A number of Harvard's rowing victories are attributed in part to the way in which Pierson handled his crew.

GIVES VIEWS ON '20TH CENTURY CHRISTIANITY'

According to N. C. Fetter, Jr., student pastor of the First Baptist Church of Boston, a true relationship between employer and employee is necessary for the development of Christianity in the factories of this country. Mr. Fetter spoke at the meeting conducted by the T. C. A. in Walker Sunday night.

The subject of his talk was "Twentieth Century Christianity". Under the present laws, he stated, the ideal relationship between employer and laborer is not possible, inasmuch as it could not be thought to be the best Christian one. If the laws were altered as they were in some foreign countries, the relationship would conform more nearly to the laws governing the Christian religion. He also advanced the point that the natural resources were God-given and should be utilized from a Christian standpoint.

GYMNASTS TRAIL PENN AND HAVERFORD IN CLOSE MEET

Humphrey and Woods Display Skill For Technology

Captain Jack Whipple's gymnasts took two firsts, 14 points, and last place in the nip and tuck triangular meet with Penn and Haverford at Haverford last Saturday night. Penn carried off the victory with a score of 21, while Haverford filled the role of second-best capturing 19 points. Both of these teams were very clever and practiced outfits, showing smoother form than anything seen in Walker this year.
