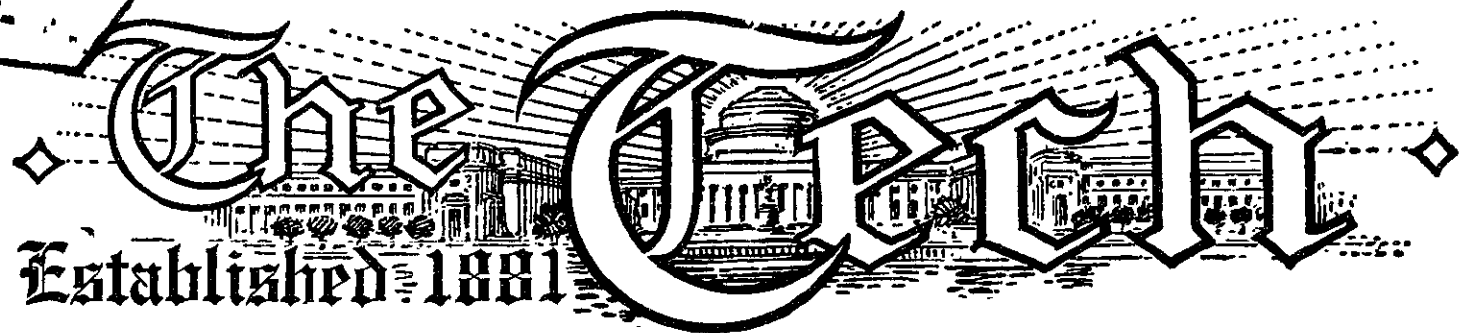


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RADIO SOCIETY DINES 400 'HAMS'

H. P. Maxim '86 Predicts Conflict Between Vested Interests and Amateurs—Other Noted Radio Men Talk

MANY SOCIETIES REPRESENTED

"I cannot predict what can happen in five years but my theory is that there will be a great conflict between vested interests and amateurs, if amateurs can talk with the western coast without the aid of telegraph companies," exclaimed H. P. Maxim '86 before 400 guests of the M. I. T. Radio Society last Saturday evening at its annual banquet in Walker Memorial.

Mr. Maxim made mention of the legislation before Congress to place the control of all radio stations in the hands of the Navy department and showed himself opposed to the restrictions which would practically put every amateur out of business.

Another familiar figure at the dinner was Mr. Charles C. Kloster, Federal radio inspector of the 1st district, whom nearly every licensed "ham" had met when taking registration tests at the custom house. He spoke of the wireless as a great reservoir of radio experience which can be efficiently tapped when the company needs experienced operators.

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C. C. STEWART '19 RECOUNTS SCANDINAVIAN EXPERIENCES

Tells Cosmopolitan Club of Swedish Habits and Customs

That the United States could learn much from the Scandinavian countries was the point emphasized by C. C. Stewart '19, in his talk to the Cosmopolitan Club Friday night. Stewart went over to the Norse countries as an exchange student, having been awarded a fellowship by the American-Scandinavian Foundation.

Stewart stated that higher standards of morality and culture exist in Sweden than in America. For instance, he said that over there all classes go to the opera and likewise the interest in art is very general. Furthermore he said that the Scandinavian manufacturers are run with a minimum of waste which American plants would do well to copy. The talk was illustrated by lantern slides.

Sawamura Resigns

After Stewart had concluded, Suke-saka Sawamura '23 asked to speak. Sawamura said the club was narrow because it found fault with his language instead of listening to what he said. He added that the vote of censure, which was attempted at the last meeting, was unfair because it was not given enough discussion. Then Sawamura resigned from the club, stating that his views differed from that held by the members.

Juntaro Kawai '21, the treasurer of the club and also from Japan, said that as an officer of the club he thanked Sawamura for his courtesy in giving advice, and that as a Japanese student he regretted that Sawamura was leaving the club.

PROF. SEAVER GRANTED LEAVE FROM INSTITUTE

Will Investigate Period of Spanish History—Sails Within a Fortnight—To Spend Leave In Spain

WILL RETURN FOR FALL TERM

Professor H. L. Seaver of the Department of English has been granted a leave of absence to go to Spain in order to perform some research in history. His leave of absence begins the third term. Mrs. Seaver will accompany him on the trip and they will start on a boat leaving Boston in two weeks for Spain. They will return in time for Professor Seaver to resume his duties before the fall term.

Professor Seaver has been long interested in performing this research and welcomes this opportunity to go to Spain in order to conduct the investigation. The research is to be on some particular period of Spanish history, the exact name of which Professor Seaver has not disclosed.

He and Mrs. Seaver will probably select some advantageous point from which he can conduct his research and will remain in and around this point during their stay.

TO DISCUSS PUBLICITY

New Point for I. C. U. G. Meeting Here in April

The executive committee of the Intercollegiate Conference on Undergraduate Government has brought up another point for discussion at the meeting which will be held at Technology April 15 and 16. This point is the question of finding out how colleges throughout the country promote the right kind of newspaper and magazine publicity.

To obtain a confidential report on this question, R. C. Burrus '22, chairman of the committee on college relations, has been chosen to head a committee to collect information relative to the question. His committee has mailed to the institutions invited to attend the conference a questionnaire. This asks what plans the institution addressed has for publicity, and what plans the professional staff has for the administration and control of student publicity and what means it takes to meet adverse criticism of the local press.

This question of publicity will not be taken up in any of the simultaneous meetings, but will be discussed in the general meeting just previous to the close of the conference.

George Owen, who has been elected captain of the Harvard hockey team, is the son of Professor George Owen of the department of Naval Architecture. The professor was graduated at the Institute in 1894 and is a member of Phi Beta Epsilon fraternity.

SCOTT NEARING SPEAKS ON ECONOMIC CRISIS

Labor Bears Brunt of Periods of Depression While Stock and Bondholders Winter at Palm Beach Is Point

QUESTIONNAIRE FOLLOWED

"An economic crisis is the period during which the little man sells or is sold out—and that the big man buys at a few cents on the dollar," was a point brought out by Professor Scott Nearing in his lecture here yesterday afternoon on the subject of "Economic Crisis." This question of economic crisis is attracting attention in every country in the world at the present time, the difficulty being due to lack of opportunity to dispose of the products of industry, or as it is commonly called "over-production." Every man for himself and the devil (of bankruptcy) take the hindmost is the ethics of business.

Workers Stand Depression

The third group to suffer is the workers. An example is the Pennsylvania Railroad, which discharged thousands of its employees when the drop in revenue came. This was the method followed in other cases and the laborers stood the brunt of the loss, while the coupon clippers spent the winter at Palm Beach.

After the address, the students and Faculty present, who filled the hall, asked many questions in regard to the theories advanced. These were answered in a direct and satisfactory way. The audience seemed to be particularly interested in the relations of capital and labor, and the return to labor from production. The meeting was arranged by Corporation XV. D. D. Spoor '22, president of the Corporation, introduced the speaker.

APPROVE CHANGES IN DISTANCE RUN

I. C. A. A. A. Executive Committee Acts on Technology's Recommendation and Changes Details

TED SPITZ REJOINS TRACK TEAM

T. M. Taylor '22, manager of the track team was elected a member of the executive committee of the I. C. A. A. A. Saturday afternoon at a meeting of the association in New York. Taylor was Technology's representative at the meeting.

The 45th annual track and field championships for this spring were awarded to Harvard, and will be held at the Stadium May 27 and 28.

Technology's views on certain changes which had been suggested prior to the meeting, such as a Monday date for the cross country run, and the maintenance of the two-mile run on the program of events at the big meet, all met with majority approval at the meeting. Coach Frank H. Kanaly recently was quoted in the Boston Transcript as being opposed to the change from a two-mile run to one three miles in length, and the majority of the delegates present at the meeting upheld Kanaly's view on the matter and the two-mile run will again be a feature of the championships.

It was voted to hold the annual varsity and freshman cross-country championship races early on the Monday preceding Thanksgiving Day. These events will be run yearly over the Van Courtland Park course in New York, thus giving the contests a standard course in place of the shifting venue of the past.
