SCANDINAVIAN-AMERICAN FUND OFFERS FOREIGN FELLOWSHIPS

Gives Students Opportunity For Graduate Study Abroad

The American-Scandinavian Foundation in pursuance of its policy will award 20 traveling fellowships in the Scandinavian countries, 10 in Sweden, 5 in Denmark, and 5 in Norway. The fellowships are awarded for most of the branches of academic and scientific study, almost every branch of engineering being included. The fellowships are of \$1,000.00 each. Information relative to application for admission may be obtained by consulting Professor Hovgaard at his office 1-330.

The foundation was instituted in accordance with the will of Niels Poulsen of Brooklyn, who, at his death in 1912, left forty million dollars for the object of cultivating closer relations between America and the Scandinavian countries, by the exchange of students and the promotion of the knowledge of each other. The funds for the fellowships were raised in this country by Dr. Henry Goddard Leach within the period of one year. Dr. Hamilton Holt was elected president last year on the death of its first president, Professor W. H. Schofield. There is a corresponding organization on the other side, corresponding to the American foundation, the Sverige-Amerika Stiftelsen. This organization sends 20 fellows to America.

An interesting insight into the difficulties which beset a fellow of the fund was given by C. C. Stewart '19, an instructor in the chemistry department. Stewart was over last year as a student, and since last year was the first of the fellowships, he may be considered a pioneer. Anyone desiring to hear him speak in person, may have that opportunity at the Cosmopolitan Club supper Friday night, as he will address them on this subject. He said that the sum of money given as a fellowship will cover about half of the expense incurred. He also advises that any men who are not proficient in languages not to apply for a fellowship in as much as all of the courses require a speaking knowledge of the tongue of the country in which they are given. Further, he states that in his opinion, the students sent over by the fund are judged as representative specimens of Americans by the people over there.

The Sunday program includes a session at 10 o'clock in the morning at the Harvard Union, luncheon at the Union at 1 o'clock, an afternoon conference, and a reception of the visiting delegates at 8.30 in the vestry room of Temple Israel.

SAWAMURA PROPOSES NEW M. I. T. INTERNATIONAL CLUB

Internal Friction In Cosmopolitans Cause of Student's Action

A club to be known as the International Club of M.I.T. is contemplated by foreign students at the Institute under the leadership of Sukesaku Sawamura, '23. Approval by the Institute Committee will be sought next term when the club will be formed.

Sawamura became displeased with the attitude toward certain of his proposals taken by the Cosmopolitan Club of which he has been a member and he will tender his resignation to that body at tonight's meeting. He says there are other foreign students who think well of his plan to form an International Club here. The purpose of the organization will be to promote friendship and co-operation between the individual foreign students at Technology much after the same way as the League of Nations does among the countries.

Sawamura issued a statement last night expounding his reasons for withdrawing from the Cosmopolitan Club and setting forth the need and purpose of the forthcoming International Club.

He says in part: "Is it not true that persons seek escape from what they term the hardships of life in the homeland through the channels of emigration? Witness the stream of humanity pouring into the country day after day, a stream composed in part, at least, of individuals who are averse to the pursuit of happiness and liberty under the code of law existing in the land of their birth. These individuals are but seeking a new setting for their activities."

"The same thing applies to an association. As soon as an active member realizes a weakness, he proposes amendments, and if these are not accepted he submits his resignation and seeks a new setting, to wit another association, for his activities. If a suitable association does not exist he is perfectly justified in uniting himself with persons who believe as he does in the formation of a new association."

"The forthcoming International Club of M. I. T. is a phase of a declaration of independence, the justification of which no one can deny."

"Ament the purpose of the organization, just as it is the loyal duty of each nation to promote the international friendship and co-operation so it is the duty of individuals of those nations to promote and foster friendship and the spirit of co-operation among themselves. The International Club of M. I. T. will be the setting for these activities and its birth may add a bright feature to the international affairs of all concerned."

The following officers were elected, Charles A. Clarke, president; B. T. Williston, vice president; R. A. Hale secretary and treasurer.

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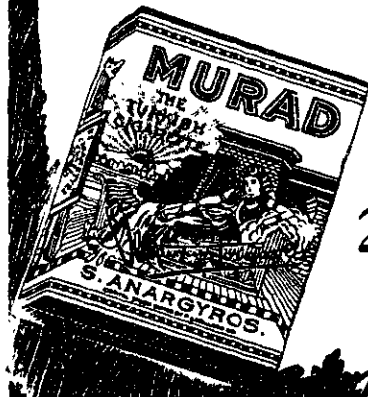
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
