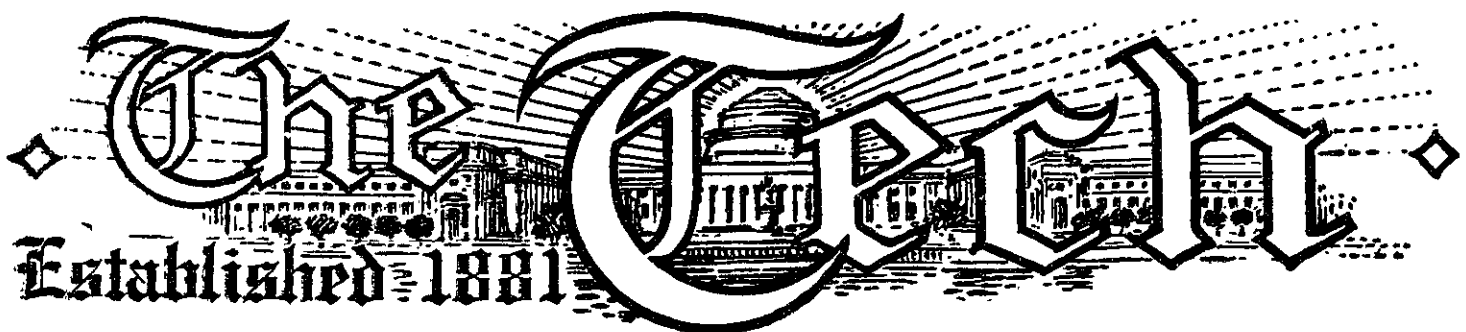

INSTITUTE HOPES HIGH IN N.E. CHAMPIONSHIPS

Biddell and Greene Expected to Cop Firsts — Amherst and Brown Entered — Harvard May Be Represented

DAVEY JONES AND GORDON SMITH INELIGIBLE

Technology natators will have the chance of the season to show their speed against Eastern stars in the New England Intercollegiate tomorrow night at the Y. M. C. A. pool. With Doane Greene in the pink of condition, and Sid Biddell ready to enter the lists in top notch form, there is a strong probability that the Institute men will not come away empty-handed.

Besides Technology, Amherst, Brown, Dartmouth, and Boston University will be represented, and possibly Harvard, Wesleyan, and Williams. There will be some fast men in practically every event in the meet. Amherst is sending the speedy Damon to compete in the dashes. He will have to meet besides Biddell, a fast pair in Roberts and Taylor of Dartmouth. Doane Greene will have to match his speed against Don Richardson of Boston University, who has been showing some mighty good time, and Whitcomb of Brown. Purinton and Ferdinand will take the spring board for the Beavers, defying Dawson of Brown to do his best. Gorman also of the Providence aggregation will probably keep Boyce, Kendall, Welch and Stalbird busy holding up the Engineers' plunging laurels.

Perhaps it is just as well for all other competitors that Davey Jones and Gordon Smith are as freshmen ineligible in any events except the brown freshman relay team, but in this event they will probably scorch the water.

The meet will begin promptly at 8 o'clock, and the admission will be one dollar. As the meet concerns all New England's colleges, and as a large crowd is expected, no reduction can be made to T. C. A. men. The trials, and semi-finals for the meet will be run off in the afternoon, the admission for this being 50 cents.

NEARLY SOLD OUT

Tech Show Management Turns 200 Away for Friday

Over 200 applicants for Friday night tickets for "The Purple Dragon" were required to leave the Tech Show ticket window this week empty handed, due to the inability of the show treasurer to fill their applications. Never in the history of the show has there been such a demand for tickets and despite the fact that the largest theatre in Boston has been leased for the performances, the demand exceeded the supply.

Only a few tickets for the Saturday afternoon performance remain, which may be had upon application at the show office, and tickets for the Alumni performance will be ready for distribution today.

Next Sunday morning at 9 o'clock all the units of the show will convene at the Boston Opera House for a dress rehearsal and in order to insure against interruptions for refreshments, two meals will be served to the entire ensemble. For the first time this season, the cast, chorus and ballet will adorn the costumes designed under the watchful eyes of the co-eds and go through the entire production with the requisite props and scenery as a background instead of the gray walls of the Institute.

This will be the last dress rehearsal prior to the Northampton performances. The troupe will leave North Station Thursday morning at 7 o'clock for "Smith" giving the first performance that afternoon at the Academy of Music, Northampton, Mass.

SECURE ROGERS

Ex-Lumberjack Coming Here for Combined Societies

"The present unrest is caused not so much by the activities of the agitator, as the passiveness of employers and of the citizens who call themselves Americans", is a statement made by Sherman Rogers in a recent talk before the Chamber of Commerce in New York City. The Combined Societies have been successful in obtaining Mr. Rogers for the large Smoker to be given in Walker, Wednesday, March 30. It is noteworthy that Mr. Rogers has co-operated with the Combined Societies to the extent of cutting his fee in half, because of the financial difficulties they faced in putting on this smoker.

Uses Concrete Illustrations

Because of his unusual understanding of men, and the wealth of experience obtained in walks of life from that of a North woods lumberjack to the position of an employer, Mr. Rogers has an exceptional understanding of the problems in industrial relations, and it is from this field of Industrial Relations that he will choose his subject of address at Technology. He believes that the present unrest is a state of mind, and not a condition of the heart, and that education of people in all walks of life is very fundamental in the elimination of labor unrest. Nor are his views pure theory, but are on the contrary based on concrete incidents.

Lawrence W. Conant of Camden, N. Y., was elected first marshall of the class of 1921. Henri P. Junod of New York second marshall, and Raymond A. St. Laurent of Mattapan, third marshall in the elections for Senior Class Day committee. The elections to the committee were ratified by the Institute Committee yesterday practically without discussion.

A. D. Harvey '21 assailed the committee for what he termed "high-handed methods" of conducting the election. He alleged they failed to announce certain of their methods of conducting the election until after the procedure had been carried through. F. B. Kittredge '21 replied to Harvey that certain recommendations for future elections read by K. R. Sutherland '21, chairman of the committee on the elections in his report overcame Mr. Harvey's objections. Sutherland defended his committee, saying that part of the difficulties encountered were due to the fact that the Hare system of voting was new at the Institute.

Sketch of Marshalls

Conant, who was elected first marshall, is a member of Theta Delta Chi fraternity and is treasurer of the Institute Committee, chairman of the budget committee of the Institute Committee and a member of the finance committee.

Conant resigned recently from the presidency of Corporation XV. He has been prominent in Institute activities all through his four years at Technology. He entered here from Exeter academy, made his Field Day relay team as a freshman and ran on the freshman 390 relay team at the B. A. A. games that winter. He

INSTITUTE MOGULS GIVE OUT THIRD TERM FACTS

Students planning to attend the exercises of the Institute next term are requested by the Bursar to pay their tuition. This consists of \$100 tuition and \$3 student tax, except for those who entered before October, 1918, who must pay \$83 and \$3 student tax.

According to Professor Merrill, secretary of the Faculty, there is no 50 per cent rule in effect this term, and marks given in courses which do not end this term are regarded purely as informal just as the five weeks reports are. A failure recorded on the March report may be brought up to a satisfactory mark in June by passing the examination which covers two terms of work. This rule works both ways, that is a P received in March will not entitle a student to credit in the second term's work if a failure is made in the June examination.

The mark received in courses ending this term is regarded as final and any conditions incurred at this time may not be removed until next September. First and second year students will not receive their reports until the week after vacation.

PENN STUDENTS OFF TO FIGHT KIKO IN PANAMA

Eight Pennsylvania students, natives of Panama, have announced that they are ready to serve their country in its present crisis and so have sent a message to their country's representative in Washington to that effect. It may result, then, that Penn and Technology will be fighting on opposite sides of the Central American war, if Kiko, the Institute's representative, gets into action.

It was recently announced that the University of California is to have a \$1,000,000 stadium that will seat 60,000 persons and which will be ready for the 1922 football season.

The British universities are seeking more American students and, in an effort to secure them, are offering special degrees to scholars from this country.

Princeton will have four new dormitories and a new school of Architecture in the near future, it has been recently announced. If the present plans are followed, the foundations of the dormitories will be laid this spring.

DR. EDMUNDS SUBSTITUTES FOR JOHN R. FREEMAN '76

Dr. Charles K. Edmunds head of the Canton Chinese College held the interest of the Faculty Club Wednesday night with his address on China. Unable to come to Boston because of illness Mr. Freeman advised the Faculty Club to get Dr. Edmunds who is at present in the United States, to talk on China.

Dr. Edmunds who has traversed over 40,000 miles of Chinese territory and is acquainted with engineering education in southern China, gave an interesting sketch of the development of her resources, illustrated with the aid of a number of lantern slides.

HEADS SWARTHMORE

Prof. Aydelotte Chosen President of Penn. College

Professor Frank Aydelotte, of the English Department at the Institute has been recently elected to the presidency of Swarthmore College. He will leave to assume his duties about the first of July. He will stay at the Institute during the third term but has been granted leave of absence by the Faculty in order to finish a book that he is now engaged upon and will do no teaching during his stay here.

Professor Aydelotte is a graduate of Indiana University where he received the degree of A.B. in 1900. He received his A.M. degrees from Harvard in 1903 and afterwards went as a Rhodes scholar to Oxford where he studied from 1905 to 1907 receiving the degree of B.Litt. He returned to this country in 1908 to take an appointment as assistant professor of English at Indiana University and taught there from 1908 to 1915. Professor Aydelotte came to the Institute in 1915 as full professor of English and has since then been connected with the English Department.

During the war he was national director of the war issues course which was given in connection with the S. A. T. C. in every college. After the war the Rhodes scholarships were resumed and the selection of scholars was placed in the hands of former Rhodes scholars. Professor Aydelotte was given leave of absence from the Institute last year to organize the committee of selection and is now in general charge of the operation of Rhodes scholarships in the United States.
