or Davie Jones on her team, nor has Technology, and the chances for a real fight are just so much the better. R. E. Ferdinand says that he believes the Technology team will win fairly easily, but Penn has taken three victories this season and has only been defeated by Anapolis.

Now that it is possible to get opinions of the men on the Anapolis meet the defeat seems very encouraging. The Engineers broke two of the opponents tank records, one in the 40-yard back stroke, which Sid Biddell took in 25 seconds flat, and one in the 60 foot plunge which Stalbird did in 28 seconds. Doane Greene gave Sinclair a hard run in the 220 coming in less than a second after the navy's star man. Sinclair's time was 2.33.

Incidentally the Beavers took the highest score of the season against the undefeated sailors.

The Technology lineup for the Penn meet will be about the same as usual, with possible shifts in the plunge. Webber will probably swim in the 220.

Hope For a Tie With Yale

Technology's boxers are going to meet the Yale aggregation at Walker gym tomorrow. With the team as it was at the beginning of the season a sure victory could be counted upon, but now it is thought that an even break will be a good showing. The loss of A. D. Addicks and Tommy Barnard has made a big hole in the lineup of the team that has been unbroken up to date.

Grapplers Also Lineup Against Yale

The invasion of M. I. T. Saturday in the Walker Gym by the Yale grapplers prophecies a hard-fought meet for the local matmen. Up to date, Yale has been unusually fortunate in the outcome of her meets, the last two antagonists, Brown and Columbia, being defeated by close scores. The Beavers have won two meets and lost three, including one with Brown. However, Yale emerged with an "8" compared to a "10" tallied by Technology in the meet between the two teams last year, which was the first defeat administered Yale in six years.

The Institute lineup includes several of the men that figured in last year's contest. Richards will be in condition to cover the 135 pound place and in the 158 pound class, Briggs will substitute for Thomas, while Humphrey will again endeavor to assert his supremacy in the 175 pound contest. Two prospects are in view for the Institute's representative in the heavyweight match, Russell, who has so far covered the heavy-weight berth for the Institute, and Pinkham, who was of some prominence in army wrestling.

Dartmouth Brings Last Year's Gym Squad

The Dartmouth gym team comes to Walker tomorrow evening at 7.30 o'clock to engage Captain Jack Whipple's husky gymnasts. The Big Green squad is practically the same outfit that conquered the Beavers last year with a two point lead. Technology will display the same lineup that faced Princeton and Harvard a week ago.

This will be the first meet of the season for Dartmouth and with Technology showing the class that tied Princeton it promises to be a warm initiation. The Engineers feel particularly strong with the clubs, both Art Pew and Joe Keenan being top-notch men in the event. M. S. Beggs is Dartmouth's best bet in this line, having made the team last year as a freshman. Beggs and Homer represent the Hanoverians on the parallels and they're likely to have very hard sledding. Both Captain Whipple and last year's captain, Watts Humphrey, are technical specialists on the two bars and are particularly anxious to manufacture a few points in the event because the Tigers shut them out.

R. E. Wilde performs a double role as captain and manager of the Dartmouth strong men. He is a tumbler and flyer on the rings and in each event will meet strong opposition. Watts Humphrey and Nesmith Thompson will keep him busy on the rings and Ralph Woods and Bob Davidson, who took the first two places last Saturday will be on hand with their ability in the whirling line.

Quintet Plays Two Games Away

Coach J. R. Allen and his husky charges have left for New York where they will meet Brooklyn Polytech tonight and Drexel Institute in Philadelphia tomorrow night. The team has vastly improved in its practice this past week and expects to come home with two scalps attached to its belt. Both games promise to be full of thrills, the record of the Brooklyn team pointing towards a close contest for any visiting team. It is a strengthened and enthusiastic team which is making the trip however and a great record is expected of it.

The members of the team making the trip are: Landis and Burke, forwards; Bretting, center, and Tonon and Hubbard, guards. Blood and Boyer are substitutes, and with Coach Allen, the roster is complete. The lineup has two noticeable changes, Tonon moving back to guard and Landis and Burke replacing Tonon and Boyer. Coach Allen has been perfecting the team work in the last few weeks and he figures that the jinx will be banished.

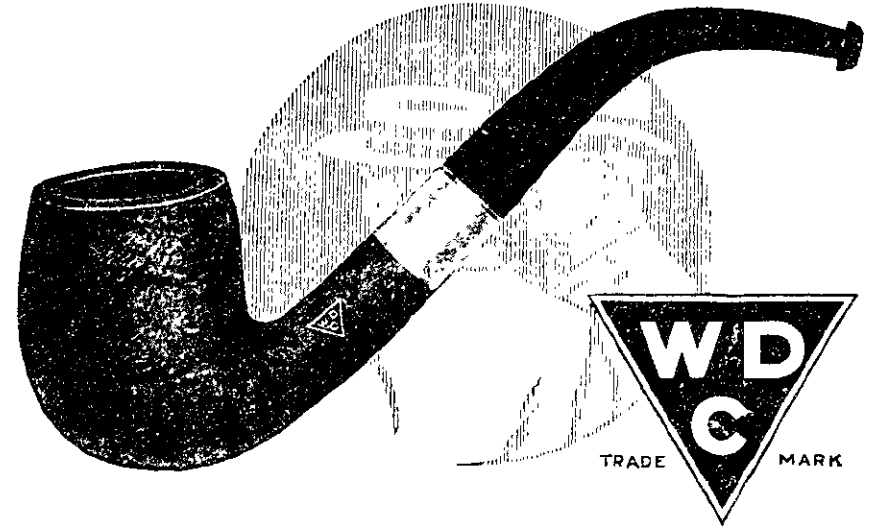
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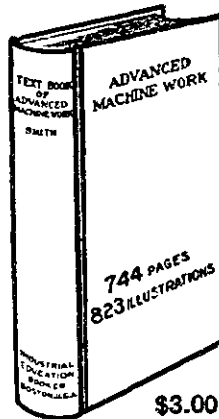
About fifteen Institute runners are entered in the N. E. A. A. U. meet
