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1924 BOXERS CLINCH FRAY WITH ANDOVER

Frosh Lose First Bout, But Come Back Strong, Cleaning Up Meet at Andover by Score of 4-1

SMITH '24 WINS FASTEST BOUT

Outclassing their opponents in nearly every bout, the Technology freshman boxing team emerged on the long end of a 4-1 score in a dual meet with the Andover mittmen, held in the Academy gymnasium Wednesday afternoon. The Cardinal and Gray yearlings showed the advantage of superior coaching and condition, and had no trouble in winning four of the five tilts, dropping the bout in the 158-lb. class by only a shade.

The visitors pried open the fray in good style, when Ed Moll, fighting for the freshmen in the 145-lb. class, outboxed Mahoney, the Andover captain, in two of their three rounds. In the first session Mahoney was content to spar, while Moll landed time and again to the face with a right swing. In the next period, however, the local lad began to mix it up, and the fighting toward the end of the round was fast and furious, with neither boy having an appreciable advantage. Mahoney tired under Moll's fighting in the last session, however, and referee Boutellier awarded the decision to the Technology man.

Smith Kayos Andover Lad

In the 115-lb. division, Al Lindsey of the Beaver cubs won a clean-cut verdict over Fletcher of Andover. Lindsey shows signs of being one of the best varsity prospects in years, and he had no trouble in hitting his less experienced opponent almost at will. Charlie Kuhn added another list of Institute victories by outpointing Kellogg in the 135-lb. class. Kuhn was content to spar during the first round, but in the last two sessions he drove his man around the ring, and had him all ready for the knockout blow when the final bell rang.

The best bout of the afternoon, from the viewpoint of the spectators, was the clash between Bob Smith of Technology and Tony Rossi of Andover in the 125-lb. division. At the clang of the bell both lads went at it hammer and tongs. Rossi lacked the science and footwork shown by his adversary, but he made up for this by aggressiveness, and for two periods a real slugging match was staged. In the final session the pace began to tell on Rossi, and Smith, waiting for an opening, found his chance, and planted a left swing with all his weight behind it on Rossi's jaw. The Andover gamester went down for the count, and the Technology win column showed four tallies.

Andover fans had an opportunity for real cheering in the final bout of the day, in which Hudner of the Academy, fighting in the 158-lb. class, outpointed Hereford of the Beavers, and snared the only victory of the afternoon for Phillipsians. The summary:

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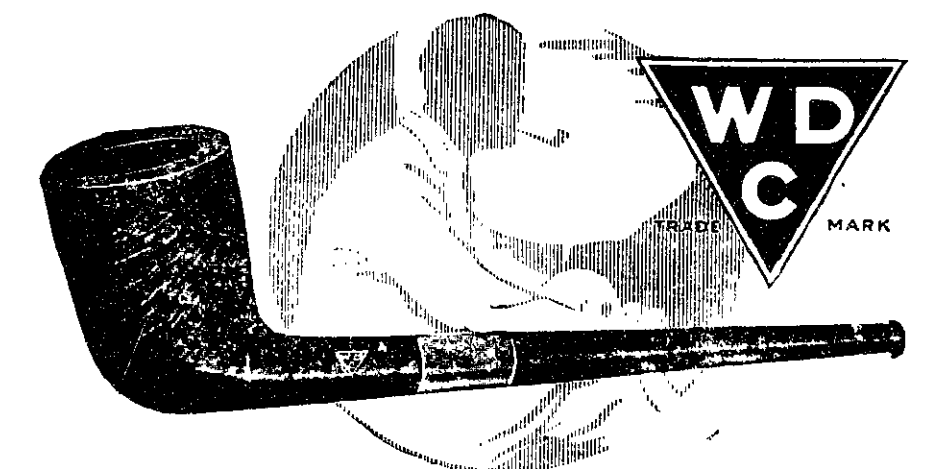
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
