Puck Chasers Make Poor Showing

The Institute hockey team playing the poorest it has at any time this season dropped the final contest of the M. I. T.-Boston College series Friday night at the Arena by a 5-1 score. At no time did the Technology team display the type of playing that has been an important part in previous victories. Boston College was master of the situation at all times and seldom did the puck find its way to the Institute goal.

Hughie Nickle, who was not in the lineup for the Dartmouth contest played his usual excellent game, but in the final period the B. C. forwards overworked Hughie and three times the puck got past him in this period. Nickle was kept on the alert throughout the game and made some splendid stops. The two MacNeil brothers were able to get away with little of their clever passing which has been a feature in the past. At point, Captain DuVernet was not so effective with his body checking and was inclined to play the puck instead of the man.

For Boston College, Chief Morrissey played a brilliant game as did Duffy and Healey. The latter player and Garrity were on the warpath and aided in marring the game with unnecessary roughness and were put off the ice along with N. MacNeil and Taylor. Early in the game Leon Morrissey got a loose puck in the mouth which knocked out a tooth, but nevertheless returned to the game. Ed Delaney again showed that he well deserved a place on the varsity team and in the aggregate made a very satisfactory showing despite the fact that he should have been on the opposite wing, as he was unable to shoot at the net.

Quintet Loses Both Contests

The varsity quintet is still bound by its jinx as evidenced by the two games lost on its trip to New York and Philadelphia last Friday and Saturday. The game on Friday night with the fast Brooklyn Polytech was lost after a hard battle by the score of 27 to 14. O'Brien was the star for the Polytech while Tonon played his usual stellar game. The game was rather loosely played and did not bring out any extraordinary playing.

Much complaint is expressed over the game with Drexel Institute of Philadelphia on Saturday night, in which Drexel came out with the heavy end of a 32 to 22 score.
