AN UNHEALTHY ATMOSPHERE

DURING the afternoons of this winter term the gymnasium in the Walker Memorial has been in almost constant use by the freshman gym classes and the athletic teams. It has become more and more evident to the men working in the activities offices on the third floor, and even to those who happen to be on the second floor of the building, that the ventilating system of the gymnasium is being sadly overtaxed.

A few simple changes would effect a remedy for this nuisance. Fans could be installed in the outside walls of the gym to suck out the stale air; the doors leading into the corridor could be kept closed more than they are now, and the men who are exercising in the gym could desist from going back and forth through the corridor in their gym suits.

The adoption of these suggestions would relieve the discomfort not only of those who are at work elsewhere in the building, but also of those who now have to get their practice and exercise in the highly unhealthy atmosphere now prevailing in the gym.

FREE MEALS AT WALKER

THE Superintendent of the Walker dining hall has called attention to the fact that four to ten men walk out of the room each day without paying their checks. That there are dishonest men among us here at the Institute is a thing that has been known ever since the honor system has been in effect with regard to the selling of copies of THE TECH, but it was not thought that there are so many students who would deliberately steal a meal. If these men really can not afford to pay for their food, no doubt the superintendent will be glad to give it to them gratis. They should not, however, be allowed to degrade Technology by their actions, and they should be reminded of their monetary obligation by other students, whenever they seem to forget it.

ELECTORAL COMMITTEE THINKS ELECTION NEAR

Technique Electoral Committee has again cut down the list of nominees until but two namely Hall Kirkham and J. C. Willson, remain as candidates for the position of Editor-in-chief of Technique 1923. At the present time a deadlock has developed in the ranks of the committee, neither of the two men having the required three-quarters vote of those members present necessary for their election, according to the new constitution adopted by this year's board. Although the candidates have been fairly well discussed, to obtain a better insight into the qualities and possible lack of qualities, a motion was made and passed at the last meeting to send a telegram to both Andover and Exeter to get the record of the candidates while they were at prep school. In this way, it is hoped to get a better view on all sides of the matter. G. R. Johnson was appointed to carry this out.

The subject of the election of a photographic editor of Technique 1923 was brought to the attention of the committee and it was decided to run a competition for this position. With this end in view, a sub-committee was appointed by the chairman, consisting of C. A. Brantingham, P. B. Brown and A. C. Hampton, to arrange the matter.

This committee has announced that a meeting of all men interested will be held at 1 o'clock on Saturday in the Technique office, when further details will be announced. It is hoped to obtain Tom Alder, who holds down that position on this year's book, to assist in the matter and help in the final decision. In general, all pictures
