T. E. N. REPRESENTED AT BIG CONFERENCE

R. C. Dolle '21 Goes to Chicago To Meet Leaders of Other College Engineering Journals on Advertising Question

SEEK RIGID ORGANIZATION

The Tech Engineering News is sending Robert C. Dolle '21, advertising manager, to the convention of the leading college engineering journals of the country which is scheduled for tomorrow in the Congress Hotel, Chicago.

Dolle will be the sole representative of the T. E. N. at the conference of the "big ten" in college engineering magazines. Dolle will confer on subjects pertinent to the success of such magazines as the T. E. N. with representatives of the Iowa Engineer, Nebraska Blue Print, Cornell Civil Engineer, Sibley Journal of Engineering, (Cornell), Ohio State Engineer, Wisconsin Engineer, Kansas State Agricultural Engineer, Illinois Technograph and Minnesota Technologist.

The conference has been called for the purpose of binding more closely together these engineering journals, for the formation of a rigid organization and the drawing up of a constitution. National advertising and the proposition of having a national advertising representative will come in for a large share of the discussion.

AVOID NEWSPAPER WORK AS LIFE WORK SAYS SEABER

Advertising Man Tells THE TECH Reporters its Drawbacks

Louis W. Seaber, advertising manager for N. W. Ayer Company, and a former newspaperman with experience on the New York Tribune and the Philadelphia North American, gave the news department of THE TECH a portion of the fruits of his experience in journalism in a talk in the faculty room, Walker, Wednesday afternoon.

Seaber stressed the importance of the human element in newswriting and told the reporters who heard him to try always to get the reader's view on whatever story they wrote. He thought that the training obtained on a newspaper, be it a college semi-weekly or a metropolitan daily, was a splendid foundation for whatever work a man wanted to go into but he warned his hearers away from the newspaper game as a life profession.

NEW MEMBERS DISCUSSED BY INSTITUTE COMMITTEE

A regular meeting of the Institute Committee was held yesterday in the faculty room of Walker. On recommendation of R. A. St. Laurent '21 a committee was appointed to consider the eligibility of the T. E. N. for representation on the Institute Committee. St. Laurent pointed out that while the T. E. N. started last year as a part of THE TECH it has now reached a financial position such that it is probable that it will soon sever its connection with THE TECH.

A committee was appointed to look into the policy of the T. A. C. with a view to giving it representation on the Institute Committee. The election of M. N. Waterman '23 by the executive committee to take the place on H. Y. Satterlee '23 who has left school was approved. A committee was appointed to conduct class day elections.

The Opera House was used three years ago for Tech Show, when "Let 'Er Go" was played. Two years ago "The Doubtful Medium" was put on at the Hollis Street Theatre, and last year "Patsy" was played at the Arlington theatre.
