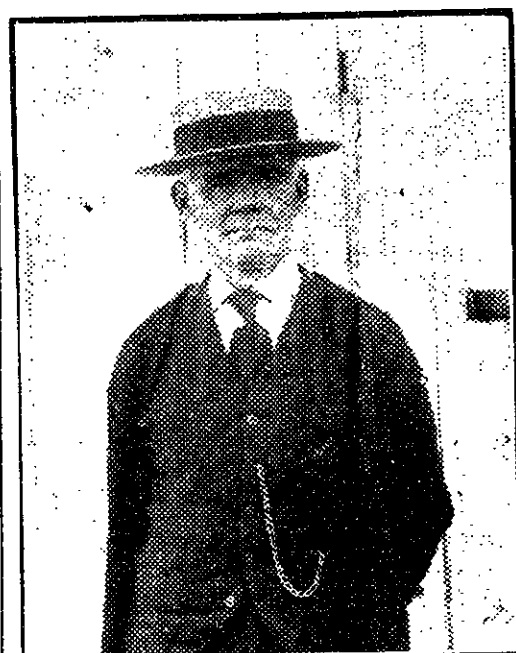
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NEW CLASS DAY SCANDAL AVERTED

HARVARD SWIMMERS DEFEATED 36 TO 17

Institute Natators Capture Relay and Three Firsts — Purinton's Work in the Dive Remarkable

PALMER TIES IN FIFTY

Wednesday night M. I. T. swimming team gained a 36-17 victory over Harvard, and the Technology frosh swamped their rivals. Palmer '23, was the hero of the evening, tying for first in the fifty, and helping win the relay. Purinton did some excellent diving, and thus brought down five points for the Institute. Thomas of Harvard surprised the crowd by going 67 feet and winning with last plunge of the evening, his first try not having been good enough to place. The final score was 36-17, favoring the Beavers.

In the freshman meet Harvard only got one second place in the fifty. The rest was an easy victory. Captain L. P. Marsh, finished up the freshman season by breaking his own 100 yard record, pacing it in 1 minute 2 3-5 seconds.

The varsity relay was hotly contested throughout. Colton of Technology, got a slight lead over Wyman, Harvard. But, in the second lap Cross, Harvard, pulled up to, and over a yard past Trowbridge of Technology. Bidell closed up most of this gap while Johnson was swimming the third lap for Harvard, and Palmer of Technology slapped the wall barely a foot ahead of Brackett.

CHEMICALS HAVE ALL-DAY TOUR

A mill that can produce 50 miles of cloth an hour was the goal of the Chemical Society's all-day trip Wednesday. Seventy members of the society, accompanied by Professors Norris and Haslam, left north station in two special cars on the 9.00 o'clock train, and were met at the station in Manchester, N. H., by their hosts from the Amoskeag Cotton and Woolen Mills.

The trip was arranged by Mr. W. K. Robbins, chief chemist of the plant. The men were given a talk by him, explaining the things to be seen, and typewritten copies of the itinerary to be followed were distributed. The men had dinner in the company's cafeteria, and afterwards continued their inspection of the various departments. The principle processes are scouring, bleaching, and dyeing the cotton and wool, and then the spinning of the thread and weaving of the cloth.

This is the largest single mill of its kind in the world. It covers 160 acres of ground, and employs 1600 men. Mr. W. K. Robbins, who arranged the trip, although not an Institute Graduate, taught quantitative analysis and organic chemistry here quite a few years ago.
