Junod a Track Star

Harry Junod has been a member of the track team for four years and is a sprinter of recognized ability.

Last year he was a member of the 390-relay team which defeated Harvard at the B. A. A. games and this year he was just beaten out for a position on the one-mile indoor relay team.

Junod, however, has not confined his athletic efforts solely to track. As a freshman he was on the wrestling team and the swimming team. At the summer surveying camp two years ago he tied with Teddy Spitz for the athletic championship of the camp in the annual camp Labor Day sports program.

Like Conant, Junod is a member of Theta Delta Chi fraternity. He prepared for Technology at Salisbury school and is in the Mining Engineering course. He is a member of Theta Tau, K2S, Beaver Club, the Mining Engineering Society and the Aero Society. He was on his class relay team on two successive Field Days and was a member of the 1921 relay team which broke and still holds the Field Day relay record.

He was assistant Sophomore editor of Technique 1920 and the following year was athletic editor of Technique 1921. Last year he was a member of the class executive committee and this year is class secretary.

St. Laurent G. M. of THE TECH

R. A. St. Laurent, the third marshal of the Senior class, was born March 2, 1901. He is a member of P. Delta Epsilon Osiris, Stylus, English High Club, and of the Aero Club. He was a delegate to the Student Volunteer Convention held at Des Moines, Iowa a year ago, and to the Intercollegiate Newspaper Conference held in New York last spring. He was a member of the Technique Electoral Board during his second year. He has been on THE TECH during all of the four years that he has been at the Institute. He was advertising manager of THE TECH during his second and third years and general manager during his fourth year being the youngest general manager ever elected to THE TECH. His positions on THE TECH also automatically gave him the same office on the T. E. N. which was until recently connected with THE TECH.

Salesmen and advertising men representing all the leading fountain pen firms were active about the Institute yesterday seeking the man and the pen that put the John Hancock on a score and nine nomination papers in the recent Senior Class Day Committee election.

A TECH reporter saw one of the gentlemen snooping around building 4, the home of Course X, and he made no secret of the fact that the maker of that pen would consider it a decided beat on his brother manufacturer if he could but secure permission from the owner to use the stuff as advertising copy.

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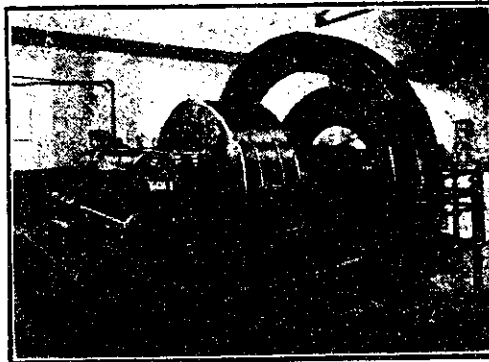
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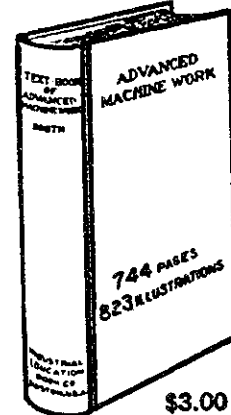
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
