swimming in top notch form, the varsity natators took a 36-17 defeat from the Navy, Saturday, at Annapolis, due largely to the work of their star man, Sinclair. Sid Biddell crashed through with a victory in the back stroke, however, adding one more to the list of consecutive victories in this event for the Beavers.

In the plunge, Kendall and Stalbird brought in the points for the Grey and Red, and in the 100 Biddell some pretty good work. On account of the shallowness of the tank, no dives were run off, the back stroke being substituted.

In spite of the defeat the team showed better times than in the recent meets.

Next Saturday the Penn meet at the Y. M. C. A. pool will probably show some fast times, and some close races. The same evening, Harvard and Yale will meet at the pool, making a double attraction of varsity battles.

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L. B. Bailey and S. Lloyd, Jr., Princeton's entrants in the parallels were both small men and handled themselves very neatly. Bailey's stunts were particularly good and he fully deserved first place. K. Campbell took second place and gained three points for Harvard. Campbell coined all of Harvard's points. Captain Jack Whipple, Technology's artist on the parallels had the misfortune to miss his hold at the outset of his second trial.

Before the last event, the tumbling, the score stood Princeton 23, Technology 16, and Harvard 6. Harvard had no men entered in this exercise and so the Tiger and Beaver had the mat to themselves. Ralph Woods and Bob Davidson must have been born with the knack for they flipped all over the mat and walked off with the first two places for Technology. Art Pew tried his hand at this but found the dizzying effects a bit too strong. E. T. Fisher took the remaining point for the Orange and Black.

NAVY BOXERS WIN ALL BOUTS IN MATCH WITH TECHNOLOGY

Technology's boxing team met defeat at the hands of the Navy, Saturday, failing to take a single bout. The 115 pound, 135 pound, and 175 pound bouts were stopped in the second round. The Navy 125 pound man got the decision over Fritz Paul of Technology only after four hard rounds. Fred Koch, acting captain, gave his man a good bit of trouble but finally lost the award. Tommy Proctor performed quite a feat when he boxed three good rounds in the 158 pound class losing by a small margin, and then repeated the operation in the unlimited weight class again barely losing the decision.

The team has been crippled by the loss of Tommy Barnard and Allen Addicks and by the fact that it has no heavyweight.

VARSITY QUINTET DROPS TWO GAMES

Reorganized Combination Is Defeated by Bates and Mass Aggies—Bates' Battle Ends With 19-16 Score

FRESHMEN GRAB TWO VICTORIES

Spratt was the real winner of the Friday night game for Bates, dropping in 11 baskets on free tries. Tillie Tonon was the leading spirit of the Engineers and it was no fault of his that the quintet did not get the heavy end of the score. The score at the end of the first half was 7 to 4 in

favor of the Engineers. In a preliminary match, the freshmen swamped Stoughton High by a score of 53 to 11. It was a rather uninteresting game as the score shows.

Farmers Real Contest

The game with the Farmers proved to be a real contest, every moment being replete with thrills. Good team work and excellent passing opposed extraordinary shooting and knowledge of the floor and it was only after a terrific struggle that the latter conquered.
